Morton Set and Ready For the First Trades Day

Fat Stock Show Prizes Listed

Prizes to be given in the 14th Annual Fat Stock Show, Saturday, May 6, sponsored by Cochran County 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers of America, are listed below:

Grand Champion Steer, \$50.00; Reserve Champion, \$25.00; Ten pens in the heavy steer class to be given with \$20.00 as first; \$15.00, second; \$10.00, third; \$5.00, fourth and five dollars each the remaining six. The prizes are the same for Light steers.

Five prizes for pens of three to be given: first, \$30.00; second, \$25.00; third, \$20.00; fourth, \$15.00; and fifth \$10.00.

One sow and litter group five pigs of first, \$10.00; second, \$5.00; and remaining three five dollars each.

One boar, gilt and fat Barrows receive like awards of \$10.00; \$7.50; and five dollars each for third, fourth and fifth places.

Seven of three fat barrows, first, \$10.00; second, \$7.50 and third, \$5.00.

There will be four places for heavy cows, heifers, bulls and other breeds of dairy cows, bulls and heifers with prizes the same in each classification, first, \$10.00; second, \$7.50; third and fourth prizes of five dollars each. An additional \$625 has been donated by an individual, which will bring some of the above prizes up considerably. Total prize for the Grand Champion will probably be around \$200.00 or \$200.00. Above figures are compiled in the County agent's office.

Negro Given 25 Years for Murder, Veterans Given Suspended Terms

A Morton negro charged with murder received a 25-year sentence and two Levelland army veterans were given four-year suspended sentences on burglary charges here Wednesday, April 26, by 72nd District Court Judge J. G. Golden. 67-year-old negro who pleaded guilty to the murder charge, asked for clemency.

Otis Black and Otis Simpson, two veterans, charged with burglary here of the First State Bank March 15, were told of their suspended sentences at 1:30 p. m. as court was resumed after noon recess. District Attorney Boyd Croslin and Assistant E. Pharr recommended the suspended sentences.

Bataan March Veteran
Simpson, it was shown in court, was a veteran of the Death March Bataan and served three years, four months and 20 days in Japanese prison camps where he contracted several tropical diseases.

Testimony also showed that Black received a medical discharge and had a 50 per cent disability rating from his nine months of military service in New Guinea. Witnesses said only 37 pennies and a cigarette lighter were missing from the bank. The men were apprehended before any attempt to enter the bank vault was made.

J. E. Vickers of Lubbock represented Black. Alvin R. Allison of Levelland was attorney for Simpson. Both men were tried at the same time by agreement of the lawyers.

Golden's trial in the afternoon was highlighted by his appeal for suspended sentence. Several Morton citizens appeared as character witnesses.

Golden testified he shot Pete Russell on the morning of April

4, 1948, in downtown Morton. Golden said he was angry about Russell's behavior toward a negro woman the night before.

Golden said he first hit Russell, then drew his gun and fired. Russell had no weapon on his person.

Golden did not accept the jury verdict and asked for the statutory two-day period which an appeal or motion for new trial can be filed.

Capt. George A. Davis Establishes Gunnery Record

Captain George A. Davis Jr. son of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Davis Sr., of Star Route, Morton, Texas, and Operations Officer of the 71st Fighter-Interceptor Squadron, 1st Fighter-Interceptor Group, established a group record at March Air Force Base, California, Monday, April 24, when he fired 106 out of 120 rounds into a 27 ft. tow target to record a 98.3%.

Lt. Colonel Jack W. Hayes, Jr., squadron CO, confirms the fact that "it is the highest score ever recorded in Group history. We are very proud," he added, "to have such an excellent pilot as a member of our squadron."

Capt. Davis has been with the squadron on March AFB since 1947. During that time "he has been invaluable to the squadron and to the group in instructing the younger pilots as they enter the squadron and helping to bring up their scores," the colonel stated.

Previously, he had scored over seventy on several occasions, one time reaching 74.3 but was overshadowed by an even 75% recorded by Captain Richard Creighton, also of the 71st.

In commenting on his high of 98.3, the captain said that it made him "feel very good" and modestly places it in the realm of "being all in a day's work." "Sometime in the near future," he muses, "I hope to duplicate it or do even better."

A combat veteran of the last war, Capt. Davis wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, Presidential Citation, Silver Star and the Air Medal with seven Oak Leaf Clusters. He lives, presently, at 7403 Kingsley Way, Riverside, Calif., with his wife, the former Doris L. Forgason of Lubbock, Texas, and their six-year-old daughter, Mary Margaret.

High Plains Water Governed By State Law

Designed to familiarize farmers with the Underground Conservation Law, an eight-page booklet published by the Agricultural Extension Service is being distributed by county agents throughout the High Plains wherever there is irrigation water. Booklets may be secured here from Homer E. Thompson.

Using a question and answer method, the booklet outlines the basic concept of the Underground Water Conservation Law, which was passed by the Texas Legislature in the spring of 1949.

"Every farmer and every water user in an area depending on underground water should be familiar with this law and how it will affect him," the Extension Service points out.

The law hinges on two points. First, it declares that the water under his land belongs to the individual owner and its use cannot be limited, allocated, prorated or taken away.

Second, the law lays the framework for organization of underground water conservation districts, assigning to them powers of conserving, preserving, protecting and re-charging the underground water in reservoirs over which they have jurisdiction.

Coupled with power to recharge underground water reservoirs, the district has the right to prevent waste of irrigation water, thus insuring a continuing supply of the irrigation water which is vital to the prosperity of thousands of High Plains farmers and businessmen.

Control of districts is strictly local, by an elective board of five directors.

A similar demonstration for cattle will be given at the same time, by George Keith. Byron Gunter will demonstrate, "How Not to Show a Calf."

The Arrangement committee, with H. J. Walker as the chairman, assisted by G. C. Keith, E. P. Farmer, Pete Lindsey and Gage Knox will set up the pens and the racks two days before the show.

Earl Crum, chairman of the finance committee, assisted by Roy Allsup, Neal H. Rose, Floss Baldwin, W. W. Williamson, Orville L. Tilger and J. W. McDermott, are working on collecting donations or premium money for outstanding and worthy entries in this show. Forty-four head of beef calves, forty-six head of Jersey and other milk breeds are expected to enter in this show. About 150 head of hogs, divided into six classes, are expected to be entered. This will be the largest livestock show ever held in

Morton. All who expect to show hogs for sale following the show should notify the county Agricultural Agent, Homer E. Thompson. Buyers will be notified to be here. Eight Producers, Four Locations Reported In Levelland's Oil Area

The Levelland area reported eight new completions and four new locations according to reports submitted to the Midland district office of the oil and gas division of the Railroad Commission of Texas this past week.

The Cochran County side of the Levelland field reported six of the new oil wells. The Slaughter field of Hockley County added two new producers to the county.

Two new drillsites were staked in each of Cochran and Hockley counties during the past week.

Cochran County

Texas No. 4-NCT-4 C. S. Dean, 660 feet from north and 3,300 feet from east lines of tract 1, league 94, Mills CSL survey pumped six hours and made a calculated 24-hour potential of 225 barrels of 31 gravity oil. Twenty per cent of the total fluid recovered was water. Gas-oil ratio was 407-1.

The pay formation at 4,940-5,005 feet was acidized with 8,000 gallons.

Coline Oil Corporation No. 33-E, N. W. Willard made a 24-hour potential of 129.84 barrels of 31 gravity oil. This was based on the actual pumping production during eight hours. No water was present. Gas-oil ratio was 273-1.

The pay zone between 4,862 feet and 4,892 feet was treated with 14,000 gallons of acid.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of lease in outlot 11 and 12, league 64, Whiteface townsite, Hardeman CSL survey.

George P. Livermore No. 1 N. R. Lewis, 440 feet from south and east lines of lease in labor 11, league 62, Midland CSL survey flowed six hours through a two-inch choke to produce a daily calculated potential of 257.8 barrels of oil.

Gravity of the petroleum was 32 degrees. Gas-oil ratio was 154-1. Total fluid recovered had a

shakeout of one and one-half per cent water.

The pay zone at 4,841-4,887 feet was acidized with 10,000 gallons.

Lion No. 5 F. O. Masten, 2,337.8 feet from east and 660 feet from south lines of lease in league 132, Carson CSL survey pumped 24 hours and made an initial production of 77.31 barrels of 30.3 gravity oil. No water was present. Gas-oil ratio was 303.2-1.

The pay formation between 4,999 feet and 5,028 feet was treated with 6,500 gallons of acid.

DeKalb No. 6 Reed-Wright estate, 440 feet from east lines of lease in labor 23, league 96, Mills CSL survey flowed 24 hours through a two-inch choke and made an initial production of 96.64 barrels of 28.50 gravity oil. Six per cent of the total fluid recovered was water. Gas-oil ratio was 163-1.

The pay section at 4,795-4,950 feet was acidized with 12,000 gallons.

E. Constantin Pr., No. 4 Webb 440 feet from north and east lines of labor 12, league 61, Midland CSL survey pumped eight hours to produce a calculated 24-hour potential of 157.32 barrels of 31 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 420-1. No water was present.

The pay section at 4,862-4,888 feet was acidized with 10,000 gallons.

CENSUS FIGURES DUE TO BE LOWER THAN ESTIMATIONS

There are going to be many sad faced chamber of commerce officials and other civic leaders all over West Texas when the 1950 census figures are announced. Because, without an exception, the census figures for every town, and city in this area are going to be a lot lower than even the most conservative have estimated.

Newspaper men have a way of finding out things, even if they are supposed to be secret, and friends talked to a lot of them at the Panhandle Press Association meeting recently at Amarillo. The trouble with the present census estimates, they report, is that they are based on national averages that just won't hold true in West Texas. And the reason for that is simple—families in West Texas are small. Instead of being 4.5 persons per family, which is the national average, the families in this area will contain only between 3 and 3.5 persons.

We don't like the idea either, but let's take Crosbyton for instance. There are approximately 600 family units in the city. By the national average of 4.5 persons per family, we should have 2,700 inhabitants. But if the low family average of 3 to 3.5 persons works out here, our population will only be between 1,800 and 2,100. So don't be too disappointed when the final figures are announced. Every other town and city—including Lubbock and Amarillo—will be disappointed too. And if you doubt the figures take a few minutes to work out a family average on your own block. You'll be surprised.—The Crosbyton Review.

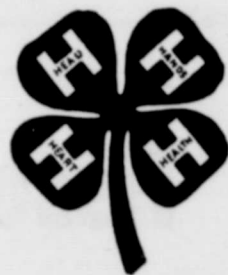
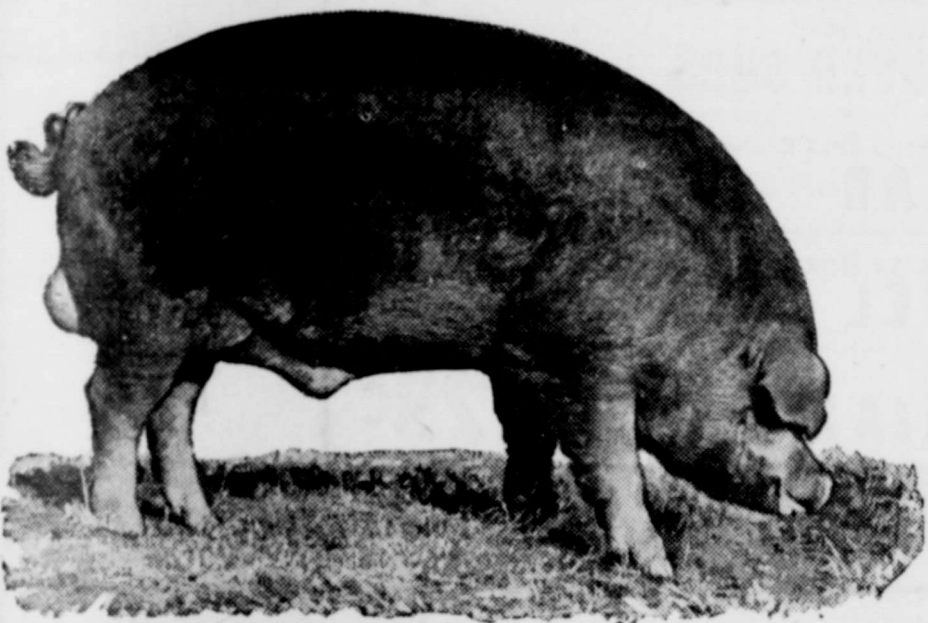
