Agriculture Displays At Texas State Fair of 1950 Show Many Improvements

The Mid-Century presentation of Texas agriculture during the 1950 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-22, will feature a greater variety of farm products and highly developed techniques and procedures designed to raise farm incomes, Ray W. Wilson, agriculture department manager, has announced.

Progress of this two-billion dollar industry will be displayed in colorful and spectacular exhibits in the Agriculture Building, he said. The agricultural extravaganza will be colorfully showcased by the Lambert Landscape Company, Dallas, for great-

er eye appeal. An outstanding exhibit of Texas soil and soil characters will be featured in the Texas A & M College display.

Demonstrations on soil testing and information on plant foods will be given daily.

The Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Research Foundation will show actual living and growing specimens of more than 40 leading varieties of grasses. Grass is fast becoming Texas' leading crop because of its importance to the beef and dairy industries, Wilson said.

The Conservation Service exhibit will be located in the Agriculture Building. The Texas Research Foundation will develop a permanent outdoor display, located across the street from the building.

Supplementing the grass show will be an educational exhibit demonstrating research carried on by the Plant Research Institute of Texas University in the development of grass farming.

Mid-Century achievements of Texas agricultural researchers and "working farmers" will be displayed through exhibits of leading crops, rural youth activities, irrigation and forestry.

Colorful crop phase displays will include exhibits of wheat, cotton, citrus fruits, grain sorghums, pecans, peanuts, rice, sweet potatoes, vegetables and other leading crops.

Walter W. Cardwell, Luling, has been named general superintendent of the Agriculture Show.

Often wonder just how thoroughly the Tribune is read. The following letter is self explanatory and we appreciate greatly Dr. Thomason's interest, not only in contents of Tribune but clarifying an article carried in a recent issue of the paper.

Mrs. Ann England, Morton Tribune, Morton, Texas

I read with interest the Morton Tribune. Your article about the M. D. Anderson Cancer and Research Hospital in your last issue interested me to look up Clive Howard's article on that subject in the Woman's Home Companion for June.

In Fort Worth we have an alert group of doctors who are very much interested in keeping abreast of the latest developments in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer in order to provide for our patients the best possible care. We have the greatest respect for the M. D. Anderson Hospital and for the good work it is doing. We feel, however, that there are several points in Clive Howard's article that tend to create the wrong impression.

The article implies that patients suffering from cancer cannot be treated adequately except by cancer specialists in a cancer center. There are only about ten of those centers in the country. The truth is that any good general hospital in any of our larger communities is fully equipped to diagnose and treat cancer and does it every day.

It implies also that few surgeons and x-ray specialists and pathologists outside of these few cancer centers are competent to recognize or to operate on or to treat the more complicated cases of cancer. In reality there are many surgeons and radiologists in private practice throughout the country who are treating cancer every bit as well as it can be treated anywhere in the world. It is important for the public to know that first class treatment is available close by and not in some distant center only.

What I am trying to say is that every good surgeon, radiologist, and pathologist is a cancer specialist, and that every doctor's office is, or should be, a cancer detection center; and that the cancer victims of north and west Texas can be treated in this area. They should not feel that they have to go to south Texas for adequate diagnosis and treatment.

Notices of Hearing By Water Board to Be Posted Soon

Littlefield.—Notices of a 21-County hearing by the Board of Water Engineers on designation of underground water conservation districts will be posted soon. The High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association office in Littlefield today said it understood the hearing date is 10 a.m. Tuesday, August 29, in the Plainview city auditorium.

Six counties, Lamb, Hockley, Dallam, Lubbock, Hale and Swisher, have petitioned the Board for designation of reservoirs for the purpose of forming districts.

Farmers who draw irrigation water from the Ogallala sands—scattered over parts of 21 Panhandle-South Plains counties—will have an opportunity to appear at the hearing. The number of irrigation wells in the area is estimated to be between 12,000 and 15,000.

Notices of the hearing will be posted in each county and will appear in at least three newspapers, in Plainview, Lubbock and Amarillo.
