

The Innocent Pay For The Stupid Man's Play

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimates that 60 Texans are alive today that would have been killed in June traffic accidents were it not for the Highways Patrol's war

With June considered a more ideal month for traveling than May, it should mean a great deal to all of us that less lives were lost in June than in May. It should mean a great deal that the trend is down instead of steadily rising as it has

To accomplish this task, the Highway Patrol had to arrest more speeders than ever before in the history of the patrol. In other words, to accomplish this task, the Highway Patrol had to actually go out and pull the maniacs off the road. If ever anything was a national disgrace, this is it.

Lectures, drivers tests, and arrests seem to do little good. It becomes more amazing everyday how little people behind the wheel care for the lives of others. The problem boils down to something very fundamental. Only ignorance could account for a nation of people permitting this thing to continue.

Sixty are still alive. Were you one of the 3,390 who were caught speeding last month? Where you one of the 733 who were driving while under the influence of alcohol? Were you one of the 878 who took the stupid chance of passing on a hill or

The horrible thing is that if you weren't one of these you still could very easily be one of the 60 that are living, thanks to the Highway Patrol. The percentage of deaths by accident to the persons who are foolishly breaking the law is appallin.

Good Government Must Be Supported

In a land where we pride ourselves upon our freedom; government, whether it be local, or national becomes the vital concern of each and every citizen.

In Morton, the people have elected a Mayor and a city commission for which the mayor serves as chairman. The people have invested in those the power of selection of other employees. Such a selected man is the City Secretary whose duties, roughly estimated, consist of acting on the ideas of the commissioners.

Last week the Commission appointed a new City Secretary to succeed, J. S. Harrison who resigned. The man appointed was Joe Gipson, a 17 year resident of Morton who certainly should know the problems which have arisen in this city since its incorporation some 16 years ago.

Mr. Gipson has been carefully selected by your City Commission to fill this office. Now he needs the full support of the commission and of each and every citizen. He stands ready to listen to problems which concern all or a part of the city. He stands ready to receive your suggestions for bettering the city and to consider them carefully.

Joe Gipson has a big job and no one realizes it any more fully than he. Your full cooperation will be gratefully appreciated. Your concern in local government does not end when the citizens elect a man or group of men to lead them. Your concern should never end.

Fun Ends Where Danger Begins

Too often people in a community are prone to take the fool. ish pranks of youngsters as just so much fun and not worth the effort to curtail. But foolish pranks, committed in the spirit of

Two such pranks have been in evidence in Morton during the past week. Two such pranks have caused a great deal of expense, a great deal of hard feelings, and could have caused

Generally speaking, the sheriff and peace officers of a small community are disturbed little over such pranks. They point out that they have a job to do which requires much more than "baby sitting" with a bunch of youngsters and spoiling their fun. Last week, spoiling a little fun might have saved a little money. Indeed, it might have saved an eye, or even a

The first prank that last week caused considerable anguish and damage occurred at the ball diamond. Local boys, bored with the unexcitement of the game, invented a game of their own out behind the cars. They enjoyed their game of throwing stones in the air and hitting them with sticks until one shattered the window of an almost new car. The window could be and was replaced. An eye or a life could not have been.

Undoubtedly there was no intent of causing damage. Those boys, who did not escape unnoticed, were simply finding an outlet for pent up energy. It may be that they should have been out on the field playing the ball game instead of their parents. At any rate, their fun must now come to a stop, Reckless destroying of property cannot be tolerated. It never hurts until it becomes your property that is damaged.

The second incident, is simply an extending of a practice that has been going on for years in Morton. Perhaps you were one of those who handed down the example to the children of Morton. As in the other case, no life has yet been the cost. To. morrow it may be.

The direction signs are installed by the highway department for two purposes. They are to direct people and to caution people. A highway superintendent pointed out last week that youth who deliberately tore down cautions signs installed on curves and danger warnings near the flooded areas have endangered lives. Two cars drove into the water covered strips of pavement because they were unwarned by signs. The signs had been installed and then were hoisted up a tree by playful children.


One man driving through Morton who did not know the area could easily be surprised; dismayed, and misled by a County Line direction marker lifted from the Highway 290 and installed near Lehman on the Plains highway. Such pranks are completely uncalled for

Nor are all these pranksters grade school children. Some of them are adult in body and simply childish in mind. But whoever they may be at least some of their antics must be cur-

This is not an easy thing to do. It is not fair to expect a small law enforcement body to stop all these pranks. Much of the stopping can come from the parents. Parental discipline will, in most cases, accomplish a task both ticklish and uncomfortable for peace oficers to accomplish.

The citizens in town call for your help. A little advice from an adult who can see the possibilities of disaster in what may be termed as fun, can go a long way. It may be your child who is the culprit or the next victim. Lets prevent foolish accidents.

Your indebtedness mounts each month and so does your interest payments.

If you continue to borrow the \$100 month after month the in terest soon bites deeply into your income and the debt itself becomes bigger and bigger. The result, in time, is bankruptcy, if repayment cannot be made. The court appoints a receiver empowered to sell your property. In the resulting liquidation, your creditors usually are left holding a near-empty bag. And you wind up a pauper, your family desti, pounds 14 ounces, born July 11th tute. 
