Green Bugs Playing Havoc With Maize

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We have been shocked the past week, as many farmers have been lately, of the devastation to the current maize crop by green bugs.

We knew that the bugs were posing a problem, and that they were thicker than usual, even invading the city in swarms, but we didn't realize just how serious they were.

One farmer friend of ours believes that the High Plain's maize crop may suffer by an average of 1,000 pounds per acre due to the pests. After viewing some fields in the immediate area, his estimate may have been light.

Green bugs are something which maize farmers haven't had to worry about to a great extent. They usually confine their damage to wheat. But this year they apparently "laid over" for the later crop.

The late maize is catching the worst of the ordeal, with entire fields of small milo being ruined. In fields of this nature, it's a far worse loss than a severe hailstorm would have brought, because hail usually misses some of the crop. In much of the younger maize, the bugs didn't miss a thing.

Spray planes have been working at a fast and furious pace the past couple of weeks, but for many farmers a lot of damage had already been done.

This being sort of a new threat to maize, most farmers didn't know to spray the bugs, and apparently neither did experiment station officials, who said after first seeing the bugs that they didn't recommend spraying -- and they still doubt the effectiveness of spraying the bugs.

But try to convince a farmer who has already lost one field to the insects not to spray -- it would be a hard job.



BUG DAMAGE. . . A sample of some of the damage which green bugs have caused in the Friona area to the maize crop is shown in this panel of pictures. In the upper photo, healthy stalks of milo are few and far between as the dead stalks make the field look like it dried up from want of moisture. This was a late crop, following wheat. In the second picture, a close-up view of the withered stalks is seen. The stalk on the left is the same age of those killed by the green bugs. Next photo shows a closeup of plants in field with the farmer pointing out withered plants next to some which weren't damaged quite as bad. Pause And Reflect

Crater Battlefield, Petersburg, Virginia ---

"For an instant a great dark cloud hung suspended over us. Then there descended upon us the contents of this cloud -- dirt and rocks, parts of trees, and fragments of human bodies."

So runs one surviving soldier's description of the first few moments following the explosion of the powder charge from which this Civil War battleground takes its name.

For seemed an eternity the two armies had faced each other in this wooded area just southeast of Petersburg.

Taken alone the village of Petersburg was not too important, but as a link in the defense of the Capital City of Richmond, it became a vital target.

Among the Union army laying siege to the city were a number of soldiers who had been coal miners in Pennsylvania. It was this group of men who first suggested that a tunnel be dug to a point under the Rebel lines and a charge of explosives be set off to allow a breakthrough into the city.

And so it came about that at 3:15 a.m. on July 30, 1864, the fuse leading to a charge of 8000 pounds of powder was lighted. The estimated time of 15 minutes from lighting to explosion passed and still all remained quiet and peaceful in the predawn darkness.

An hour passed and just as the eastern sky became pale grey, two volunteers stepped forward and offered to crawl into the tunnel and relight the fuse.

They discovered that the fuse had burned out where it had been spliced. Relighting it they scrambled back out to safety and 30 minutes later the explosion took place.

Five hundred feet of Confederate trench was destroyed, 278 men were killed or wounded, and two of the four cannon at the salient were wrecked. A gaping hole 30 feet deep, 70 feet wide and 175 feet long contained a writhing, screaming mass of men. However clever the plan and however daring its execution it failed in its primary purpose. After the first shock the Rebels

rallied and by early afternoon were again entrenched in the area. Today it remains a deep grass grown scar on the Virginia landscape. Granite monuments and bronze tablets attest to the valor of the brave men of both armies who died at the "Crater." Tall straight pines stand guard over the unmarked graves and a respectful quiet prevails, even among the youthful visitors.

This week marks the 104th anniversary of the "Battle of the Crater."

Compared to the more spectacular wars of modern times it seems almost amateurish. However it bears remembering for one very important reason -- it remains one of the first examples of the white majorities concern for the black minority. To understand this we must return to the Union lines during

the night time hours of July 29-30, 1864. General Burnside had in his command 4,300 negro troops who had been rested and refitted while the tunnel was being dug. It was his plan to have these troops spearhead the attack immediately following the blast.

Burnside was outranked by Meade and it was Meade's judgement that if the plan failed the Union army could be accused of wanting to get rid of the only negro troops then remaining in the army of the Potomac.

Burnside did not know of this change until the day before the battle. He revised his battle plan and sent in three divisions of white soldiers with the negros.

Although the "Battle of the Crater" was counted a Confederate victory, the city of Petersburg was overrun and before another summer came the Rebels surrendered at Appomattox Court House.

The long horriby bloody American Civil War was over. The Union, Our Union, was preserved.

Now our task is to protect this unity and strength.

Of course, everyone knows we live in a constantly changing world. It has been very interesting to observe the changes which have been made and are being made almost daily in irrigation farming. When the late Leo McLellan drilled the first well on his farm west of town, he selected the highest spot on the farm, which was general practice at that time.

The theory behind this practice was that water runs better downhill. However, that was before the time of underground irrigation popelines. This week his sons, Kenneth and Joe, are drilling a new irrigation well and apparently they chose a spot at the opposite end of the pole. It may not be the lowest point on the farm, but it is down the hill a great deal from the first well.

Maybe this change will make the art of "witching" for water more popular. There really wasn't much need for locating the strongest underground water with a peach tree limb or other "witching" apparatus when it was necessary to limit the location of the well to a "high" anyway. I have never been able to understand a person's ability to make

a tree limb lead him to a good strong water supply, but feel confident that many people are able to do it. If I were faced with the decision of locating a well, I'd certainly want the services of a competent "witcher" to help me locate it.

In recent years many people have been critical of persons in this field and this may be one reason why they are hard to locate. This wouldn't present any problem to me since I have one Castro County friend who has real good success locating underground water by this method.

Late sleepers will never know what they are missing these beautiful mornings. If you haven't driven through town and around the countryside about sunrise for sometime, you should get up a couple of hours earlier and take a look. Things just come up. 



> Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known. Potato and tomato plants, close kin to the deadly nightshade, have foliage that contains alkaloid poisons which can cause severe digestive upset and nervous disorder if eaten.

> Jimson weed, sometimes called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes more poisoning than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and

Duffenbachia, or dumb cane, is a beautiful house plant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of the mouth and tongue that can be deadly. It is called dumb cane because of its power to strike its victims speechless. The stalk contains needle-like crystals of calcium oxalate that become imbeded in the tissue of the mouth and ton-

er poinsetta is full of an acid, gue causing severe swelling and pain.

> Castor beans seeds are especially dangerous because they are so deadly and so readily available. They are sold in garden stores for about 25¢ a packet and are popular because they produce large, lush plants in one season. Yet each seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a

> Mescalbean, or mountain laurel, is also dangeous. It has a poison bean with a hard coat. If it is swallowed whole there may be no ill effects, but if chewed or crushed it can be

> Other common plants in Texas that have poisonous parts include elephant ear, larkspur, azaleas, lantana canana, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poisoning, poisonoak, and poison sumac.

It's always a temptation to save seeds from a particularly fine flower but if it is of a hybrid variety there is little advantage in so doing. The seedlings grown from your home-saved seeds will not produce flowers like those of the parent bloom. In fact the ossoms will vary in size and color and many will be inferior.
