around the mouth of jar. Dented or spread edges of lids, or masonry type caps with loose or cracked linings may also cause spoilage

The flat metal lids of two piece losures cannot be reused so they should be discarded as soon as the jar of food is opened. It is safest to buy these lids new each year, even though some are unused and left from the year before.

The pressure gauge of a canner should be checked carefully for accuracy each year.

Canning does not improve any food, therefore putting up poor quality of food does not pay. Select fresh, firm, sound fruits and young tender vegetables. Can them as soon after harvest as you possibly can.
