Estimated loot included \$20 at the railroad station, \$85 at the City Hall, and \$7 at the Food Lockers. In addition a whole ham, a half ham, a slab of salt pork, and some sliced bacon were missing. A partially eaten piece of bologna was also found at the scene of the robberies.







Of course, the only solution to this question is to attempt blend a little of what the people want, a little of what they ed, and all that they have a right to know into a newspaper. No newspaper publisher, editor, or reporter ever knows hether he succeeds. Often, there is not even an indication at people care. But it is the few times when someone openly ices their appreciation of a newspaper, that makes the blisher feel the job is worth doing.

A NEWSPAPER'S EXPENSES

Newspaper publishers at their recent convention found that they all had much the same problem, expenses increasing more rapidly than revenues. In the period since war's end, circulation and advertising lineage have increased to new high levels but the gains in these respects have been far exceeded by the increases in operating costs. It would be difficult to name a single item that goes into newspaper publication that does not cost far more today than it did five years ago. Print paper, machinery, labor, wire services, features, taxes and the rest, all are

Leaf Worms at Work in County

Leaf worms are getting ready to take their toll of cotton in Cochran County. Some of the fields in which County Agent Homer E. Thompson has examined, as may as four small leaf

worms has been found on a single leaf, and will average six to eight worms per stalk. Farmers should keep a vigil eye on their cotton and when in these numbers the least ragging leaves, should warrant immediate poisoning.

Here are the poisons recommended for the leaf worm and the dosage required in this county for good control. Either dusts or spray may be used effectively. depending on the machinery available to the farmer.

Dusts: 20% toxaphene 40% surphur or 3-5-40 mixture at 10 per acre, calcium arsenate 10 lb. per acre at weekly inter-

Sprays: Toxaphene, or 2 to 1 mixture, 2 to 3 lbs. per acre (Technical poison) at 5 to 7 day intervals. Technical poison per acre means this: if one gallon of ourse. Then they present the Spring, San Angelo, Odessa, and toxaphene containing 8 lbs, of toxaphene per gallon then at least one quart should be used to the acre, said County Agent

DDT does not give the results desired for leaf worm control. but the above dusts or sprays given for control of leaf worm will give excellent results when applied properly.

If these insecticides are not available on the market then contact the county agent for substitutes that may be used.


