To gain admittance by Court order to a State Hospital for those mentally ill, there must be one of two types of proceedings. One proceeding is for a "permanent" committment and requires jury trial and a finding that the person is of unsound mind,

and would be dangerous if left

The other type of order is a "90 day" committment. One sent

committment is not adjudged to be of unsound mind. He is sent

to the hospital for a period not to exceed 90 days for "observa

tion and treatment." He may be released at any time the Doctors

of the hospital deem that his condition justifies the same prior

to the 90 days. He loses none of his civil rights, and a new trial

to find that he is restored to his right mind is not necessary. He can return to his business, and

carry on the same as if he had never been sent to an institution.

Under the new social security law, household workers who are paid as much as \$50 by one employer in the three-month period, January through March (a calor the preceding quarter, will have their wages count toward old-age and survivors insurance. envelope form will be 3% of the worker's cash wages for the three-month period. The house wives may deduct one-half of this (11/2%) from her employee's wages. One and one-half percent is her share of the tax.

Before January 1, every regularly employed household worker should have a social security ac count number card. The social security office is the place to get it. Right away, every housewife should read the booklet, "Do You Have a Maid?" The back page of this informative booklet is postage-free post card addressed to the collector of internal rev
