





a statement that hit and run charges had been filed against an official of the refinery whose car struck down striker, Wayne Jackson.

Jackson has been released from the hospital and the official, plant auditor, W. J. Crawford had been served with the warrant Tuesday. If Crawford waives preliminary hearing he will be bound over to the Grand Jury early in March.

National Labor Relations Board representative, Woodrow Green was expected to arrive from Washington next week immediately after Christmas and has been commissioned to investigate both the union and management activities at the plant.

The picket lines are still being maintained by members of the Oil Workers International CIO Union. A new contract and a wage increase is demanded by the 50-80 member group. The plant has a 5,000 barrel capacity output each day.

F. H. Mitchell, spokesman for the union, explained the difficulty this way:

"The company has defied the government, broken the law and refused to grant the union a contract," Mitchell said. "We are prepared to carry the five-year long battle to the finish."

Mitchell stated that the strike was the eventual outgrowth of an election held in January of 1945 when the laborers of the plant voted to let the union become their spokemen and bargaining agent with management of the company.

As a result of that election, Mitchell said, the War Labor board ordered the plant management to bargain with the union for a contract. "The company refused," he said Later, after a hearing at Levelland in February of 1947, the National Labor Relations board studied the case and handed down an order for the plant to bargain with the union. Plant officials again refused to co-operate with the union, Mitchell said.

Resulting from the refusal by plant directors to grant a bargaining conference with union officials, the case was taken to the U. S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals. That court handed down directive on March 20, 1950, ordering the Cooperative Refinery company to bargain with the union, Mitchell maintained. "The

St. Nicholas or (Nicolas) Santa Claus' real name. He lived in Asia Minor and was the beloved bishop of the Greek church of Myra in Lycia. He is the patron saint of the young, and in some European countries a person dressed as a bishop still assembles the children and distributes gifts of nuts, sweetmeats and other nice things to the good boys and girls. Children loved St. Nicholas and trudged along beside him as he trudged the dusty roads of the Lycia countryside, bringing fruit and candy to the sick and needy. One of many stories told of his goodness concerns a poor and honest man and his three good and beautiful daughters. The father was unhappy for poverty prevented his giving the customary dowries to his daughters, and for this reason they could never have suitable husbands. One night a bag of coins was tossed in at the man's window. The next night the act was repeated. But on the third night. the father watched, and the anonymous giver was detected. The jolly bishop stood with the third bag of coins in his hands. The father was very proud and would not accept the money. The good bishop begged the poor man to accept the gifts and use thm for this daughters' dowries, requesting that his name never be revealed. At last, the father accepted the money for his daughters, but he could not keep the name of the generous bishop secret-so the egend of the good St. Nicholas was further spread and strengthened.



United States Is Christmas Carol 'Meeting Place'

In towns and cities throughout America, in churches, public squares and along home-lined streets, over millions of radios and public address systems come the strains of the world's Yuletide melodies-old as bygone centuries, young as "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas . . .'

The United States, meeting place of carols from all Christendom, contributes yearly to the traditions of Christmas music by writing new songs and popular. izing old ones.

The carols of Europe arrived with the peoples who came to America to settle, "O Come, All Ye Faithful" (Adeste Fideles), eventually translated into 119 anguages and dialects, belonged to no one nation but was the common gift of the continent. From Germany came Luther's hymn for children, "Away in a manger, no crib for a bed . England sent "God rest you, merry gentlemen, let nothing you dismay . . ." And France pro-vided the beautiful "Cantique de Noel" or "O Holy Night."

Three American composers did much to revive the ancient custom by writing new songs which are, today, among the world's best beloved carols.

"It Came Upon a Midnight Dear Santa Claus: Clear" was the inspiration of Edmund H. Sears, a Massachusetts Unitarian minister, in 1849. Less than 10 years later Dr. John Henry Hopkins Jr., Episcopal from Williamsport, Pa., rector composed both the words and music for "We Three Kings of Orient Are."

Perhaps the best-known Ameri. can carol, "O Little Town of Bethlehem," was written in 1868 by Phillips Brooks in Philadelphia. In the New World, during the first half century after the Pilgrims' arrival at Plymouth, similar troubles caused the banning of mince-meat pies and Christmas. In 1659, and for several years thereafter, there was no Christmas in New England as a result of an argument over the shape and meaning of mincemeat pies. Eventually the indignation spent itself, and the ban was lifted.

A pie which no other can aproach in the intricacies of its creation, mince-meat pies originally were made almost enitrely of meat seasoned with spices. Fruit, chiefly currants, was added, and probably because the dish was regarded as a sweet, the fruit content was gradually






