Do You Know whether oral dmissions and confessions made by a Defendant in a criminal case can be used against him?

Oral statements made by a Defendant in a criminal case cannot be used against him, if he is under arrest or in custody at the time they are made. The Statutes require that confessions and statements shall be made freely and voluntarily and be signed by the Defendant. Also he must be properly warned as to the effect of his statement. There are exceptions to this rule, which are, that should the Defendant tell the officers where to locate physical property, such as a gun, stolen property, or other physical matter, that the officers may go find this evi-dence, and testify that the Defendant directed them to these things and that they were found where he said they would be. These things can also be introduced in evidence against the

However, after a Defendant is released from custody, and is free to go where he pleases, any statement he may make reflecting upon his guilt may be used against him.



Continuation of the full \$15,-00,000-a-year farm-to-market

"I am opposed to any schemes aimed at cutting down on the arm-to-market road program. am opposed to any schemes for taking road money away from the counties and giving it to the State Highway Department," the senator declared.

Corbin referred particularly to the plan announced last week which would take money now allocated to counties for lateral road construction, amounting to about \$8 million next year, and giving it to the Highway Department to replace the present \$15 million annual rural road program.

'The proponents of this scheme say that many years from now it will get more farm-to-market roads built." Corbin said "But say that we need more roads now, not 20 years from now. The \$15 million-a-year program is little enough as it is without

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





Self Employed Come Under New S. S. Setup

Self-employed persons come beginning January 1, 1951; however, in most cases the first retax paying time in March 1952. according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Arministra-

Among the self-employed persons are operators of stores, filling stations, theaters, taxi cabs, advertising agencies, logging contractors, brokers, and certain field and Whiteface. law specifically exempts farm of operators, physicians, lawyers, Mrs. Franklin and her rectors, engineers, accountants,

An individual must have selfemployement income of \$400.00 ject to the law. Only the first \$3600 income in a year is subject to the tax. The tax rate is from January 1, 1951, through December 1953.

Partners in a business are considered as self-employed. A professional person may have selfemployment income from sole ownership or a partnership outside of his profession. Both wages self-employment income may be credited up to \$3,600 per year. Benefits are computed from the average wage or average net self-employment income, or ombination of the two.

A person just coming into the system who had no previous wage credits will not be penalized because he was not in covered employment prior to 1951. The law provides for a new start as a basis for figuring benefits. No one will be fully insured under the new start until he has obtained at least 6 quarters of coverage, which means he cannot provisions before the middle of self-employment income and Security Office, 1311 Texas Ave., Lubbock, Texas.

Preparedness For Disaster Is Very **Essential Now**

It is hoped that we may achieve orderly thinking and make concrete suggestions for use by local and state committees in planning the medical phase of civil defense and disaster relief in the very near future, said Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer and State Medical Defense Director.

No community can prepare itself to provide these additional health services that will be essential for civilians subjected to disaster, without a great deal of forethought, prolonged training and development of systematic performances, drills, tests, etc. When the average community prepares itself for disaster, the effort of each citizen and every profession must be fitted into a coordinated system.

There is no easy way to prepare for disaster, it is all hard work. There are two opinions as to local disaster planning. One maintains that no local planning should be done until the central agency prescribes a uniform pattern for each locality. Such a regimented approach would result in a speedy realization of the desired total readiness. Certain elements of local plans would de pend upon such a system if mutual support between communi-ties are to be achieved with a maximum of economy and efficiency. Such a system is the only one likely to survive national

disaster. A second group maintains that each community should proceed immediately with its own preparations for meeting disaster. Such a program would not interfere with a national program. Each team can lay the necessary ground work in plans and at the same time, improve its own and others' readiness to meet any problems that may require community participation.


