FT. WORTH, Jan. 18.-Effective today (January 18), the U. S. Soil Conservation Service becomes active under its recent reorganization, H. N. Smith announced today. Smith, who has been actink Regional Director for the four-state region of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas, with headquarters in Fort Worth, will assume his new title as State Conservationist for Texas, and will report directly to the Administrator of SCS Washington.

"The same action will be taken by the men who have been appointed State Conservationists for other states in the nation." Smith said. The title "Regional Director" will be discontinued. Smith's headquarters as Texas State Conservtionist will be at Temple, Texas.

"During the transition period when the physical transfer of personnel and property from the old regional offices to the new state offices is being carried to completion, James W. Hammett, who has been Assistant Regional Director, will be in charge of the

office in Ft. Worth." Smith said. 

The Bible is to be studied as you would study any other be An interpreter implies a misunderstanding between two paror at least the possibility of a misunderstanding. The Bib was given to man to direct him from earth to heaven, and t suggest that someone must interpret the Bible for you is to lay a serious charge at the feet of God. It implies that God could not give us a book that all could understand, or that he could have but would not do it. Therefore, in Bible study use the same common sense that you would use in studying any other book.

2. Recognize the fact that God intended for all to under stand the Bible exactly alike, and never be satisfied with the statement made by many: "Well, you understand it one way and I understand it another." The word of God is "truth" (John 17:17) and anything that is truth can only mean one thing. Christ said, "The truth shall make you free." (John 8:32) Therefore I know it is God's intention that we know His will by study, and if we fail to understand alike the fault is with us and not with God.
