## lifes It's Homecoming: Friona vs Dimmitt

Major Jim Baggett, who was the speaker for the First Baptist Church's fall revival last week, says he has changed his thinking as to the Biblical prophecy that the world will someday be destroyed by fire.

"As a Boy Scout, when I tried to start a fire with two sticks, or even with matches, I had my doubts. I thought that for this to be a possibility, everyone on earth would have to be armed with a can of kerosine and a match, and they all would have to throw their kerosine and light their matches at one time."

"Even then," Major Baggett said, "I still had serious doubts as to whether or not the thing

The Air Force major, who is chaplain at England Air Force Base in Louisiana, said that when he flew missions over-Hiroshima and Negasaki dur-FRIONA, TEXAS, 79035 ing World War II, his doubts were erased as to whether the earth could burn.

Maj. Baggett pointed out that when Hamburg, Germany, was destroyed, more people died from suffocation, when all the oxygen was burned up, than were killed from bomb fragments or crumbling buildings.

A journalism instructor at Texas Tech, Bob Rooker, who was our classmate for a year or so in college, says he thinks organized religion is in trouble in this country.

"If you don't think so, go to the college and university campuses on Sunday mornings, and see how few ofthe young people have bothered to make it to church and/or Sunday School," Rooker told a session of the West Texas Press Association recently.

Rooker said he thought the key lies with the individual churches -- and the churches back home. "The churches are either doing something with the youth, or they're not," he said.

We did a little checking this week, just out of curiosity, and found that Sunday School or church attendance in Friona totaled 1,873 this past Sunday, and 1780 the previous Sunday.

The figures represent Sunday School attendance for all churches with such classes, and regular church attendance for those not holding Sunday

School. We don't know what the national average is on Sunday School attendance, but evidentally Friona has a pretty good percentage of the area population in Sunday School and church. It figures out to about 35 or 36 per cent of the total population of the surrounding

area. The national church membership is higher than this, but we'd venture a guess that the average attendance falls below our figures. However, it still leaves a top-heavy 64 to 65 per cent of the population not attending regularly -- so my friend's assertation that church is in trouble, or at least has its work cut out for it -- could still hold true in Friona,

## Water Hearing Slated Saturday In Hereford

Texas water hearing in Hereford on Sat., Oct. 5. People from all over West Texas who are interested in water repected to be at the Deaf Smith meeting beginning at 9:30 a.m. The purpose of the hearing, to be conducted by the Texas Legislative Water Study Committee, is, according to committee chairman Bill Clayton, "to find out how interested people in the area are in obtaining water supplies." The water committee already has held public hearings on water problems in other areas of the State. "The problem in West Texas," Clayton emphasized, "is how can West Texas maintain and expandits thriving economy in view of its dwindling underground water resources?" The agenda of the hearing sets out problems concerning underground water, the cost of imported water, willingness of the area to pay for it, and the need for an agency to contract and distribute the water. In addition, the question is raised as to what territory should be included to receive imported water, and asks specifically, "should your county be included?" Other items relate to wa-




That invasion of air space is cause for caution for pilots, and we join in the hope that no crashes will result from highspeed aircraft flying into birds in migration.

The alert also means that the hunters across the country are beginning to get their gear ready for the season. Mittens and gloves and long underwear and insulated boots are coming out for airing and inspection to make sure that all is in readiness for the long, patient wait in the morning cold.

The number of hunters rises annually. It has risen from 12.6 million licensed in 1950 to a 1965 high of more than 19.3 million, according to the Fish and Wildlife Service of the Interior Department. There is some duplication in those figures, since they include those hunters licensed in more than one state, and the 1960 figures include our younger states of Alaska and Hawaii. Still, they reflect an impressive percentage of our population. And no matter what one may feel personally about hunting, we can all envy the man or woman who can get out into the woodlands or go for a trek through the fields at this season of the year.

There is, after all, one area of the world that is going to experience a marked decrease in the number of hunters this fall. In Soviet occupied Czechoslovakia, the newspaper Veverni Phaha reports that "Anyone going into the woods

#### FLAG DAYS

At one time or another we've all heard or voiced complaints about the meager display of Old Glory on national holidays. More often than not the outcry is justified. Many folks are just too darned lazy to raise the Stars and Stripes. Others take advantage of the holiday to travel away from home and fear they will not return until after dark and in time to lower the flag.

Many businesses are closed on legal holidays and it is an inconvenience for the proprietor to go down to the place of business to put up the flag in the morning and then return to lower it in the evening.

Down in Salem, Arkansas, the Jaycees have come up with a wonderful solution to the problem-a solution so simple and logical that it has added a great deal to the community's business district and to the Jaycees' own image as community leaders.

The Salem Jaycees furnish a flag to any business that requests one. The members put up the flag on holidays, take them down in the evening, and store them until the next holiday. The only exception is in the case of inclement weather. The Jaycee program includes 16 holidays a year; the total cost is a mere \$10 per year per flag.

The project reached its high point on Labor Day, when 48 flags were raised over Salem. Since then, six more businesses have requested the service.

Now the Jaycees have undertaken to offer the same service to homeowners. They've set a goal of 75 flags for Thanksgiving Day

Can you imagine the impression the casual traveler got when he drove through Salem on Labor Day?

But never mind the out-of-towner. Imagine the pride of the businessmen in Salem. It's a capital idea, and there isn't any patent on it. We

hope it will be copied by Jaycees, or equally enterprising organizations in cities and towns across the country, and continue for so long as Old Glory flies.



While most snakes in the United States are not poisonous, approach all snakes with caution. Signs of a poisonous snake bite are: bleeding, how ever slight; burning pain (little or no pain with a coral snake bite); rapid swelling; nausea and vomiting (not always evi dent); rapid pulse; low blood pressure; and discoloration. The victim should rest quietly until a doctor arrives.

What is the proper technique? Simply this: apply the correct amount of fumigant in such a way as to obtain an even, uniform distribution over the surface of the grain.

First, level the surface of the grain. This allows access to the entire area and will allow an even distribution of fumigant.

Second, apply the furnigant as a coarse spray over the surface of the grain. Apply heavier in ercise with more than 100 ships areas where severe infestations are known to exist. 



#### Tailwater System Aids Record Sorghum Yield

Man can go for days without food, but man cannot go long without water.

When crops are irrigated, as the water flows down the rows, it picks up some top soil and a small amount of fertilizer, which will be in a suspended form.

J.B. Sudderth, who farms southwest of Bovina, has constructed a tail water pit, and uses a pipeline to return his tail water back to his surface irrigation system.

In the spring of 1967, Sudderth planted sorghum on the field that is irrigated by the tail water. He used a regular eight-inch spaced grain drill

The only irrigation water applied to this field came from the tail water reservoir. Sudderth said the run-off water had picked up some fertilizer and top soil, which he thinks helped his

When Sudderth harvested this field, he was very satisfied at his production because the yield was over 11,000 pounds of grain sorghum per acre. This field made more per acre than his

Sewing techniques used on leather - like fabrics are similar to those for vinyl and real leather, according to Dr. Graham Hard, Extension clothing specialist at Texas A&M University. Here are some important points to keep in mind when sewing leather-like fabrics:

Select a pattern with simple design lines. Raglan and kimono sleeves are easier than set

in sleeves. In cutting the fabric pin pattern in seam allowances only. Use sharp shears and cut accurately. To mark the pattern, use dressmakers carbon and a smooth edge tracing wheel

to mark from the wrong side. Stitch a test seam on the sewing machine before beginning. From this determine correct pressure and tension. It should be medium tension and light pressure. Dr. Hard recommends 8 to 12 stitches per inch for stitch length; a 14 size needle for medium weight fabrics

> Taper darts to a very fine point. The last three to four stitches should be on the fold. Don't backstitch.

# Scoring Mark Established As Tucumcari Falls, 65-0

The first team outscored the second team, 40-25, and this was the biggest contest at Chieftain Field last Friday, as Friona ran up a modern-day scoring record in a 65-0 romp over outclassed Tucumcari.

The Chieftains were dedicating a new scoreboard -- and they took the task seriously, scoring two touchdowns in the first and fourth quarters, and nailing down three scores in both the second and third periods.

Seven players shared in the scoring, as Friona made its season record 3-0. Halfback Tony Perea, who played barely half of the game, nevertheless racked up 214 yards rushing, which approached the 237 yards he got against Farwell in the opening game of the season,

Perea lit up the score portion of the new board for the first time by running 21 yards 3:35 deep in the game. Johnny Barker's kick made it 7-0, and the Chiefs were off to the races.

Two plays after the kickoff, Jim Schlenker intercepted a Tucumcari pass, and the Chieftains turned it into a score four plays later. On a fourth-down play, Kendrick rolled out around right end for eight yards and a TD, making the score 13-0 midway in the opening per-

Late in the period, Barker intercepted a Tucumcari pass and ran it 35 yards for an apparent touchdown, but a clipping penalty rubbed out the score.

Early in the second quarter, Friona got the ball at its 18 following a Rattler punt, and the Chieftains set sail. Barker gave the team a first down with a nine-yard scamper around

left end. Then Perea skirted right end and dashed 66 yards untouched, for his second touchdown of the game, and Friona led, 19-0.

Stout defensive play by James Weatherly and Joel Osborn again forced a punt, backing Tucumcari up to its two-yard line. The punt was returned to the visitors' 18-yard line, but it didn't stay there long.

On the first offensive play, quarterback Danny Kendrick passed to Danny Carthel, and Barker's kick made the score 25-0 with 3:31 left in the half. With the second team taking






