Bula Girls Regularly Correspond With German School Girl Pen Pals

What starter as a Christmas-time good will project has developed into a full-time hobby for five Bula girls, members of the Bula Homemaking department.

The girls, Jean Dane, Sandra Skinner, Betty Hallford, Janell Seagler and Sandra Spence have been rewarded 100 times fold for their part in a nationwide project of Future Homemakers, sending packages, letters to unfortunate families abroad. Today, the five girls have become regular correspondents with German girls about their own age.

Not only do they receive the distinction of getting letters from Germany, these girls are learning about the customs and ideas of the German people, and they are getting this learning in a way that will stick. Chances are, if it was brought a few weeks or months at the most. But getting

the information first hand, from people who are also deeply interested in our customs, gives it an interesting flavor that these five girls won't soon forget.

One of the letters received by Jean Dane was recently reprinted in the school paper, Bula Buzzline. It would be of special interest to the students since, written by a girl also in school, it concerned itself with points of interest on schools.

In describing a German school the writer points out: "In our school there are only girls from 6 to 16 years of age. School begins at the age six in Germany. When you are 11 you have to leave primary school and make a fresh beginning at a secondary school. There are different types of secondary school. In our school there is a secondary modern and secondary technical. One has pupils from 11-15 the other takes pupils 11-16. In our secondary technical we learn three languages. First of all, of course, German, because that is our language. And then English and French. Some teach Spanish. Also history and geography. In our school we have laboratories for chemistry and physics. Have you got the same?"

She continues, "In our class there are 30 pupils, only girls. We start at 8 in the morning and school finishes at 2 in the afternoon. So we have most of the afternoon to ourselves. Of course we have to do our homework.

Normally we have six periods. Mathematics and grammar are every day. Our school is a state school."

"Our school sports are in our school yard or on the sport ground. Every year at the end of the summer term we have a school sport. For girls these are only athletics: jumping and running. In winter we have our lessons in the gym. There we jump over hoses or we climb ropes. We are playing also handball. We play also hockey and tennis but not in state school.

A note of interest is the fact that it costs forty cents to send a letter from Hamburg, Germany.

Morton Among Cities of Texas Best Satisfied By New Law Courts

A Retail Merchants Association of Texas bulletin has advised that Morton is one of the state's top cities that have had success with the new small claims court law.

An estimated 25,000 small claims have been settled in Texas' newly created courts since their establishment only eight months ago, Mrs. Innis Stewart, local Retail Merchants manager was advised this week.

In Morton, Judge A. D. Forehand, Justice of the Peace Court, Pet. One, said the new law was effective in "about 50 per cent of the cases thus far." Asked how many cases had been settled, Forehand said that about 50-55 out of about 110 had been settled.

The small claims courts were authorized at the last regular session of the legislature to provide a speedy and inexpensive way for merchants and businessmen to collect past due accounts of \$50 and for workers to collect overdue wages or salaries of \$100 and under.

Mrs. Stewart said a survey by the Retail Merchants Association of Texas to determine how the new law was working showed that it was "overwhelmingly popular" in almost all towns — large, small and medium-sized.

The RMA survey showed that the new law had been well-received, particularly in Carthage, Morton, Luling, Galveston, Lubbock, Paris, Lufkin, Corsicana, Beaumont, Brownfield, Eldorado, Huntsville, Terrell, Big Lake, Waco, San Angelo, Gladewater, and many others too numerous to mention.

Among the larger cities, Dallas

has experienced excellent results with the new law. In two Dallas justice of the peace courts, which act as the small claims courts as in all other Texas cities, and towns, more than 1,000 cases were handled in each during the first several months after the law went into effect.

"One of the justices of the peace (Glenn W. Byrd, Precinct 1) has reported, "(The law) is working and working out fine for the people. It is a good law."

Mrs. Stewart said she had been advised by Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, sponsor of the small claims court legislation. That he was well satisfied with the success obtained in opening the courts to persons with small claims — whether he be employer or employee.

He quoted Rep. Carr as acknowledging that the legislation enacted had a few rough spots but pointed out that since this was a new type of law for Texas, this could be expected.

"Other states where small claims are working successfully had the same experience, and I anticipate offering adjusting amendments at the next regular session of the legislature to smooth out our law and to correct any hardships," Carr has written Mrs. Stewart.

The small claims courts, she said, were being used advantageously by both employers and employees. Texas Labor Commissioner M. B. Morgan has reported that the new law was providing a big help in settling wage disputes.

He said, "It has been very valuable to us; the law is getting good results in wage cases," the labor commissioner was quoted as saying.

Mrs. Stewart suggested that anyone desiring more information about small claims court procedure could write to the state headquarters of the Retail Merchants Association of Texas, Scarborough Building, Austin.

Mustang District, comprising troops in Hookley and Cochran Counties, includes Troop 40 of Sundown and Troops 125, 111, 109 and 24 in Levelland in addition to the local troops.

Local Farmers Invited to Examine New I-H Tractors

Local farmers can now see one of the two revolutionary new 4-Plow tractors recently introduced by International Harvester Co., at Banks-Ross Morton.

The new models contain a new tractor drive unit that instantly boosts pull-power up to 45 per cent on the go. Raymond Ross says.

The new models also contain a new power take-off that is completely independent of the forward motion of the tractor. When combined with the new torque amplifier drive operators can decrease or increase tractor speed without shifting gears and at the same time, keep the driven machine at uniform speed, it was reported.

The two new tractors are the Farmall Super M-TA and McCormick Super W6-TA. Both series include gasoline and Diesel engines. The Farmall series includes a high-clearance model.

The new torque amplifier tractor drive unit is a planetary gear speed-reduction unit between the engine clutch and regular transmission. It gives the big tractors an additional speed in each of their five forward and one reverse gears. This means that each tractor has 10 speeds forward and two in reverse.

Tomorrow, May 3rd, Deadline for Filing Names For Candidacy

One more candidate filed for office late Friday as W. G. McHam became a candidate for Constable of Pct. Four. He was the first opponent for H. C. Edwards who announced a few months ago.

A heavy slate of candidates in two races and virtually open slates in all of the other races face Cochran County voters next July as they attempt to select their county officers for another term of office.

Tomorrow, Monday, May 3, is the final day for candidates to have their name placed on the ballot. As of Friday, only in 3 races was there competition.

Heading the list is J. O. Gillham, State Representative from the 98th District, unopposed as he seeks a second term of office.

Travis Shelton running for his third consecutive term of office as of Friday had drawn no opposition.

In the County Judge's race, two men who have been opponents before, in one of the closest races on record in this county, will seek that office. Fred Stockdale seeks his third consecutive term of office. Glenn W. Thompson, former County Judge seeks his 3rd term of office. He relinquished his position in 1950 without asking for another term. Then in 1952 he was a candidate again and in the primary, a tie vote was recorded.

The hottest race will be in the Commissioner's race of Pct. One. No less than seven men have filed as candidates, including incumbent Jim Hill seeking his third term of office. Amos Taylor, E. B. (Earl) Wages, R. C. Strickland, Lem Chesher, Raymond Hoffman and M. R. Holloman all seek the position. Taylor is presently constable of Pct. One and owns an Auto Parts business; Wages is a veteran member of the Morton Volunteer Fire Department; Strickland is a former County Judge, present Fire Chief, and owns a cleaning business; Chesher is a local florist; Hoffman owns a welding shop and is a present member of the Morton School Board and Holloman is employed by the County and is a long-time resident of Morton.

G. C. Keith (Pet. Two); J. N. Foster (Pet. Three) and R. Z. (Sonny) Dewhirst (Pet. Four) were unopposed for their commissions as of Friday.

County and District Clerk Mrs. Lee Taylor is unopposed seeking

a second term; M. C. Ledbetter, County Attorney is unopposed; Hazel Hancock, Sheriff, seeking a second term is unopposed; Odell Smith, County Treasurer is unopposed; A. D. Forehand, Justice of the Peace, Pet. One is unopposed seeking a second term and H. C. Edwards seeks the constableness of Pct. Four.

For Constable Pet. One, a position now held by Amos Taylor, four men are seeking election to the post Taylor will automatically vacate. Cecil Lindsey, Sam Neville, J. H. (Hardy) Rhyne and H. L. Coon field in that order.

John Ben Shepperd Formally Files For Re-election As Atty. General

Texas Attorney General John Ben Shepperd formally filed for re-election to a second term recently, subject to action of the Democratic Primary.

In his announcement Shepperd pledged continuing war by his office on "crime, Communism and corruption."

"We feel our quick action in checking the drive by the Communist Party to take over key Texas ports and our fight in Duval County to uncover and halt the theft of public funds have both won approval of the people."

Shepperd, who was elected Attorney General in 1952 after serving two years as Secretary of State, is 38 years old and a native of Gladewater, Texas.

In his race for Attorney General two years ago, Shepperd received 80 per cent of the votes. In his home county Gregg and in Travis County where he now lives, he received more votes than had ever been cast for an Attorney General in the history of either county. As yet, he is unopposed for re-election.

During his first year in the Attorney General's office, Shepperd led important actions for the state such as defense of the Tidelands Act, made proposals to ease the Texas Drought Areas, and successfully blocked a Communist threat to Texas ports and oil industrial centers.

With Your... COUNTY AGENT

The annual Cochran County 4-H & FFA Fat Stock Show was held Saturday, April 24, 1954.

Considering the past three years as poor crop years, the exhibitors were very creditable. The way the buyers cooperated was second to none. It was all out, and the boys appreciated the way the business men really participated. I believe that every boy will be interested in reading the entire sales list, perhaps several times.

Many animals exhibited were not sold because they are breeding animals in the dairy and swine division.

There were thirty nine animals exhibited and sold. Twenty two of them were fat calves. These 39 animals brought \$6,711.17 as gross. This speaks well for the way the buyers put their heart and soul into this program to help the youth of this territory who are doing an excellent job in their demonstration and project work.

The Morton Chamber of Commerce really did themselves well. It's not hard to work for a group of public spirited folks like these. To give you a brief run down.

First, the Morton C. of C. provided the bedding for all animals for the show free of charge. It was baled sudan straw picked up near Lariat, Texas.

Second, all the buyers and the judges of the Fat Stock Show were fed a nice steak as the guests of the C. of C.

Third, the animals sold to the buyers living out of the county were transported to Lubbock, or where to be delivered free of cost to the buyer by the Morton C. of C. These items are important and should not be overlooked as it does improve the sale. The Chamber of Commerce deserves a big hand.

During the exhibit of the dairy calves and cows Saturday a.m., Dave Sherrill, County Agent, of Lubbock, doing the judging of dairy stock — made his placings. As soon as he announced the placings, James St. Clair of St. Clair Dept. Store, Morton, stepped up to the County Agent and said "here is where I'm putting my money — its on these dairy cattle." Tell that boy who took first place in the heifer calf class he gets \$25.00 from my store. The calf who took second place gets \$15 and the boy with the cow gets \$10. This total of \$50 donated by St. Clair's Dept. Store for the dairy breeds is significant because we need more dairy cattle developed in the county, advises County Agent Thompson.

Give Mr. St. Clair a hand, Billy Stovall owned the two calves exhibited by himself and Bobbie Neiman, and Charles Silhon was owner of the cow. These boys won \$77.50 in premium money on these three dairy animals, exhibited when they go to St. Clair Dept. Store and collect their \$50. May I say that there are other 4-H boys, who had good registered dairy animals and you should have brought them in. See what you missed, it would have paid you several times for the effort, besides the experience and fun you would have gained in showing them. Thompson said. We want all boys eligible to participate.

Last but not least, let's be proud of our local buyers and these boys are businessmen. No to recognize the "out of County" buyers who made purchases at the Cochran County Fat Stock Show. They are: Clyde Rail and Mr. Baxter, Clovis Cattle Commission Company, Clovis, N. M.; Ranchers and Farmer's Livestock Auction Co., Clovis, N. M.; and George Benson, Citizen's National Bank, Lubbock, Texas. Of course the local buyers you know are all listed on the sales list. The boys could not have a successful show without the men working behind the scene and on the firing line — to mention the sales committee, the livestock committee, the arrangement committee and the finance committee all come in for honorable mention.

Now, J. W. McDermott, H. S. Hawkins, the hard working never tiring bookkeepers, Gene Benham and Lem Chesshir. The American Legion Post No. 374, Morton, is to send checks of \$5 each to the boys exhibiting and won these awards. They are: Lowell Hatcher, best kept stall in beef cattle division. Ray Miller, best kept stall in hog division. Jimmy Wheeler, best showmanship in calf division and to James Ruthardt, best showmanship in hog and sheep division.

On Wednesday, April 28, at 8:00 p.m., F. Z. Beantlossom, poultry marketing specialist of Texas A. & M. College and Charles A. Hensarling, poultry production specialist, Texas, held an evening meeting at Whiteface High School Auditorium, Whiteface. This was a joint meeting with Hockley County and all the farmers who were interested in poultry production and marketing were urged to attend.

A good many of the farmers are now turning to poultry and more livestock production on their farms. It is seldom that we are able to get these two poultry specialists out here together but they showed slides and discussed questions from the audience.

All 4-H boys who are competing in 4-H Entomology Contest met in the County Agent's office Monday night, 8:00 p.m. on April 19 and 26th. These were the two final meetings before going to district at Lubbock, May 1st. A team of four boys was selected to make this trip to represent Cochran County in the district.

Cochran County will have a rifle team in this same meeting May 1st. They met at the Rifle Range Thursday, April 22, and again Wednesday, April 28, at 4:15 p.m. This team is composed of four boys and they were selected on their marksmanship.

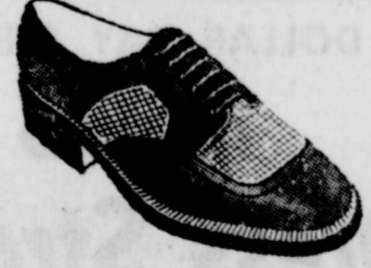
