MIDDLETON JUNIOR HIGH COACH

Approximately Nine Thousand In Repairs, New Equipment Slated For Morton Public Schools

The Morton School Board flashed the "go ahead" sign for what will total approximately \$9,000 in needed repairs to the school buildings in their meeting Monday night.

Alton Burleson of Higgenbotham-Bartlett Lumber Company to begin installation of new windows on the old Junior High school building as soon as possible.

Burleson met with the board and quoted figures on all steel windows, aluminum windows, and glass block windows to replace a total of 23 windows that have almost rotted out of the old building. The Board voted to proceed with the repairs on the west side of the building and indicated they would proceed with glass block windows.

They also voted to purchase 100 new desks to replace four hundred of antiquated desks that have been carved, broken and marked almost beyond repair.

With a \$9,000 expenditure facing them and only about \$10,000 in the building fund, they shelved previous proposals to build tennis courts.

In other action they hired Jim Middleton as Junior High School Coach; voted a \$150 bonus to all teachers not already above the minimum Gilmer-Akin base salary; hired Coach Buckley Walters for a six week period to take care of the watering of the football field; accepted the resignation of one teacher and voted to pay all bills.

They considered the hiring of a coach for Junior-High and High School but no action was taken.

Middleton was given the same amount of money above base rate as Walters had received as Junior High Coach. He is to work exclusively with Junior High students.

The \$150 bonus was in keeping with a policy set two years ago when all teachers were paid a bonus as an incentive to remain in Morton another year. Owens pointed out that the State Legislature had authorized a \$402 base pay raise of which \$100 had to be paid by local taxes.

Walters appeared before the board asking remuneration for weeks work he intends to put in rewatering the athletic field and watering it. He told the Board it would be a full time job for about six weeks and that he wanted to see that it was done right. He was hired effective June 21.

Father Dies At Fort Worth

Ray L. Showalter, Sr., resident of Hobbs, N. Mexico and father of Ray L. Showalter, Jr., of Whiteface died at the home of a daughter in Ft. Worth last Wednesday.

Showalter, a retired teacher, formerly taught at Lubbock and Hobbs. His son is on the faculty at Whiteface school. A charter member of the Hobbs Masonic Lodge, he was a member of the Hobbs First Methodist Church.

Slim Munson, Wife Thursday Victims Of Armed Robbers

WHITEFACE (Sp.) Area officers, with but a few clues to go by, were on the lookout for two armed robbers who held up a Whiteface Negro cafe owner, Thursday night and took about \$44.

The victims were Stanley (Slim) Munson and his wife, Willie Mae Munson, both of whom were at home in the rear of the store when the robbery took place at about 9 p.m.

The two intruders, both white men, with handkerchiefs over their faces pointed a shotgun at Munson and his wife, ordered them to get over to the other side of the room and then slugged Munson into unconsciousness when he didn't move fast enough. Munson has been bothered by a crippled leg for many years. He told officers one of the men hit straight in the face, one time, with his fist and knocked him out. His next physical wife thought the man who hit Munson had something in his hand.

The couple had closed the store and had retired to their house, right behind the store. They were in bed. The robbers entered the front of the house and carried off a single-barreled shotgun. They forced the couple to line up. Hit Munson took his pants which contained his billfold and he guessed about \$44. They also took with them a double-barreled shotgun belonging to Munson.

Munson, the proprietor of Blackstone Cafe, located on the highway in Whiteface, estimated the robbers to be "just about men" (20-25). His wife thought they might be a year or two younger.

Power Companies Rebuild Lines In Effort To Halt Breakdowns

Ordinarily a man doesn't apologize for an act of God.

But in this case it's different.

Earl Crum of Morton Power and Light this week thanked the people of Morton for being patient about a series of recent light failures due to lightning.

He apologized because, in a very few days he expects the danger of power failure to be minimized a great deal.

Seems that, of four recent power failures in Morton, three have been due to lightning striking an area of lines, east of town, on the Yarbrough farm after the third such incident, Southwestern Public Service officials, whose line was affected, and Crum representing Morton Power and Light which takes power in through the SWPS line got together to see what could be done.

First, they are rebuilding the entire stretch of line which has been affected.

Second they are insulating it with a cover designed to take the brunt of any future lightning charges.

They have moved in a portable unit for the time being and the new construction, with three crews working on it, should be completed in just a few days.

"If that doesn't work," Crum said, "we'll try something else. We just want the people of Morton to know we appreciate the fact that they've been so patient. We know it has been an inconvenience and we're doing everything we can to correct the source of difficulty. Again, thanks."

The Morton Chamber of Commerce, by unanimous vote of its Board of Directors, Monday passed a resolution urging all local businesses to observe Monday July 5th, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day as legal holidays the remainder of this year.

The July 5th date will be observed because the regular holiday falls on a Sunday.

In keeping with the policy of Chambers throughout the area,

the local C of C decided to set up a calendar of holidays to be observed.

Armistice Day, Nov. 11 th, will not be observed with the closing of business unless the local veterans' organizations ask for it. However, the Chamber has urged all businesses to cooperate with the veterans groups in whatever observances are planned for Armistice Day Labor Day will not be observed.

A four man membership committee was named to collect Chamber dues and solicit new members. Tve Williamson was named to head the committee. Also appointed to the committee were T. J. Simpson, Hume Russell and Earl Crum.

To Process 25 Million Cu Ft Daily

Cochran County's first gasoline plant, now under construction by Telspen Construction Co. of Houston, was announced as under construction in the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram last week.

In an article in Friday's paper, Emory E. Gose, Jr., president was quoted as saying the plant is designed to process 25,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily. It is to process gas from the west extension areas to the Lovelland-Slaughter and San Andres districts. Residue gas is to be sold to El Paso Gas Co.

The cost of the casinghead gasoline plant has been estimated at between \$5 million and \$7 million. Official constructors are Llano Grande Corp.

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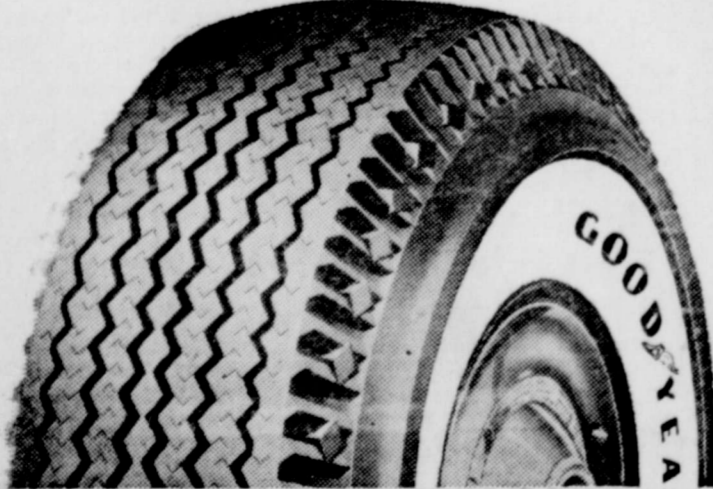

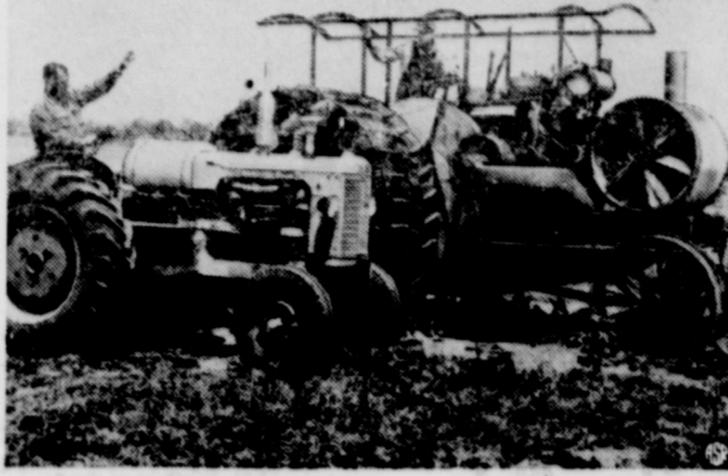

BLACKWELL, Okla.—Elliott Knapp (left), driving a sleek, 1954 model tractor with a powerful LP-Gas engine, waves as he passes his brother Lyman piloting a huge tractor of 1915 vintage. The Knapp brothers farm 600 acres and have an unusual collection of six antique tractors. The 1915 model had the first successful internal combustion tractor engine and could develop 40 horsepower. Kerosene fuel cost 12¢ a gallon and the average fuel cost was 60¢ an acre in 1915. In comparison, liquefied petroleum gas (butane-propane) now costs the Knapps 16¢ per acre or 74¢ less. They use three LP-Gas tractors that develop 48 horsepower and average 50 acres on 100 gallons of fuel.

Texans Enjoyed Greatest Income In State's History

Texans enjoyed the greatest dollar income in the state's history last year a report prepared for publication in the American Peoples Encyclopedia's 1954 Yearbook will disclose. Total income was estimated at \$12,442,000,000—about 20 per cent of which was derived from crude oil production.

At the same time, individual farmers and ranchers in certain parts of the state were hard hit by the third successive year of drought, it will be reported. The entire western three-fifths of the state was designated as a disaster area. Ttate and federal aid was concentrated on relief programs designed primarily to preserve foundation breeding herds of cattle, sheep and goats.

The American Peoples Yearbook will report that income from cattle sales in 1953 tumbled to \$326,658,000 from the boom high of 1951, when sales ran to about a half billion dollars. On the other hand, farm income, exclusive of livestock, was down only about 3 per cent to \$1,253,000,000.

An interesting aspect of the crop-drought situation reported in the yearbook was the fact that rains coming to the drought-seared backlands, resulted in the highest per-acre yields of cotton in the

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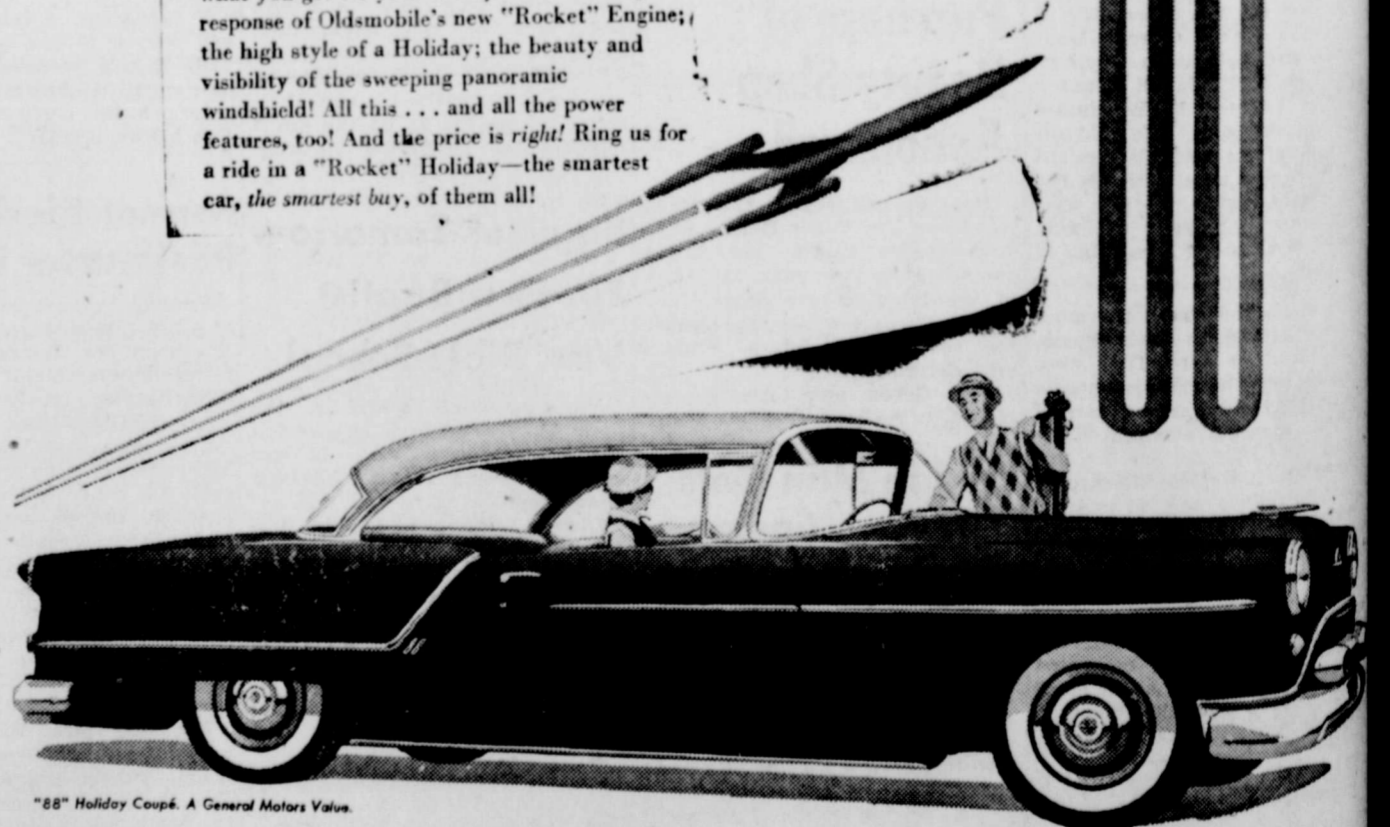

 Another aspect of the council's work will be to examine Texas' insurance laws and recommend changes "to assure a sound and stable insurance industry."
Yarborough's Charges
 Ralph W. Yarborough, candidate for governor, charged that there had been "influence peddling" in connection with the insurance situation. Yarborough recommended:
 "A complete investigation looking into retainers, bank accounts, expense accounts, income tax returns, and excessive personal expenditures of state government officials connected with insurance law administration in Texas."
Insurance News
 Nearly everybody got into the insurance show. These included: Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, who recommended 29 changes in the state insurance laws, including state control over insurance company stock sales.
 Chairman Garland A. Smith of the insurance commission, who denounced "blatant untruths and half-truths" in a Time Magazine article. Smith said the magazine was "joining with jealous big Eastern insurance companies in trying to smear the Texas insurance industry."
Good Business
 Dr. John R. Stockton of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research says that a trade decline is over and recovery has started.
 Business activity rose two percent from March to April in Texas, Dr. Stockton found, representing "a recovery of approximately half of the decline from January, 1963, and January, 1964."
 This finding indicates, Dr. Stockton said, "that the decline in business, which has been under way since the spring of 1963, is approaching an end."
Lots of Roads
 A construction program for 1965-1966, costing about \$211 million, was announced by the state highway commission.
 It was the largest program ever approved in Texas.
 Involved in the construction of 2,663 miles of roads, but said commission chairman E. H. Thornton Jr., "it can only eliminate a minor percent of the critical deficiencies of the (highway) system."
 About \$43 million of the money will go for highways within cities. Thirty of the worst bridges will be repaired or replaced.
Political Scene
 State political campaigns opened up, with principal interest in the governor's race.
 There, the contenders are incumbent Allan Shivers; Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney; and J. J. Holmes, Austin contractor. Yarborough opened up with a speech in which he talked about

"the need for integrity in state government and a sound program of Texas."
 Meanwhile, Austin political observers heard reports from the Rio Grande Valley that national CIO leaders are going all-out in an attempt to defeat Shivers. These reports said that the CIO has put up \$250,000 to finance Yarborough and already has 300 paid workers in the field campaigning against Shivers.
 Holmes, who is beginning to step up his pace in the race, says "I'm not mad at anybody. I just want to be Governor of Texas."
Shivers' Race
 Shivers, returning from Korea, said that the thing for Texans to do is to keep our government at home and turn it over to outsiders.
 At a press conference, the governor said he expected some opposition from Democrats who supported Adlai Stevenson last time.
 Shivers pointed out that he led the fight for Eisenhower because the Republican nominee saw eye-to-eye with him on the tidelands issue, whereas Stevenson thought the tidelands ought to belong to the federal government.
 Since the return of the tidelands to Texas a year ago, Shivers said, this state has collected from them about \$32 million in mineral rights, and this money goes to the state school fund.

Lieutenant Governor
 Opposing Ben Ramsey for lieutenant governor were State Representative George T. Hinson of Mincoola and C. T. Johnson, Austin business man.
 Hinson announced in favor of legislation which would require lobbyists to register with the state and force lawmakers to file a list of all the sources and the amount of their income.
 Johnson pugged what he termed the need for "new men" to strengthen insurance laws for the protection of policyholders. Said Johnson:

"It's interesting to see those who have been in a position for years and years to clean up the insurance mess suddenly get stirred up about it."
Brewster Starts
 Campaigning for the re-election of Few Brewster, associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court, began with the appointment of Franklin Spears of San Antonio campaign manager.
 William B. Carrasow, Austin lawyer, heads up a statewide campaign committee. Brewster is opposed by Robert B. Keenan of Glade-water and Alfred M. Scott of Austin.
Civil Appeals
 I. N. Williams retired as associate of the Texarkana Court of Civil Appeals, and his place is being sought by Otto H. Atchley and Mat Davis.
 Fourteen other judges on Texas civil appeals courts, up for re-election, are unopposed.
Executive Sessions
 State executive committees of both the Democratic and Republi-

can parties will meet here June 14 to prepare the July 24 first primary ballot and select sites for the September state conventions.
 Republicans will choose a state chairman to succeed Allvin Lane, who resigned. George Sandlin of Austin has been chosen Democratic chairman, replacing Wallace Savage.
