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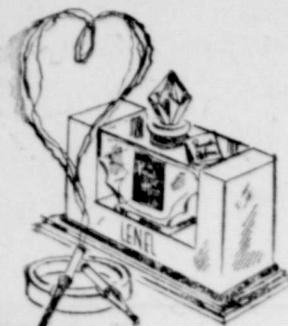

There has been a good many questions in regard to controlling grasshoppers. If you spray or dust use the following mixtures per acre. For dust mixtures of insecticides use 3-5-40 mixture, or 2 1/2 per cent dieldrin, 40 per cent sulphur or 20 per cent toxaphene, 30 per cent sulphur or 2 1/2 per cent Aldrin, 40 per cent sulphur or 10 per cent chlordane and 4 per cent sulphur, or 5 per cent DDT and 40 per cent sulphur.

For spray mixtures use the following per acre.

Heptachlor, 1/2 to 3/4 pound
Dieldrin, 1/8 to 1/4 lb BHC, 5 to 6 pound Aldrin, 1/8 to 1/4 pound
Toxaphene, 1 1/2 to 3 pounds
Chlordane, 1 1/2 to 3 pounds.

For poison baits use the following:

Formula: Coarse wheat bran, 25 lbs. Paris green or white arsenic, 1 pound; High grade amyl acetate (avoid cheap grades of banana oil or bronzing liquids), 1 ounce; Cane or sorghum molasses (avoid corn syrup), 2 quarts; and water sufficient to make moist mash as explained below. Mix bran and poison together thoroughly. Dilute the amyl acetate and molasses and molasses in about two gallons of water. Pour this liquid over the mixture of poison and bran until every particle is moist. Then make further additions of water and mix thoroughly until a mash is obtained that is quite moist, yet so it will fall apart after being tightly squeezed, and so may readily be sown broadcast.

This quantity of mash should be broadcast so as to cover about five acres. A good practice is to mix at night and sow early in

the morning before nine o'clock, since the hoppers do not actively feed until the dew dries. If it is desired to kill hoppers in grass land, sow the entire acreage to be protected. Where they are migrating from fence rows or pastures into cultivated crops, sow the fence row on a fairly broad margin of the pasture, and also a broad margin of the cultivated crop with the mixture.

Amyl acetate is preferable in the formula but if it cannot be obtained, substitute six lemons for one ounce of the amyl acetate. This should be diluted with water as with the other substance, but one should use both juice and rinds, grinding the latter in a fine food chopper.

Do not place the mast in piles. Do not use lead arsenate. Do not use Paris green or white arsenic. Do not use cheap banana oil or bronzing liquids.

Where sawdust is used, the formula is: Mill-iron feed, 25 lbs., sawdust, 75 lbs., Whitearsenic or Paris green, 4 lbs., and water as in the other formula.

Using Wheat Bran - Sawdust formula: 100 lbs. wheat bran OR 50 lbs. wheat bran and 50 lbs. sawdust; Sodium arsenite (4 lb material) 1/2 gallon; (or twobls. of the dry form).

In the standard bran formula the sodium arsenite is to be used in this same amount per 100 lbs. of coarse bran.

The recommended formula for baits prepared with cottonseed hulls should contain: 50 lbs. bran, 50 lbs. cottonseed hulls, and 4 lbs. Sodium fluosulfate. Thoroughly mixed in their dry state and then moistened the same as when preparing baits with sawdust.

HOG LICE - Hog lice can be easily controlled. This parasite irritates the hog, slows rate of gain, and in turn raises the producers feed bill.

Control hog lice with DDT, chlordane, toxaphene or methoxychlor sprays all at 5 per cent concentration - or with .06 per cent lindane or gamma BHC or Gamma gives best results. Do not spray sows with suckling pigs with any of these insecticides.

EGG PRODUCTION

High temperatures or low humidity are two of the worst enemies of egg quality. Here are a few tips for top egg quality: Keep the eggs clean. Use clean, dry nesting materials and keep the birds confined on wet days to avoid mud-tracked nests.

Gather the eggs two or three times a day in a wire basket. This allows air to circulate, quickly carrying off the heat. Store the eggs in a cool, humid, but well ventilated place. And

market regularly and often.

Grade AA eggs will become inedible in three days at 98 degrees, in eight days at 77 degrees and 45 days at 44 degrees. Eggs usually will remain Grade A for six months if held just above freezing.

Control of Flies - Flies are getting worse and here are three tips that can be put into effect. Sanitation is the most important - then with the use of insecticides will control flies. It is work, but the job can be done. The three things are:

(1) Haul manure, trash, and rotting plant refuse to field, spread out where it can dry.

Clean up around livestock feed bunks. Scrape feed lots to the concrete in paved lots and to the fresh earth if unpaved.

Keep a clean up campaign going the year-round. Randolph advises, "Many farmers do a good job of removing the obvious breeding places, but they miss other important 'hot-spots' Some of these are the corners of barn gutters, spilled feeds and other small accumulations of organic matter that may begin to decay.

This together with insecticides, properly applied, will pave the way toward a neater, better-appearing farmstead and relief from the annoyance and health-hazard of flies.

HARDWARE DISEASE

Farmers are advised to take care when chopped hay or silage is prepared to be sure pieces of metal are not mixed with the feed. Baling wire is perhaps the most common offender and is often found in the stomachs of animals, says Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian.

All loose nails in feed bunks and mangers should be removed or driven in. In no case should animals be allowed in junk piles and scrap heaps where such items are readily found.

If cattle are provided the proper minerals, Dr. Patterson suggests that it will prevent them from licking and chewing posts and other objects.

Actually, hardware disease is not a disease at all. It is merely the ingestion of foreign bodies by cows, resulting in the penetration of these objects into the stomach walls or into other organs such as heart and liver.

Cows, mature animals especially, have a habit of licking and consequently swallowing objects, such as nails, pieces of galvanized wire, glass and other metal objects. These pieces enter the stomach where they are churned about by the stomach walls. Here they become imbedded or even forced through the stomach.

Although symptoms vary from animal to animal, cows that go off-feed, are reluctant to move or move stiffly, exhibit diarrhea and show pain when suddenly should be suspected of the "disease."

Dr. Patterson says that in some animals the symptoms may come and go while in others it may become progressively worse. These also are symptoms of other diseases thus making diagnosis difficult.

INFORMATION FOR 4-H CLUB BOYS ENTERING COTTON CONTEST
If you are entering the county and District 2 4-H Extension Cotton Contest, and I hope that you are, here are some things you should know. Note some action on your part is necessary in the near future.
Is your cotton planted and up? If so, make a rough sketch of your farm, then designate your five acres or more of your cotton plot. Show by drawing in your plot on the farm sketch. Do this by July 1. Mail this to my office—Don't forget. It must be designated by July 1.
Other things you should do are:
1. Tell where your farm is located from some known landmark.
2. Give name of cotton variety in contest.
3. Stake off your plots - so measuring crew can find these stakes.
4. Advise whether cotton is dry land or irrigated.
5. Have a check plot of some size, if possible, or your Dad's cotton. Gather cotton from your plot and check plot separately to determine yield differential if any. This is called a result demonstration.
6. Get cotton record book from my office and keep accurate records. We shall show you how simple it is to keep these records.
7. When cotton is ginned from your plot be sure to secure gin tickets as part of your record.
If you have other questions, please come in my office or write. If I am not in office be sure to see Mrs. Hudson as she will be glad to help you.
New grasshopper poison for baits to spread out in fields or grass lands is also recommended for control of grasshoppers using the guide for controlling insects for 1954 in Texas besides the dust and sprays given for airplane or ground machines, some of the poisons can be used as baits.
For baits - use wheat bran 100% or a mixture of sawdust or cottonseed hulls. Use one-third or one-half mixture of the sawdust or hulls, or both with wheat bran.
For each 100 pounds of the mixture, use one-fourth pound of dieldrin mixed first in 2 to 4 gallons of water and mix with 100 pounds of the dry matter.
Aldrin can also be used in the same proportion. These are two new poisons recently recommended by Bob Berger, Dist. Extension Service Entomologist. These should be purchased in the emulsifiable form or liquid form - when mixed with water for bait poison.
HOUSE FLIES
This is again mentioned for your use and control of house flies.
The most successful housefly control tried recently is the new malathion insecticide used as residual spray in all buildings except the milking room and milk house. Texas A. & M. College herd notes indicate that the College is still getting excellent control in nearly two weeks after spraying with the following mixture. One gallon of malathion emulsifiable concentrate (containing 5 pounds malathion per gallon), 6 quarts of corn syrup and 50 gallons of water. Six pounds of sugar can be used to replace the syrup.
Care was taken to prevent getting excessive quantities on animals or their feed. Methoxychlor sprays prepared from wettable powders is still being used successfully to control biting flies and lice on cattle.
TRACTOR PROGRAM REACHES 4-H GROUP
1954 marks the completion of 10 years of progress for the 4-H Tractor program. It started in four states in 1944 - until it has reached all states in 1954. The enrollment in tractor maintenance in 1944 totaled 11,466 - last year (1953) it totaled 67,171. Over 35,000 boys have completed this course in the last 10 years. That is they have learned to operate tractors efficiently and safely. Over 24,000 local volunteer leaders have been responsible for the success of this program.
The new system of awards for the 4-H Tractor Program has been announced.
