C. W. Word Re-elected

The first Republican primary election in Cochran County since 1934 developed one of the closest races in the county last Saturday as C. W. Word, incumbent Republican County Chairman, got the nod over C. L. Whiteface of Whiteface who was a write-in candidate.

Word pulled a 5-1 majority in the runoff election. He was elected to a second term for two years.

The second game tonight (Thursday) opens the third round of play. Pipeline squaring off against Maple. The all-star game will be held next Tuesday night.

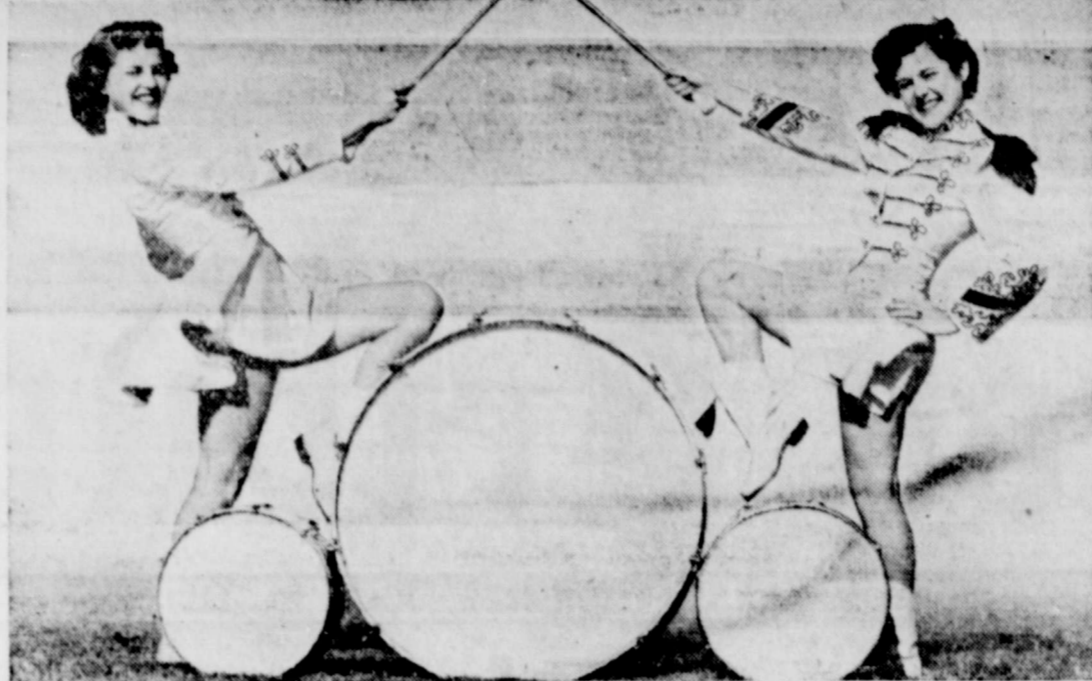

Stars of Famous Grand Ole Opera At S-P Fair

LUBBOCK, July (Special)—Many of the stars of the nationally famous Grand Ole Opry will be featured performers at this fall's Panhandle South Plains Fair, officials have announced.

Heading the list of top Western entertainers will be Webb Pierce, 28-year-old vocalist-composer who has been acclaimed the nation's Top Folk Singer for 1952 and 1953 by Farm and Ranch Magazine. In the past 18 months he has sold over four million records in more than a dozen great country-music hits. Most of these records have achieved the Number One position in all the nation's music score-boards.

The singer's first top hit was "Wondering." This has been followed by such songs as "That Heart Belongs To Me," "So Used To Loving You," "Don't Throw Your Life Away," "It's Been So Long," "Slowly," and his present release "Even Tho'." Sparkling Brown Eyes.

Pierce and the other talent from the Grand Ole Opry will appear twice daily at the new 5,500-seat Fair Park Coliseum which is being constructed at the regional fair grounds. The walls of the huge building have already been erected and the structure will be completed in time for the fair Sept. 27 through Oct. 2.

This will mark the first time an indoor show such as the Grand Ole Opry has been presented at the fair and officials are looking forward to a record-breaking

attendance throughout the week. In addition to the new Coliseum, fair patrons will have the opportunity to see some of the best displays arranged in two other new buildings—a new women's building and a new agriculture building. Construction is progressing rapidly on both of these structures.

FORT HOOD, —Lubbock and South Plains Army reservists, attending two weeks of annual unit training here, were tired and "worn out" Friday afternoon after spending more than 24 hours in the field on bivouac and range firing.

Stockdale Says

TO THE PEOPLE OF COCHRAN COUNTY:

First I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the fine vote of confidence you gave me in the Democratic Primary July 24th. The good majority by which I won makes me feel humble indeed, and you may be sure that I will use my best efforts at all times to serve all the people fairly and impartially.

On Friday morning before the election a certain letter was sent to the voters of the county through the U. S. Mail reflecting upon my integrity, and ability as a lawyer in presiding over the commissioners' court. The letters were unsigned, but did indicate they were written by "Interested tax payers of Cochran County." I do not know the source and it makes little difference, but this being the first opportunity to reply: even though the election is over, I feel that I should do so in fairness to my friends as well as to myself.

The main criticism leveled at me was that I had advised the commissioners' court with reference to the law applying to a certain contract and agreement with the City of Whiteface for fire protection in the rural areas. Included with the letter was a copy of Article 2351a-1 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, which is the law under which commissioners' courts are authorized to furnish rural fire protection. This law, which was passed by the 47th Legislature in 1941, was correctly printed on the separate sheet enclosed with the letter. If you still have your copy of Article 2351a-1 you will notice that the law is composed of two parts or methods by which counties may furnish fire protection. Part No. 1 authorizes counties to purchase fire fighting equipment after calling a county wide election for that purpose, and the election having carried by a majority vote of the property owning taxpayers and qualified voters. Then advertising for bids on the fire trucks and other fire fighting equipment to be purchased by the county and to be used throughout the county for this purpose. But, part No. 2 of Article 2351a-1 authorizes the Commissioners' Court to enter into contracts with any city, town or village within the county and or adjoining counties, upon such terms and conditions as shall be agreed upon between the commissioners' court and the governing body of such city, town, or village for the use of fire trucks and fire fighting equipment for rural fire protection. This plan relieves the county from the responsibility and expense of purchasing and maintaining fire trucks and equipment in all parts of the county.

This plan was followed by our neighboring Haskell County about two years ago for the areas surrounding Sundown, Ropesville and Anton. This is done by the county agreeing to pay a sum sufficient for the city to purchase the fire truck, and the city agrees to equip the truck, maintain the truck and equipment, furnish a trained volunteer fire department of at least twenty men, and assume full responsibility for fighting all rural fire in the surrounding area. The title to the truck and all equipment is in the name of the contracting city.

Before the commissioners' court considered this matter during the month of February of this year, although the law is very clear of an abundance of precaution I requested an opinion from the office of the Attorney General of Texas on the construction of this statute. Immediately I received the latest opinion, which was written during the administration of Price Daniel, from the Honorable J. C. Davis, Jr., head of the County Affairs Division, who still holds this same position under Attorney General John Ben Sheppard. From this opinion, which has been on file in the office of the County Attorney and myself as County Judge since February 1964, I quote:

The purpose of Article 2351a-1, V. C. S., is to give fire protection to property lying outside the corporate limits of cities and towns within the county. In order to accomplish this purpose, Article 2351a-1 authorizes the commissioners' court to enter into a contract with any particular city whereby the county will pay a certain sum of money and the city will furnish fire protection to the people living outside such city limits. Such a contract could not be required to let under competitive bids as provided under Article 2368a, because such a requirement would destroy

the right of the commissioners' court to contract with any particular city and would limit its power to contract to those cities which were the successful bidders. To hold that competitive bids are necessary would thwart the very purpose for which Article 2351a-1 was passed, because the successful bidder might be a city far removed from the area which is to receive the protection under the contract. It is our opinion, therefore, that such contracts made in pursuance to Article 2351a-1 are not within the contemplation of Article 2368a.

SUMMARY

"A county-wide election is not required under the provisions of Article 2351a-1, V. C. S., before the Commissioners' court is authorized to make a contract with cities whereby the county agrees to pay a sum of money to cities upon the condition that the cities will give fire protection to the adjacent territory outside the corporate limits of such cities. Such contracts are not required to be let under competitive bids.

After receiving the above opinion from the Attorney General I did advise the Commissioners' court that the procedure was lawful. For some unknown reason this was not mentioned in the letter addressed to the voters and mailed out on Friday, July 23rd, the day before the election. The Commissioners' court voted on this matter. Three voted in favor and one voted against. Therefore, your County Judge did not vote.

The campaign letter referred to also bitterly attacked the truthfulness of my friends who published an ad in the Morton Tribune that week in my behalf. The ad pointed out that the Gilmer Akin school bill had gone into effect during my administration and that it required long hours of work and study. The letter stated that the Gilmer Akin bill went into effect for the 1949-1950 school term instead of the 1950-1951 term. Again, let us see what the facts are. The new school law known as the Gilmer Akin bill and the Foundation School Program was passed by the 51st Legislature, Regular Session, 1949. I have the entire session laws in my office and shall be glad for anyone interested to come by and read them. The session adjourned on June 8, 1949, and a part of the school law did not go into effect until 90 days after adjournment. At any rate, the principal school bill provided for an entire new State School Board to

be elected. One member from each congressional district, or a total of 21 members, who were elected at the regular primary and general election in 1950. The law provided that the then State Superintendent of Public Instruction should hold his office until December 31, 1950, and that the State Board should appoint a State Commissioner of Education. Therefore, it required more than one year to really get the machinery of the Gilmer Akin bill working. Only a very small part of the program could be started during the 1949-1950 school term because of the necessary conflicts with school procedures then in effect. You can readily see that my friends did publish the truth, and for their courage and faith in my ability: I am truly grateful. I might say that this new school law has placed a tremendous burden on all district superintendents and teachers, as well as County Superintendents. For this reason I wish to urge all school patrons to give your earnest cooperation to the local schools, school boards, administrative officers, and teachers. They have an all important mission to perform, and that is the preparation of our youth will make our county and our country a better place in which to live. In truth and enlightenment there is strength. Again, please accept my sincere thanks for your vote of confidence, and I hope we can all work together for a better Cochran County. The doors of my office will always

be open to serve you during my administration. Please come to see us often, and your suggestions as to any county business will be appreciated.

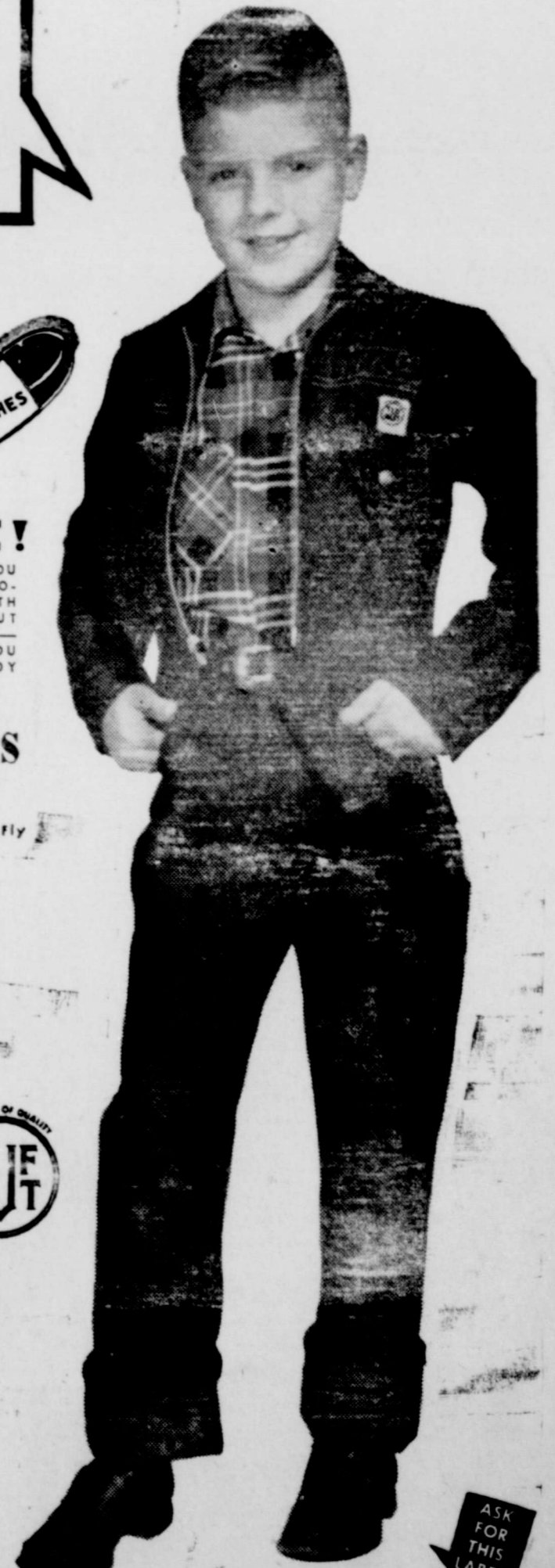

Not Just Idle Words

The constant chant of Soil Conservation experts around this area, especially those in Cochran County, is "Stop Wind Erosion."
 After several years of asking pleading and even begging farmers to take care of their land because the future of the county may be at stake, now the Conservationists are making their pleas a little stronger each year.
 Not that the pleas are going unheeded. Many farmers are taking full advantage of the information and services being made available to them and are doing something about the problem. However, because we are now in the midst of our fourth consecutive dry year, something more must be done. Wind erosion, in four consecutive springs and summers of heavy dry winds has rendered much of the County's land almost incapable of producing top crops. Constant planting of cash crops has robbed the land of vital soil building qualities.
 The Soil Conservation district is carrying on a constant campaign to educate farmers to the need to awaken them to the seriousness of the problem.

"A cover of growing crops or a heavy crop stubble is needed," they tell us "Whatever you do, land must be protected with a growing crop or crop residues. Without a crop or stubble land chiseling or listing is a vital necessity."
 You, as a land owner or lessee owe it to the future of the county and for the future of your family, to take care of your land. Check with the Cochran Soil Conservation District office today, in the Community building in Morton, and let them tell you what should be done immediately.
