## Color Guard Makes Plans For Washington Trip; Seek National American Legion Championship

Ten members of the Morton Legion Color guard, Texas State Champions for two consecutive years, their business manager and wives of several members of the guard will leave by auto for Washington, D. C. Tuesday, August 24th to enter national color guard competition.

Still lacking about \$200 of having enough money to complete the trip, the guard made plans for the second straight year of national competition, at their weekly meeting last Thursday night.

The Morton guard will toe the competition line, Sunday August 29th and then, on the 31st, they will lead a stable Texas delegation in the huge annual parade which will march through the heart of Washington.

Other state units which will ride in the parade are the Dallas Post and the New Braunfels band and the Brownsville Drum and Bugle Corps, perennial state champions in that bracket.

The trip for most of the members of the local guard will last 11 days.

Hired, subject to assignment are Mrs. Wayne Akke, who taught at Bula last year but has been a resident of Morton for several years; Mrs. Gerome Holloway, to teach in the junior high and Ruby Kempson of Brownfield, a sister of J. B. Kempson, member of the high school faculty.

C. Pointer, a graduate of E. N. M. U. was hired as assistant coach and assumes, among his duties, coaching of the girls' basketball team. Sammy Malone, boy's basketball coach had resigned recently.

## School Budget Drawn Up Report Calls For Expenditures Of \$10,000 More Than Income

The proposed budget for the 1954-55 school year calls for a total expenditure of approximately \$10,000 more than will be received by the school district according to a report prepared by Supt. H. A. Owens.

The budget for the Morton Independent School District shows a total expenditure in excess of \$241,400. However, close examination of the report shows several instances where an increase in revenue and a decrease in expenses are likely. According to business manager R. H. McCasland, about \$2,500 will be saved in school bus expenditure.

The major item under administrative costs is a \$9,264 total to be granted teachers in bonuses. The Morton District pays each teacher a \$150 bonus at the end of the school year and 43 are eligible to receive this compensation for services rendered. In addition the 43 teachers will get the \$402 pay raise established by the state legislature and voted by the local Board. Of that \$402, the state will pay 80 percent. The local district will have to pay the additional 20 percent. However, on seven local teachers, including coaches, band directors, superintendents, principals, etc. the local district will pay the entire \$402 bonus since the state is to pay only to those who are not already making more than the schedule

## St. Clair's Passes 20th Anniversary

Two of Morton's oldest business establishments, St. Clair's Department Store and St. Clair's Ben Franklin Store, begin their 20th anniversary celebration Friday.

The firms' youth partly indicates the newest of what is termed "Texas' Last Frontier."

They are owned by James St. Clair, well-known area farmer, merchant and banker, who's better known hereabouts as "James."

The department store is managed by Lloyd Hiner. The Ben Franklin Store is under the management of Paul Goodman.

The modern merchandise you'll find in the firms today is a far cry from the stock St. Clair displayed that August 12, 1934 — and though some folks term these "non-booming times," they should have the opportunity to talk to a man who started his business during the bleak '30's.

"Why a dress that sold for 25c then," says St. Clair, "now brings 1.98; work shoes that were offered for 1.98 go at 4.98 now; and chambray shirts that were advertised at 79c, bring 1.98 today."

Times have changed, and St. Clair has always been among the first to meet the challenge.

Though he loves nothing better than to pass the time of day with oldtimers and area farmers, St. Clair is not one to retain the past.

In his stores today you'll find such famous names as Stetson hats, Smith Brothers work clothes, Van Husen dress shirts, Hanes underwear, Peters shoes, KC boy's wear, Betty Rose coats and suits, Miss Virginia, Osgood, Park Lane, British Lady and Cinderella dresses, Paramount and Higgins slacks for men, Ship 'n Shore blouses, Berkshire hose, Russell Newman lingerie, Hi-A and Best Form foundations, Wranglers and, of course, Levi Jeans.

And only recently, under the direction of Goodman, the Ben Franklin store became a serve-yourself firm — moving forward with the times.

A family man, St. Clair is obviously proud of his children: Jimmy, 11; Sandra Kay, 9; Mary Lois, 7; and John Roberts, 5.

He and Mrs. St. Clair are members of the Morton First Baptist Church where he is president of the men's class.

Active in civic work, St. Clair has served on the City Commission, on the School Board at two different times, presiding during his last term. He's a Lion, a Schriener, and

Bob Cross, at the local FHA office announced this week the new regulations under which Cochran County has been approved as a drought emergency county.

Cross explained that farmers and ranchers who are in distress and need emergency feed can secure help, however, no protein foods.

The emergency program includes baled hay or grain such as corn, oats, barley and grain sorghum. The hay savings is one half the freight rate up to \$10 per ton. A farmer must pay the cost of the hay plus half the freight.

The grain program is different. The farmer can purchase these grains mentioned above in 60 days supply for his basic foundation herd. This does not include hogs. It does include cattle, sheep and goats. The cost of the grain will be market price, less 60c per hundred, which is paid by the government.

Any qualified dealer who has the grain can supply the farmer or the rancher in quantities approved by the FHA Committee.

Mixed feeds may be obtained with protein in it from the dealers if available but the government will only stand the loss of 60c per 100 of the grain value in the mixture.

To make application please come to the County Farmer's Home Administration office. The application forms are now available. When application has been approved by the FHA the original copy will be forwarded to the local ASC office for payment of this subsidy.

Two more "Last Frontier" residents have been admitted to the Plainview Polio clinic, one from Morton and one from Pop.

Latest to be taken to Plainview were Royce Wayne Brooks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Brooks of Morton. Royce will be three years old in November. His father is employed at Weekes Gin.

The other is Herbert Stanley Funk of Pop admitted August 8. Both are reported to have a "mild case." No paralysis was reported.

Young "Sparky" Wallace was reported better, late last week, still being cared for in an iron lung, and still almost completely paralyzed.

Glenn W. Thompson, County March of Dimes chairman said this week that there is a balance of \$1835 left in the County polio fund. However he expects the total to be wiped out by remaining county patients at Plainview. In the six cases reported from this County, only one patient had insurance.

## Indians Start Week's Uninterrupted Training Monday Morning Aug. 22

A week of non-interrupted football training, the best opportunity offered local gridgers in several years to get started on the right foot, awaits Morton High School boys who are willing to work at the job beginning next Monday.

Bucky Walters, new head coach, announced that all boys who want to play football this year and are in earnest about the job, are to report to the High School gymnasium Monday at 8 a.m. with bedding and all toilet articles and clothes changes they'll need for one week.

Equipment will be issued as soon as the boys arrive and they will be expected to stay there, in a group for the remainder of the week.

They will eat in the school cafeteria and bed down in the gymnasium. They'll work out twice daily, a period of about two hours each session. They'll get up at the same time and go to bed at the same time.

**NOT IN THE BIBLE**

We beg of you, ask your preacher where he finds these in the Bible as it applies to you and I in this dispensation. Remember if it is not in words plain enough for you to understand, he is gambling with your soul and his.

**POURING OR SPRINKLING:** The apostle Paul, the church at Rome, Italy, (the one we read about in the Bible) the church at Colosse Christ, the eunuch and all other Christians we read about in the Bible were BURIED in water baptism (Rom. 6:4; Col. 2:12; Acts 8:38; Mat. 3:16).
