Local Baptists Will Attend Sept. 8 Associational Conference, Levelland

Morton Baptists, along with Baptists from other cities in the Cochran Baptist Association, will attend the annual associational conference at the First Baptist Church in Levelland on Wednesday evening, September 8.

Rev. R. Elmer Dunham, Dallas, rural and city missions superintendent, Baptist General Convention of Texas, will serve as team captain and be in charge of the conference. He will be introduced by Rev. Ernest Stewart, Jr., of Whiteface, stewardship chairman for the association.

Dr. L. D. Ball, Albuquerque, evangelism superintendent for New Mexico Baptists, will be the evangelism speaker; and Dr. Howard C. Bennett, pastor First Baptist Church, Kilgore, will discuss stewardship. T. H. Huffstutler, minister of music-education, Beverly Hills Baptist Church, Dallas, will be in charge of music.

The closing prayer will be given by Rev. Ollie S. Robinson of Morton, associational evangelism chairman. Rev. J. H. Wright will serve as host pastor.

The evangelism-stewardship conference is one of 122 scheduled during August and September for members of the 3,512 Baptist General Convention of Texas churches and is a part of the Southern Baptist Convention's fall program. This is the first year that evangelism and stewardship have been combined in an annual emphasis.

During the conferences, plans and materials for the churches' fall observance of "Harvest Week" will be presented to pastors and other church leaders. "Harvest Week" will be held October 31, November 7 previous to the churches' adopting their annual budgets for 1955. An evangelism-stewardship book, "These Go Together," will be taught, and evangelistic services will be held in the churches during the week of special emphasis.

Available for use of the churches through their district missionaries will be a color movie, "These Go Together," written and produced by the Convention's Public Relations Department and a color slide series, "Blocks for Building Better Budgets." The script for the slide series is narrated by Dr. L. E. Cobb of Dallas, stewardship promotion for Texas Baptists.

Last year Texas Baptists gave \$55,596,966 to their churches with more than \$7,990,000 being given to world missions. They baptized more than 60,000.

COUNTY'S SECOND FATALITY

Leon Racker, Levelland Is Dead Following Accident At Bledsoe

Cochran County has posted its second traffic fatality of 1954. A 22-year-old Levelland man, Leon Racker died at the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, early Thursday morning after an emergency operation required because of an accident in which he had been involved, failed to save his life.

The man received the fatal head injuries when his light 1953 Ford Sedan missed a curve at Bledsoe at 1:20 a.m. Tuesday morning and turned over. The Ford had inside it a 1954 Cadillac engine and evidently was traveling too fast to be controlled on the sharp curve.

The death of Racker was the first of a person in an automobile in Cochran County this year. One other death at Whiteface was recorded last Spring when a man either asleep or passed out on the highway was run over.

But Friday, in Morton complications were growing out of the case. The car did not belong to Racker. The owner told local law enforcement officers that Racker did not have permission to use the car. The owner, a Brownfield man, formerly convicted of unlawful

sale of liquor, had a radio receiver in the car similar to that used by law enforcement men. It was capable of monitoring local police radio circuits. Law enforcement officers were holding up the man's attempts to get the radio and were continuing to investigate the case.

Racker had in his possession two receipts showing where he purchased in the neighborhood of 700 worth of liquor one each of two occasions, Hancock said.

The car overturned on Farm Road 769 at Bledsoe, rolled over and woke nearly everyone in Bledsoe. Racker's companion in the car, a 28-year-old woman, Lucy Stewart of Post was less seriously injured and was in the Cochran County Hospital.

Dan Valentine, Whiteface Community farmer, purchased 240 geese at 6 weeks of age June 1, 1954. He paid \$1.55 each for the geese from a firm in New Mexico. The geese were purchased June 1, 1954. The firm will buy these geese back anytime now, for 20 to 25 cents per pound, Dan advises.
Now what did he do with these

plained. Now it has a good crop of cotton on it.
The geese would eat goatheds quicker than they'd eat the grass. When they saw a goathed vine a dozen or more geese would tackle it simultaneously and in a matter of seconds the vine, goatheds and all would disappear.
Dan says, "The only mistake I made was I didn't get them soon enough. I should have got them May 15 instead of June 1."
The cotton looks good and there is very little Johnson grass on the 140 acres of cotton except where the cotton grew so rank that the geese do not like to invade the

tall cotton to eat the grass. That is the reason he should have purchased the geese two weeks earlier, he explained. The geese do not bother the cotton when being herded. Eat only Johnson grass and goathed, and they do not eat careless weeds or white weeds.
Dan's two nephews, ages 10 and 12 years did the herding of the geese. They are easily managed, easy to drive and herd. The geese do not work in the heat of the day. They like a shade to stay in. Dan had two hay frame wagons he parked in various parts of the field when 10 o'clock came on a sunny day, the geese would get under the wagons. The geese work hard eating the grass and goatheds from early in morning and late in the evening, provided you wake them up and drive them to the section of field you wish for them to graze. If you wake them up at 4:00 a.m. instead of 6:00 a.m. you will get two more hours of grazing a day, explained Dan.

The nephews provided the water and shade for the geese during the period of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. when sun was shining and at the close of the day, drove them to roost at night to the house where they lived.


Dan explained that it was a good deal for him, because they cleaned his 140 acres of Johnson grass and goatheds. They cost him very little as they ate in addition to the grazing, only 1.10 pound of grain per head a day. Of course the nephews made a little spending money. Dan believes he can get about half of his expense back when he sells the geese. He will sell them before cotton harvesting begins. Go look Dan Valentine's farm over and talk to him about this matter if you are interested. It may be a new way to clear land of Johnson grass and goatheds.
