## Turkey Shoot Friday, Saturday By Lions Club

A new concept in Turkey Shoots will be brought to Morton Friday and Saturday of this week, one which features an opportunity for anyone, even the most novice shooter to take home a full dressed turkey for Thanksgiving Dinner.

The Turkey Shoot, sponsored by the Morton Lions Club, will be held at a small, portable shooting gallery to be set up in the downtown business area. The 22 calibre rifles and ammunition will be furnished and shooters must use the 22 shorts furnished by the Lions Club.

Shooting will be at targets purchased by the shooter but the target will be in the form of numbered squares. The shooter will receive a point total determined by the number of different squares he is able to enter. However, the extra points will come when a shooter breaks a line between two, three or four squares where he gets a total of all the points. Anyone may be fortunate enough to do this.

Targets will be purchased 3 for \$1 and three shots will be allowed at each target.

"A turkey every hour, on the hour," that's the slogan adopted by the Morton Lions. One turkey will be awarded every hour to the shooter with the high score during that hour. Anyone who has purchased a set of 3 cards before the hour deadline is eligible to shoot before the turkey is awarded.

All turkeys awarded will be full dressed turkeys and there will be no target shooting except at the purchased card targets.

The booth will be open at 2 p.m. Friday afternoon, until 8 p.m., 6 turkeys being awarded. Saturday, it will open at 9 a.m. and stay open until 10 p.m.

## Post Office Now On Regular Hours Until Christmas

The local Post Office announced this week it is returning to the regular schedule of hours, closing at Saturday noon, until Christmas season increases business enough that extra hours are necessitated. The Post Office had remained open on Saturday afternoons to accommodate the many transient cotton harvest laborers.

## Three Way School Reduces Debt In Athletic Fund

THREE WAY (Sp.) — Three Way schools have been able to reduce their athletic fund indebtedness almost by one half, it was shown this week in a report submitted to the school board.

The report shows the fund owed \$492.11 when school started, a little over half on a note to the Morton bank and \$232 to the Baker Company of Lubbock, furnisher of athletic equipment.

Since that time an additional \$34.91 worth of expenses have occurred but net income from their football games this year plus some other incomes have been \$576.12.

Thus the total balance shows \$229.11 in the fund which will, when expended, reduce the debt to \$222.54.

## Coahoma Rolls Over Hapless Morton 20-7; Final Game Scheduled, Friday

Chief Deerfoot, an Apache Indian appeared in full dress regalia Friday night and led the Morton Indians onto the battlefield but he failed to impart enough spirit as Coahoma and dropped a 20-7 verdict.

The Indians, given one of their better chances of the season against an opponent, held the Bulldogs in check only throughout the first period. Then their defense crumbled. The Coahoma crew rambled on a 22 yard end run for their initial touchdown on the first play of the second quarter. The next time they got the ball it took only a punt runback and five plays to take the ball 91 yards through the pitifully weak Morton defense for the score. The kick was good and Coahoma sported a 13-0 halftime lead.

In the second half fumbles halted two Coahoma drives and Coahoma then started their final touchdown drive as the fourth period opened. They rumbled to three first downs in a 45-yard TD march that climaxed with a two-yard plunge over center. Again the kick was good.

Morton's only offensive power was shown late in the fourth quarter as they took the ball on their own 26-yard line. Waller booked for 5 yards and a pass, Mills to Harrison netted 22 and a first down and then passed to Harrison for the 31-yard scoring play. Waller booted the point. Morton recovered a fumble on the last play of the game.

An indication of Morton's weakness both on offense and defense came with a comparison of statistics. Morton made only two first downs in the first half to Coahoma's 10 and gained but 42 yards to Coahoma's 202. In the third period the Indians netted only 14 yards and six first downs for Coahoma. After Coahoma had salted the game away, deep in the fourth period, Morton rolled for a quarter of first downs and 105 yards while Coahoma came back with another 69 yards on 4 first downs.

Total statistics showed the Indians out-firstdowned, 20-6 and outgained 355 to 161 yards. Morton got only 56 of these in the first three quarters.

## Red Vaughan Booked Again; Liquor Count

In another Liquor raid Tuesday afternoon, local law enforcement officers arrested, for the third time in the past three weeks, C. C. (Red) Vaughan on a charge of illegal possession of intoxicating beverages.

For the third time, Vaughan's bond was set at \$500, which was posted and he was released. All three cases are still pending in County Court, Vaughan has indicated he will plead "not guilty."

# AUDITORS CHOSEN BY COURT

The Cochran County Commissioner's Court, Tuesday, after a two day session during which time they interviewed several other applicants for the job of auditing 9 years of County records, approved the Lubbock firm of Niemeier and Pierce, Public Accountants for the job.

County Judge Fred Stockdale said Tuesday, the Lubbock firm was hired after offering to do the job on a "per diem" basis, \$35 per day for a senior accountant and \$25 per day for a junior accountant on the job.

Niemeier was the last man to conduct an audit of Cochran County books back in 1945. At that time he was doing his work for another firm.

The Cochran County Commissioner's Court interviewed other auditors seeking the job of auditing county records for the past nine years, in their meeting Monday but took no action. Instead they called another meeting for Tuesday at which time they interviewed the last applicant for the job.

Judge Stockdale said several others were interviewed with relation to the work but indicated the Lubbock firm was hired because of their experience in that type of work. "They now are auditing regularly, books for 20 counties," Judge Stockdale said.

When the vote was taken, Niemeier had left Morton and Judge Stockdale said he would be contacted and invited to come back as soon as possible and sign a contract for the job. There was no indication as to just how long it would take though Stockdale said Niemeier had said they'd try to get the job done by May or June.

The hiring of the accountants was the only business conducted by the court, the judge said.

A super '88 will be on display as well as the big, roomy '98 four door sedan.

Oldsmobile for 1955 presents a new and more advanced concept of two-tone body color, important engineering improvements and a completely re-styled appearance. The luxurious "88" series and the high performance Super "88" series both are powered by a more efficient 202-horsepower "Rocket" engine with 8.5 to 1 compression ratio; it was announced by J. F. Wolfgram, vice president of General Motors and general manager of Oldsmobile Division. The 1955 Oldsmobiles go on display Friday, November 19, in dealerships throughout the United States.

Oldsmobile's popular low silhouette and wide vision panoramic windshield are enhanced by the flying colors styling that Oldsmobile designers have incorporated in the 1955 models. Oldsmobile again presents three series of cars with a total of 10 body styles. There are three Fisher body styles in the luxury "88" series—four-door sedan, deluxe Holiday coupe and Starfire (convertible). The flashing Super "88" Series has four body types—four-door sedan, two-door sedan, Holiday coupe and convertible coupe. In the economy-priced "88" Series are the four-door sedan, Holiday coupe and two-door sedan.

Distinguishing the front end appearance of the 1955 Oldsmobile are the recessed headlights with chrome-lined caps that extend two inches beyond the lens at the top, the name Oldsmobile spelled out in chrome block letters across the upper bumper bar and a more rugged bumper that curves gracefully into the fender contours at each end of the grille opening. The familiar Oldsmobile world emblem on the hood has an aluminum background for the plastic ornament. The rocket ornament atop the hood is wider and two wind splits extend the length of the hood, merging with the base of the ornament.

Improvement of "Rocket" engine power, torque and performance has been achieved through newly designed combustion chambers, higher lift camshaft and valves, larger exhaust valves, cooler operating sparkplugs and full chrome top piston rings. Horsepower is raised to 202-h.p. in the "88" and Super "88" and to 185-h.p. in the "88" Series, with compression ratio at 8.5 to 1 in all series. Breathing properties of the "Rocket" engine have been improved through chamber around the valve ports to accelerate the fuel-air mixture and increase the valve lift by .034 inches with a new high-lift camshaft. A new fuel pump more efficient in operation has been designed.

A new feature in 1955 is the offering of the 202-h.p. "Rocket" engine as optional equipment at extra cost on the "88" Series. Standard equipment on the "88" Series is the 185-h.p. "Rocket" engine, which this year is equipped with a new dual Rochester carburetor. This new two-barrel carburetor develops more power through its free flowing characteristics and is internally vented to promote equal economy in the mountains or at sea level.

Riding qualities of the 1955 Oldsmobile have been further improved through incorporating direct-acting shock absorbers that are mounted vertically within the springs and attached directly to the frame and the lower control arm. Tube-type tires will be standard on the 1955 Oldsmobiles. These tires have an improved safety factor with greater resistance to punctures and blowouts. Steering effort has been reduced appreciably through use of new needle bearings on the steering pitman arm shaft.

A major styling change is the adoption of sweep-cut front fenders on the Super "88" and "88" Series. These fenders were introduced last year on the "98" Series and add a distinctive flair to exterior appearance.

Two-tone color styling, which has proved so popular with the motoring public since its introduction by Oldsmobile in 1954, again plays an important part in Oldsmobile appearance. The stainless steel side moulding that extends nearly the length of the cars in all body styles is used for the color separation. This flying colors treatment of two-tone hues is achieved by a graceful sweep of the moulding from the belt line rearward to a point near the rear wheel opening, where it connects with a horizontal moulding that extends nearly the length of the car at the fender opening. This moulding serves not only as decorative trim but also protects the body finish from the opening of an adjacent car door.

Rear appearance of the 1955 Oldsmobile also is changed. There is a more massive bumper, with license plate centered between the bumper guards. The new bullet-shaped taillights incorporate horizontal chrome airfoils in each side in the "98" Series. The trunk lock is cleverly concealed in the new world emblem.

Series identification on the 1955 Oldsmobile is maintained by the model name or series number in chrome script or numerals on the front fender panel just ahead of the wheel opening.

Color again plays an important part in Oldsmobile's 1955 styling.

Fourteen new color choices are being offered among the 19 available on the 1955 models. Eighty-nine conventional top and body two-tone color combinations will be available, along with twenty special two-tone combinations where the side moulding provides the color separation. Interiors of the 1955 Oldsmobiles are as colorful and varied as the exteriors. Forty-seven different upholstery selections are offered in the three series of cars. Genuine leather, covert cloth, nylon cloth and Moroccan are among the upholstery materials available.

Important changes have been made in the Oldsmobile air conditioning system, available at extra cost on all models. The distribution ducts now are located in the instrument panel and the entire installation is forward of the steering wheel. The compressor, evaporator and blowers are under the hood.

A new higher capacity compressor and improved temperature controls are features of the new system. There are three cool air outlets in the instrument panel, those at the extreme ends being the directional type and the one in the level inside the car can be easily regulated by the control on the instrument panel.

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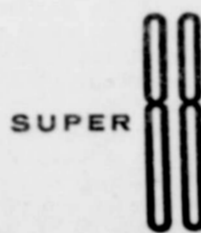
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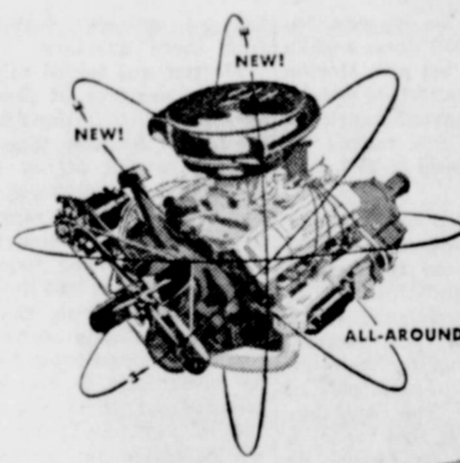
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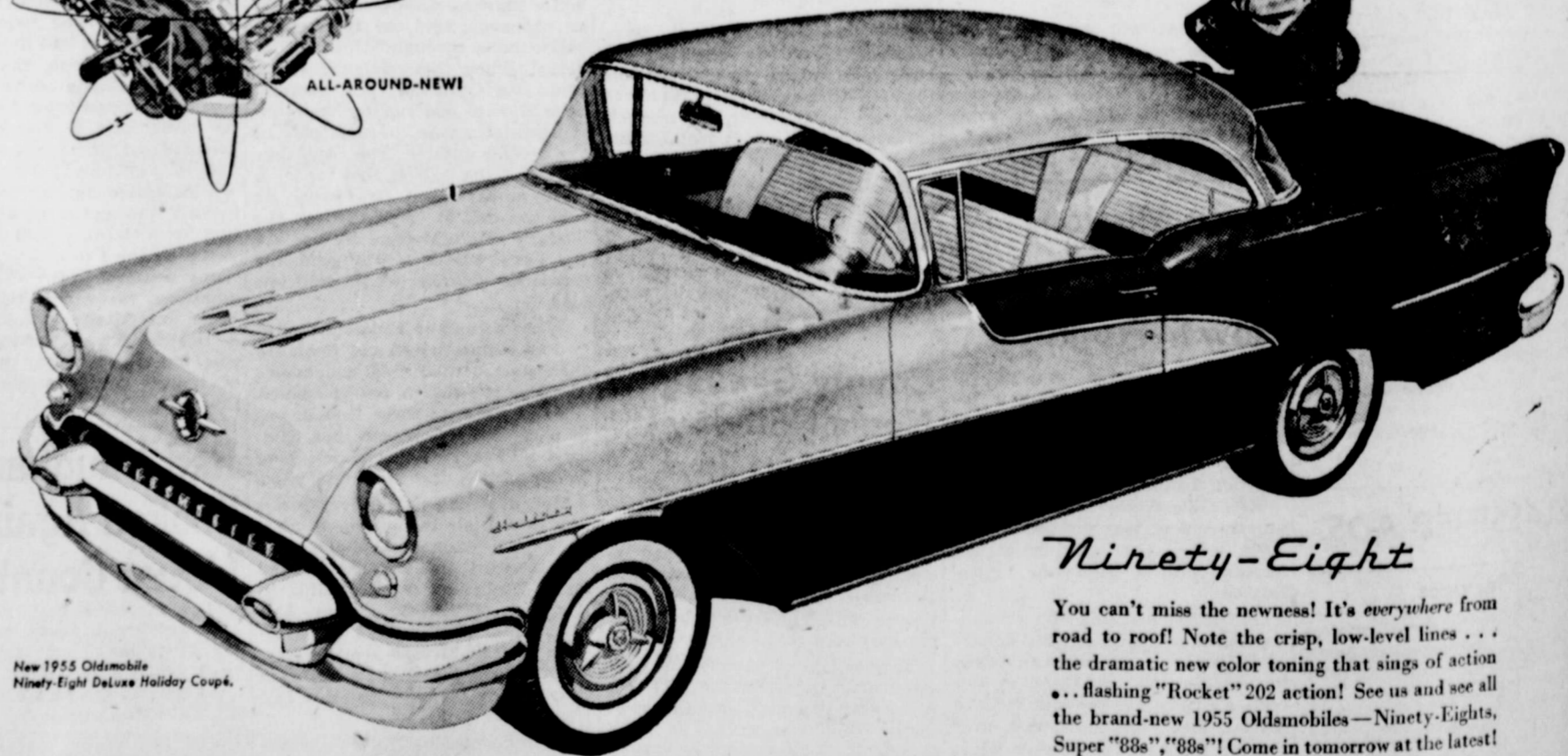

## With Your... COUNTY AGENT

**Homer E. Thompson SOCIAL SECURITY FOR FARM FAMILIES**

The new law now brings Federal old-age and survivors insurance to most farm families. It takes effect January 1, 1955, and makes two main changes concerning farm people:

(1) Farm operators—people farming for themselves—have not been covered by the social security law up to now. Beginning January 1, 1955, practically all of them who make as much as \$400 profit in a year will come under old-age and survivors insurance.

Commencing in 1955, a person under 72 and entitled to benefits can earn as much as \$1,200 in a year and still receive all his social security payments. Earnings from any kind of employment and self-employment are counted. After you are 72, you may accept the checks regardless of the amount of your earnings.

A lump-sum payment is made at the time of an insured person's death at any age. The amount can be as much as \$255.

Workers and their employers and self-employed people contribute to a fund while they are working, and when earnings stop because of the death of the worker or because of his retirement at age 65 or later, payments are made from the fund to the worker and his dependents or to his survivors.

The tax for employees is two percent of their pay, and this amount is matched by the employer. This means that covered farm workers will have two percent of their pay deducted for social security. Another two percent is paid by the employer, who sends the total amount to the District Director of Internal Revenue along with a report of the wages and social security account number of each employee.

The tax for self-employed people is 3 percent of their earnings. They pay this once a year along with their income tax return.

If you earn more than \$4,200 in a year, you pay the tax only on \$4,200. An employer pays the tax on only the first \$4,200 of wages he pays to each employee.

**IF YOU ARE A SELF-EMPLOYED FARM OPERATOR**

If you are a self-employed farm operator with earnings of \$400 or more in a year, you should get a social security card, unless you already have one. The place to get it is your nearest social security district office. There is no charge. If you once had a card, but lost it, tell your social security office that you want a duplicate. If it is not convenient for you to go to your district social security office in person, you can get an application blank at your post office and get the card by mail.

The self-employment tax on your farm earnings applies to taxable years ending after 1954. If your first report is for calendar year 1955 you will make the report early in 1956 as part of your income tax return.

The amount you report is your net earnings—or profit—after you subtract your farm expenses from your gross income. But if your gross income is \$1800 or less, and you report on the cash basis, you have the choice between reporting your actual net earning or reporting half of the gross income. You can report either way.

If your gross income is over \$1,800, you must figure your actual net earnings. If these net earnings are less than \$800, you have a choice. You may report either the actual amount or \$800.

**IF YOU DO FARM WORK FOR OTHERS**—and get cash pay of \$100 or more in a year from one employer, you must have a social security card. If you have never had one, or if you had one but lost it, get in touch with your nearest

social security office. They will give you a card without charge. Show your card to the person you work for, so that he can copy the name and number from it for his records. He will keep back two percent of your cash pay for social security, add the same amount as his share of the tax, and send the total to the District Director of Internal Revenue with his social security report. This report must show your name and social security number in order for you to be sure of getting the proper credit toward benefits.

Payments in any form other than cash do not count for social security purposes and your employer will not report them. If your cash pay from farm work for one employer is less than \$100 in a year, he does not report your earnings and there is no social security tax. If you earn \$75 in a year from one employer and another \$75 in a year from a second employer, these wages would not count toward social security. But—if you earn \$100 from one and \$150 from the other, both employers will report your earnings for social security, and you will get credit for the total. Whenever you pay from any farm employer is less than \$100 in a year, he should return to you any amount he took out of your pay for social security for that year.

If your earnings do count, be sure you have a social security card and that your employer copies your full name and social security number directly from the card to his records. He must show your correct name and number on his report if you are to be sure of getting the proper credit toward benefits.

### HOW TO PAY SOCIAL SECURITY TAXES

Until 1960 the social security tax on wages is 2 percent each for employee and employer on earnings up to \$4,200 a year. The self-employed person pays 3 percent on his own earnings up to earnings of \$4,200 in a year.

**Examples:**

1. A farm hand who earns \$1,200 in a year will have \$24 tax deducted from his pay, and the employer will turn that in, with \$24 of his own to match it.

2. A farm operator who makes \$2,000 profit in a year will pay \$60 social security tax.

Social security taxes are not collected by your local social security office but by the Internal Revenue Service—the same agency that collects income taxes and other Federal taxes.

For instructions on whether you owe or do not owe social security taxes, or about how and when to pay them, get in touch with the Internal Revenue Service office nearest you. If you do not know the address, your postmaster can give it to you.
