Mrs. Wayne Walthall gave an interesting pro on Indian Affairs in Texas Mrs. Walthall brought out that there are only approximately 500 remaining Texas Indians who once numbered 30,000. These Indians. members of the Alabama and Cou. shatta tribes, lived on a reservation near Livingston, Texas, Long ago these tribes dwelt across the Mississippi at peace. sharing the wealth of the land, but with the expansion of the population from the Atlantic coast the White man poured into the old south and gradually took the Indians' land until there was little left. The Indians migrated to Texas, isolated from civilization, and lived in poverty for years until 1928. At this time, Clem Fain, a White man, was made an honorary Chief to the tribes. He took a group to Washington sponsored by the newspapers of Texas, where they related their bitter story. Congress appropriated money to buy 3,071 acres of land.
