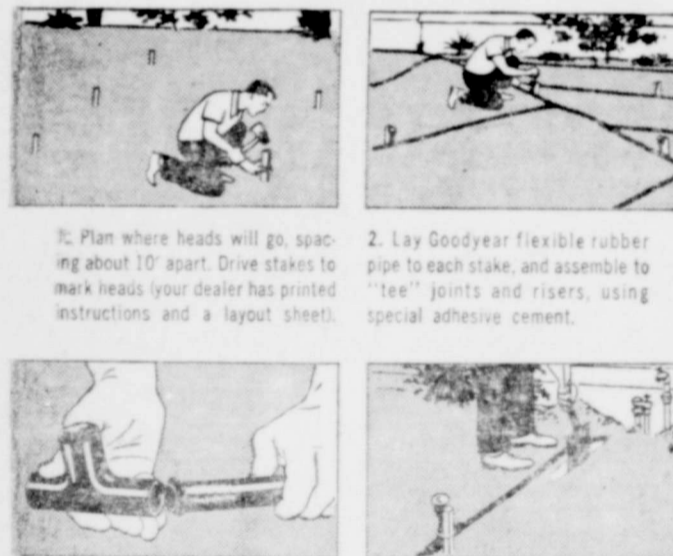

## EDITORIALS

### IT SHOULD BE A 50-50 PROPOSITION

Most assuredly, Morton is becoming a busier place, a fact that is being felt weekly, and indeed, almost daily.

Though the economic conditions, resulting from several years of drought have not yet let up in all businesses, nearly every business, man up and down the main streets have felt the increase in business.

What is causing all this? Most of it stems not from our efforts but from the natural growth of an area that has abounded in resources but was hitherto only slightly developed.

The lack of development and the lack of a group of leaders to push the development, gave merchants and farmers alike some excuse for failing to boost their area. However, with the influx of groups of men who are now pushing developments, failure to join in the efforts, will result in falling by the wayside for the individual businessman and farmer.

We admittedly are dependent, to a figure approximating 75 percent, upon agriculture. As the crop goes, so go the people of Cochran County. However, needing to push two things at one time both the development of Cochran County as farming country and development of Morton as a community in which to live, we have inadvertently split ourselves into two factions.

Though we don't make a point of discussion, we seem to be selfish considering only the things that we feel will directly concern us. In doing so, we not only are being selfish but often we are wrong in our thinking... dead wrong.

The businessman who sits by the wayside and means the lack of ideal weather conditions which have brought economic troubles to the community, certainly isn't helping the situation.

Nor is the farmer helping, who purchases everything he can from other neighboring communities and then bemoans the fact that Morton won't support his son in his 4-H activities or his daughter in FHA work.

Many solutions have been suggested, nearly all of them possessing workable ideas. But the chief starting us in the face is our lack of cooperation with one another.

The Chamber of Commerce this week tried to set an example by calling a meeting of all interested parties to support the Fat Stock Show. They knew that it'll take a lot more than the efforts of the FFA instructors, the County Agent and a few volunteer businessmen to "put over" a successful show.

In fact, it'll take a lot more than cold, hard cash to insure the success of the show.

We emphasize the appreciation the FFA boys and their fathers will have if we flock to the show and pay sizable bonuses for the boys' efforts. On the other hand, we make no distinction between the boys who do the work themselves and those whose fathers do the work for them.

In town, among the businessmen, the same general idea prevails. We emphasize the appreciation the merchants will have if you do your shopping in Morton. But we make no distinction between the merchants who are trying to stock whatever is called for, who are trying to hold prices in line, who are ready and willing to order supplies they do not carry on their shelves... and those who refuse to help in any way to promote the community.

Clearly cooperation is needed. The help, advice, and promotion of businessmen is needed to carry out the work of the Farm Bureau.

## Ask Your Preacher

where the Bible says "one church is as good as another." This statement is made, by religious people, perhaps more than any other one statement. Maybe you have said this over and over, and you have heard your preacher say it all your life. Therefore, you should be interested in having proof of the correctness of such a statement. I am not asking too much when I ask you to ask your preacher about it. I am I? That is what your preacher is for — to tell you where you can find things in the Bible. So why not use him? I expect my brethren to use me that way, and they feel free to make such demands of me.



In Eph. 4:4 I find recorded, "There is one body, and one Spirit, even as you were called in one hope of your calling." This passage plainly states: "There is one body." But what does Paul mean by one body? Let Paul answer that in Eph. 1:22-23: "And He hath put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be heard over all things to the church which is His body." Note that: "the church is His body." Therefore, if the church is the body it follows that the one body of Eph. 4:4 is the church. Furthermore, when Christ said, "I will build My church," (Mat. 16:18). He mentioned only one — (My church). He did not say "upon this rock I will build My churches."

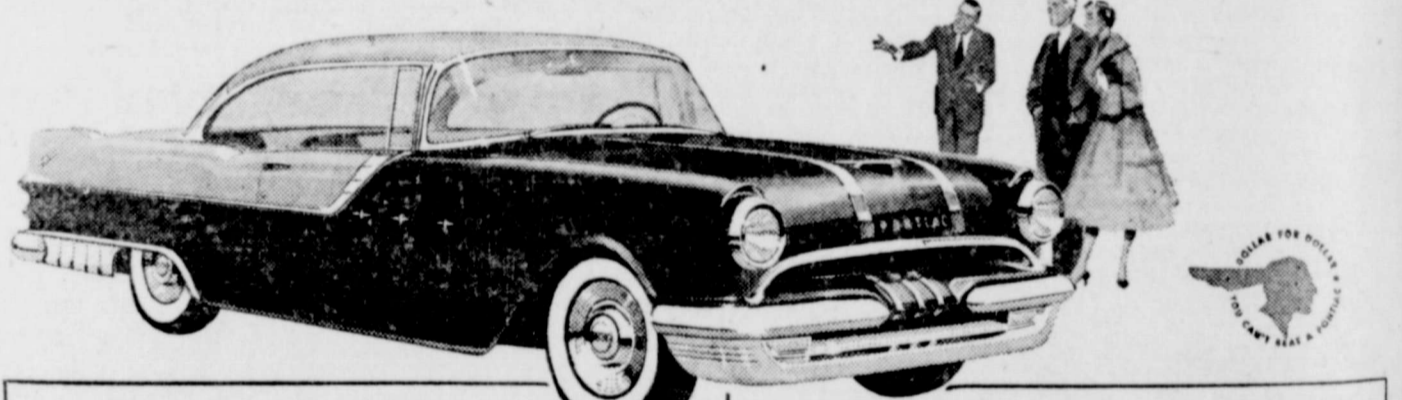
In Col. 1:18, Paul declared: "He is the head of the body, the church." Open your Bible and read this passage. Does it say: "He is the head of the bodies the churches"? It doesn't read that way in your Book does it? There is the same number of churches that there is of bodies; and the same number of bodies that there is of heads. How many heads does the passage mention? Since Jesus promised to "build My church" (one church) and is the head of only one church, it follows that someone else must be the head of all but one church. Do you believe that a church of which men is the head is just as good as the one of which Christ is the head? You must believe that if you think one church is just as good as another.

If men, without even dying, can establish and be the head of a church that is just as good as the one that Christ gave His blood to establish and be the head of, then Christ died in vain. That would give man more power than the Lord had. Ask your preacher for the passage that says "one church is just as good as another."

OF THE PAST school year, it was agreed by the Superintendent that it was, on the whole, a harmonious year, and this opinion, Mr. Owens told the Board is shared by most of the teachers who have dropped by his office to tell him so.

## TEACHERS REHIRED

### New Bus Route Planned By Board To Reduce Students' Time Enroute

An additional bus route to service students in the southern part of Cochran County was scheduled by the Morton Independent School District Board at their meeting last Thursday night in an effort to reduce the necessary bus riding time of those students.

The additional route was slated after one of the Board members brought to the Board's attention the problem at hand. The route, 54 miles in length (one way) necessitated many of the students to leave home an hour and a half before school starts and not get home until as much as two hours after school lets out.

The Board put in their request order for two new buses, hoping to have them by the start of the next school year. Every effort would be made, the Board members were told, to reschedule or to add additional buses in order to cut down on the length of some of the bus routes.

The main business at hand concerned the rehiring of teachers. Supt. Owens produced a list of all teachers, spoke of the harmony that has prevailed in the school system during the past school year and recommended the rehiring of all teachers and principals. His recommendation also carried the recommendation of the principals.

A general discussion was held concerning the various problems the teachers have had to deal with. All teachers and principals were rehired, two of them subject to their resignation.

Bus foremen and the School Business Manager were also rehired. The Board also hired one new teacher, filling the vacancy which will exist in one resignation. Mrs. W. W. Smith was hired but no exact placing was stipulated.

The superintendent, with still one year to go on his original contract, was not up for re-hiring.

Owens was firm in his praise of the overall success of the school year. Upon questioning, he discussed the various problems that had arisen but emphasized that he felt the faculty members had done a fine job. A few teachers were singled out and praised for their outstanding contributions.

The Superintendent felt that there would be a few resignations, as there most always are, but expressed the hope that as many faculty members as could be persuaded to, would stay. He said he felt that the large turnover of teachers, had been a problem in the Morton schools in previous years. Minutes of previous meeting were approved and a unanimous approval

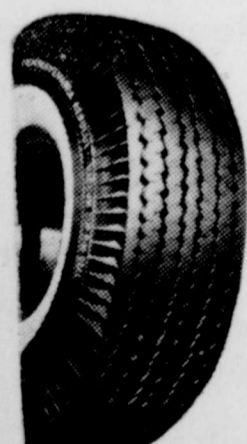
