

Let Paul an. swer that in Eph. 1:22-23: "And He hath put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be heard over all things to the church which is His body" - Note this; "the church, which is His body." Therefore, if the church is the body it follows that the one body of Eph. 4:4 is the church, Furthermore, when Christ said;

I will build my church," (Mat. 16:18), He mentioned only one - (My church). He did not say "upon this rock I will build My churches.'

In Col. 1:18, Paul declared: "He is the head of the body the church." Open your Bible and read this passage. Does it say; "He is the head of the bodies the churches"?
