



**COUNCIL BUSINESS**

**City Outlaws Fireworks;  
Asks Master Plan Grant**

The Friona City Council passed an ordinance Monday night making it unlawful to sell or discharge fireworks within the city limits, or outside the

city limits for 5,000 feet. The law empowered the police department as well as the city fire marshal to seize and destroy any fireworks found

within the jurisdiction of the ordinance. Illegal sale within the city shall be punished by a \$200 fine. Discharging the fireworks shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 and not more than \$200.

The ordinance was passed by a unanimous vote, following much discussion by the council and interested citizens who attended the meeting. The council also recommended a fireworks display for the city on July 4.

In other business, the council took a step toward securing a comprehensive plan for the City of Friona, which plan is subject to a federal grant through the State Health Department.

Consulting Engineer, M.R. (Red) Smith pointed out that the cost to the city for such a plan would be \$5,700. The federal participation would approach \$10,000.

Nathan Kiser, a city planner, discussed with the council how such a plan would be drawn up, and explained how the grant would be processed.

Both representatives emphasized how important such a master plan is to a growing city, so as to help the town and developers alike in preparing for orderly growth.

In other business, the group approved the city librarian's annual report and appointed Mrs. Bill Brandt, Mrs. Dick Rocky and Mrs. Bill Stewart for three-year terms to the library board.

The council discussed the city's plumbing and electrical code with M.W. Hicks and Buddy Fallwell. It was pointed out that some plumbers use unlicensed help in their local work, an unfair practice to local licensed plumbers.

A motion was passed authorizing city water superintendent Clyde Fields to apply for a master's plumbing inspector's license, so that he will be legally qualified to inspect plumbing work within the city.

The appointment of the board of equalization for 1968 was approved. The members are O. F. Lange, chairman, H.K. Kendrick, and O.J. Beene, with C. L. Lillard as alternate.

**Seven Water Meters  
Added During Month**

Seven new water taps were made during the month of June, to bring the number of active meters as of June 20 to 1115, according to the monthly report by City Manager Jake Outland.

Records indicated that 41,557,300 gallons of water were pumped during the month, an average of 1,385,243 gallons per day. This is the peak monthly figure thus far in 1968, and is attributed to the unusually seasonal dry weather, with only .26 inches of rainfall during June.

Four new sewer taps were made during June, bringing the total number of active taps at the month's end to 1048. Some 7,204,200 gallons of sewage were pumped during June.

Fire department records revealed that four alarms were sounded during June. Three were outside the city limits, for total estimated loss of \$700. The one inside the city resulted in loss estimated at \$50.

Police department records showed fourteen arrests during (Continued on Page 3)

**Rev. Armstrong Takes  
New Mission Position**

Rev. Jake Armstrong and his family are to leave Friona on Thursday for Olympia, Washington, where Rev. Armstrong is to organize a new church. He has served as pastor of Friona's Calvary Baptist Church since October of 1964.

Rev. Armstrong's undertaking is part of the Southern Baptist Convention's "Project 500" movement -- to organize 500 new missions and churches during 1968 and 1969.

In Washington, Rev. Armstrong will be working with Omer Hyde, a former Friona resident son of H.A. Hyde of Friona. Hyde is city missions secretary for the cities of Olympia and Tacoma, through the Southern Baptist Convention.

"We regret very much having to leave Friona. It is wonderful place, and the people here are some of the greatest we have found. However, we feel led to this new field," Rev. Armstrong said.

The Baptist minister pointed out that currently there was just a vacant lot for the new church in Olympia -- no building, nor congregation. Olympia is a city of about 20,000 population. The new church will be the only Southern Baptist church in the capital city of Washington.

The Armstrongs came to Friona in 1964, after he had pastored a church in West Germany for two years. He is a native of Abilene.

Rev. Armstrong is only the second pastor for Calvary Baptist Church, which was organized in 1960. Rev. Audie Wiley

served as the church's first pastor. He is a pastor of a church in Albuquerque.

The Armstrongs have four children, Conrad, 18, graduated from Friona High School this year. Karen is 17, Steve is 16, and Gene is 14.

While in Friona, Rev. Armstrong served as president and held other offices in the Friona Ministerial Alliance. He has also served as chaplain of the Friona American Legion post.

**Star To Sponsor

There are plenty of good rooms at moderate prices available in San Antonio for HemisFair visitors, according to R.W. Colglazier, president of Visitor Services, Inc. Colglazier's organization is the World's Fair housing bureau which is responsible for assisting visitors in finding accommodations.

Despite receiving double the daily expected queries, Colglazier said VSI has been able to process all mail requests for information and housing in usually no more than a couple of work days. Fair visitors will find food prices both on the HemisFair grounds and in the city very reasonable. Some world's fairs in the last few years have been guilty of exorbitant costs for dining, but this is not true at San Antonio's World's Fair.

A world-wide variety of restaurant cuisine is there for the leisurely diner, but most folks find their way to the many air-conditioned outdoor "food clusters." Mixed in with hamburgers, tacos, shishkabob and hot dogs are exotic counterparts from dozens of foreign countries. And desserts? Forget the calories and try the Swiss ice cream delicacies Danish pastries, Dutch fudge, Mexican bunuelos. All these food cluster treats are inexpensive. A dollar goes pretty far at these pick and choose food stands even when you add in a dessert. Everything can be eaten as you walk along.

Walking is only one of the convenient ways to get around what national magazines have called a "bite-size," "easily negotiated," "air-conditioned," "relaxing and comfortable" world's fair. For variety try the longest Mini-Mono-Rail ever constructed at a fair. Or for a breath-taking panoramic view of the Fair and downtown San Antonio take the Swiss skyride; then for a relaxing low-level view enjoy the Lagoon Boat Cruise or El Trenchito (The Little Train), both of which wind in and out of every nook and cranny of the 92.6 acres.

Whatever mode of on-site transportation you choose will take you through the most exciting and unusual exhibits ever brought together in the Southwestern United States. Thirty-four foreign countries and 19 industrial giants have built fabulous pavilions.

The United States Confluence Theater creates gasps and goose bumps with its disappearing interior walls and expanding screens as it presents Academy Award winner Francis Thompson's three-part documentary "U.S."

**Whitefield Is Named

Otho Whitefield was named the "1968 Sheepman of the Year" at the annual meeting of the Columbia Sheep Breeders Association of America June 28 in Dubois, Idaho.

**Permits Continue At  
Record Pace Locally**

Building permits issued for the month of June continued at a record pace, according to figures released this week by City Manager, Jake Outland.

Six permits were issued during June, for construction worth an estimated \$112,500. The first six months of 1967 wound up with building totals of \$665,300, which is over half of the all-time building record in Friona, established in 1964.

Five of the six permits issued during June were for new residences, amounting to \$111,500 of the total. The other permit was for an addition to a residence, at \$1,000.

The record building year in Friona was 1964, when construction amounted to \$1,149,040, exclusive of the million dollar high school.

Dear Bill:

The Special Session of the 60th Legislature was concluded about 1:00 p.m., July 3rd, and it was a hectic thirty days. Liquor-by-the-drink (Mini-bottle) took much of our time. The House passed the bill, over my opposition, by a 3 or 4 vote majority. By working with Senator Doc Blanchard, Senator Jack Hightower and Senator Grady Hazlewood we furnished enough material and information to help them defeat the bill in the Senate. The "Mini-bottle bill" would have been a shame and a disgrace to the citizens of Texas. Also defeated was a bill by Representative Jack Ogg of Houston, to allow sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages until 2:00 a.m., instead of the present curfew of 12:15 a.m. There was also a liquor reform bill introduced, but it failed to pass. I hope something can be done in this area at the next regular session.

The appropriation bill which was passed by both houses of the legislature will adequately finance all State agencies and departments for the next fiscal year, plus increases in college faculty salaries, and a provision to expand vocational training. There were appropriations for swine and vegetable research in the High Plains Area to be done by Texas Tech. Money was also appropriated for the building of the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory that was created last session.

We passed a tax bill, to cover the additional expenses of State Government for the next year, that will add a one-cent increase to the sales tax, and a seventy-five cents per thousand dollars, increase in the corporation franchise tax.

Although there were some things in both the appropriation and tax bills that I didn't like, it was apparent towards the end of the session that these two bills were all that we would be able to pass.

I'll be at home for a few days and then I will be going to Detroit, Michigan, to represent the State of Texas at a water conference.

If I can be of any help to you please call on me.

The "gun law" hassle that is currently being tossed about like a hot potato would be ridiculous if it were not for the very serious undertones in the question involved.

No one with two ticks of brains expects a professional or amateur hoodlum to give up his guns or register them with the authorities.

The country's leading stores are agreeing to de-emphasize the advertising of weaponry as toys and war games.

All forms of news media have begun to stress the number of crimes involving the use of firearms.

Petitions by the dozen, signed by thousands of citizens, are pouring into Washington D.C.

Of what real value is all this hub-bub? Are we not straining at the gnat in attempting to legislate morals while swallowing the camel of permitting the really guilty to remain unpunished?

It is not the toy guns we are concerned with. Years before the life-like plastic replicas of the M-16 or Springfield were on sale boys were shooting each other with broom sticks, or lacking a "six shooter," a pointed right index finger accompanied by a shout of "Bang-Bang - you're dead."

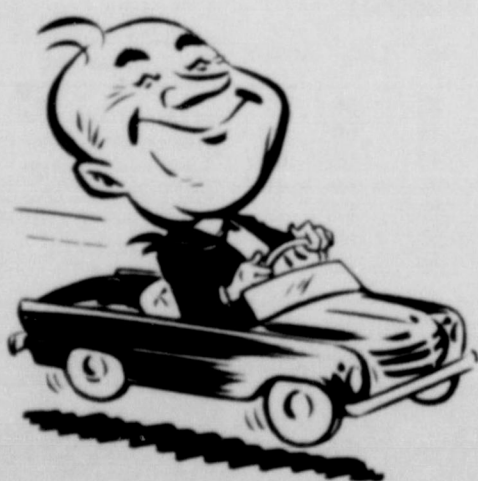

What is the future of Friona? That is a difficult question, one that cannot be answered with a definite yes or no answer. A number of factors are involved.

Friona should grow. If housing can be provided, then Friona WILL grow. The housing being built is fine for some needs but fails to meet the demand. Houses in the \$8,500 to \$11,000 price range that are not being built now are the key to the future growth of Friona.

With current financing costs, higher material and labor costs such houses are difficult to build on a sound economic basis. However, they can be built and must be if Friona is to see its available growth potential.

With the influx of people moving to this area by their employment with Missouri Beef Packers and the increasing feed yard operations, the growth potential is very good. However, the new highway signs that state "If you lived in Friona, you would be home by now" are meaningless words unless the newcomers can find a place to live.

Most of the newcomers, while fine people, cannot buy a \$25,000 brick home but could buy one of the more moderately priced homes. By providing the type of homes that these people can buy, Friona's chances of keeping them for citizens is increased.

Another factor: Several individuals and businesses would actually gain if no new growth occurred in Friona. While this is not a serious factor, it still is important enough to mention. Steady growth will benefit the community as a whole.

The people of Friona generally have been warm and hospitable to the newcomers which has made more want to live here, if only suitable housing was available. Friona is losing newcomers daily because of the housing problem. This is the key to the city's future.

20 million bushels of grain sorghum in 1967, and fed 4 million bushels to 100,000 cattle. The potential is nearly four times that figure, and this means growth," Ford said.

"My family and I have enjoyed many friendships in the Friona area, and if called upon to serve you in the Texas Legislature, I will look forward to working with the people of Farmer County for continued progress," he concluded.

the month. Eight were for traffic violations; three for drunkenness, two for absent without official leave and one for driving while intoxicated.

Complaints investigated included about a hundred on both-ersome and haphazard shooting of fireworks; three for thefts, two each on break-ins, vandalism and dogs, with one each for prowling and domestic disturbance.

Two automobile accidents were investigated. No injuries were sustained in either. Park - cemetery department reported three interments during the month.

An estimated 35 cubic yards of street gravel were spread on bleeding tar streets during the last week of June, when excep-

tionally hot weather caused the sticky conditions. The 108-degree reading June 28 caused all the new sealcoating and much of last year's streets to require treatment.

Mosquito dusting, including about 600 pounds each time, were made each Tuesday evening during the month. The dry, hot weather along with the control program has held the mosquito populations.

The city library reports the summer reading program for children is well underway, with 135 participating as of June 19. Ted Weaver tendered his resignation to the library board as the chamber of commerce representative.

There were 11 changes in ownership in city properties reported by the county clerk's office during the month.

## Benefits Top Scholarships

"Social security benefits being paid to young people 18 to 22 who are still in school amount to more than the scholarships at all colleges and universities in the United States," Wayne Klipping social security Field Representative for this area said today.

"In the 1968-69 school year, the social security program will pay about \$479 million to approximately 466,000 students entitled to payments on the earnings record of a disabled, retired, or deceased parent," Klipping said. This will be an average of more than \$1,000 to each eligible student.

There is nothing in the law that prevents the student from receiving his social security benefits while he is still receiving assistance from a scholarship fund. Benefits may be paid during vacation periods. If a student works during the summer months or part time during the school year, and earns \$1,680 or less for the year, he can still collect all of his social security benefits. If his earnings go above \$1,680, he gives up some or all his benefits, depending upon the amount of his total earnings and how steadily he works.

Klipping said that a recent change in the dependency requirements for the children of women workers made about 175,000 young persons eligible for payments. A large number of them are in the 18-22 age group and are attending school. They must apply for benefits before their payments can start.

Young people in the 18-22 age group whose mothers died after working under social security, or whose mothers are retired or disabled, should contact Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.

An Ordinance Prohibiting Fireworks: Defining The Term Fireworks; Providing Certain Exceptions; Declaring Fireworks To Be A Public Nuisance And Authorizing Their Seizure And Destruction Where Found In Violation Of This Ordinance; Authorizing The Prosecution Of Suits For Injunctive Relief In Aid Of This Ordinance; Providing Penalties For Violation Of This Ordinance; Providing That This Ordinance Shall Be Applicable And In Force Immediately Adjacent And Contiguous To The City Limits Of The City Of Friona And Extending For A Distance Outside The City Limits For A Total Of 5,000 Feet, Excepting However Any Portion Of Such Area Included In Any Other Municipal Corporation; Providing That Any Present Licensee Shall Have Until July 25, 1968, To Remove Fireworks From The Jurisdiction Of The City; Providing That It Shall Not Be Necessary To Negative Exceptions And Prosecutions Under This Ordinance; Providing A Repealing Clause; Providing A Severability Clause And Declaring An Emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA:

**SECTION 1. Definitions** - The term "Fireworks" as used in this ordinance shall mean and include any firecrackers, cannon crackers, skyrockets, torpedoes, Roman candles, sparklers, squibs, fire balloons, star shells, gerbs or any other substance in whatever combination be any designated name intended for use in obtaining visible or audible pyrotechnic display and shall include all articles or substances within the commonly accepted meaning of fireworks whether herein specially designated and defined or not.

The term "person" shall mean and include any natural persons, association of persons, partnerships, corporations, agent or officer of corporation, and shall also include all warehousemen, common and private carriers, bailees, trustees, receivers, executors and administrators.

**SECTION 2. Fireworks Prohibited** - It shall be unlawful for any person to manufacture, assemble, store, transport, receive, keep, sell, offer or have in his possession with intent to sell, use, discharge, cause to be discharged, ignite, detonate, fire or otherwise set in action any fireworks of any description.

**SECTION 3. Exceptions** - This ordinance shall not apply to signal flares and torpedoes of the type and kind commonly used by any railroad and which signal flares and torpedoes are received by and stored or transported by any such railroad for use in railroad operations; nor shall this ordinance apply to signal flares on rockets for military or police use. This ordinance shall not apply to fireworks used in fireworks displays by responsible persons, clubs or organizations, within the territorial applicability hereinafter outlined, when permission to stage any such fireworks display shall be secured in advance by application to the city manager of the city of Friona, Texas and approval by such City Manager of the City of Friona, Texas, at a place and time to be designated by said City Manager.

**SECTION 4. Fireworks a Public Nuisance** - The presence of any fireworks within the jurisdiction of the City of Friona in violation of this ordinance is hereby declared to be common and public nuisance. The Fire Marshall and The Chief of Police are directed and required to seize and cause to be safely destroyed any fireworks found within the jurisdiction in violation of this ordinance and any member of the Fire Prevention Division of the Fire Department of the City of Friona or any police officer of the City of Friona or any other duly constituted peace officer is empowered to stop the transportation of and detain any fireworks found being transported illegally or to close any building where any fireworks found to be stored illegally until the Fire Marshall can be notified in order that the said fireworks may be seized and destroyed in accordance with the terms of this section. Notwithstanding any penal provision of this article, the City Attorney is authorized to file suit on behalf of the City of Friona or the Fire Marshall or both for injunctive relief as may be necessary to prevent unlawful storage, transportation, keeping or use of fire works within the jurisdiction of the City and to aid the Fire Marshall in the discharge of his duties and to particularly prevent any person from interfering with the seizure and destruction of such fireworks, but it shall not be necessary to obtain any such injunctive relief as a prerequisite to such seizure and destruction. The Fire Marshall, Chief of Police or any member of the Fire Prevention Division of the City of Friona is hereby authorized to enter any building where the unlawful presence of fireworks is suspected in order to inspect the same for the presence of such fireworks.

**SECTION 5. Penalties** - Any person who shall manufacture, assemble, store, transport, receive, keep, sell, offer for sale or have in his possession with intent to sell any fireworks shall be fined Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense. If the fireworks be separately wrapped or packaged, the doing or omitting to do any act prohibited by this ordinance shall be a separate offense as to each such separately wrapped or separately packaged fireworks. Each day that a violation of this ordinance shall continue with respect to any package of fireworks shall constitute a separate offense.

Any person who shall use, discharge, cause to be discharged, ignite, detonate, fire or otherwise set in action any fireworks shall be fined not less than Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) Any parent or guardian of any minor child below the age of fourteen (14) who permits or allows such minor child to use, discharge, ignite, detonate, fire or otherwise set in action any fireworks shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

**SECTION 6. Territorial Applicability.** (a) This ordinance shall be applicable and in force throughout the territory of the City of Friona within its corporate limits.

(b) This ordinance shall also be applicable and in force within the area immediately adjacent and contiguous to the city limits of the City of Friona and extending for a distance outside of the city limits for a total of five thousand (5,000) feet, and it shall be unlawful to do or perform any act in violation of this ordinance within such area of five thousand (5,000) feet outside the city limits; provided that this ordinance shall not apply within any portion of such 5,000 feet area which is contained within the territory of any other municipal corporation.

**SECTION 7. Temporary Exception for Existing Licenses** - Notwithstanding any other provision of this ordinance, any person who, upon the effective date of this ordinance holds a permit for storage or sale of fireworks shall be permitted to continue such storage of fireworks until 12:01 A.M. July 25, 1968. During such period of time it shall be lawful for such person or any carrier acting for such person to transport such fireworks from the licensed location to any point outside of the city limits and beyond the five - thousand - foot area defined herein. At 12:01 A.M. on July 25, 1968, the provisions of this section shall expire and be of no further force and effect.

**SECTION 8. Not Necessary to Negative Exceptions** - In any prosecution for any violation of this ordinance, it shall not be necessary for the prosecution to negative any proviso or exception but the same may be raised by the defendant by way of defense.

**SECTION 9. Severability Clause.** - If any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid (or for any reason unenforceable), the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance or their application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council of the City of Friona in adopting this ordinance, that no portion thereof or provisions or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality or invalidity of any other portion, provision, or regulation, and to this end, all provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

**SECTION 10.** It is required that this ordinance be published in one issue of the official paper, and that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the publication hereof.

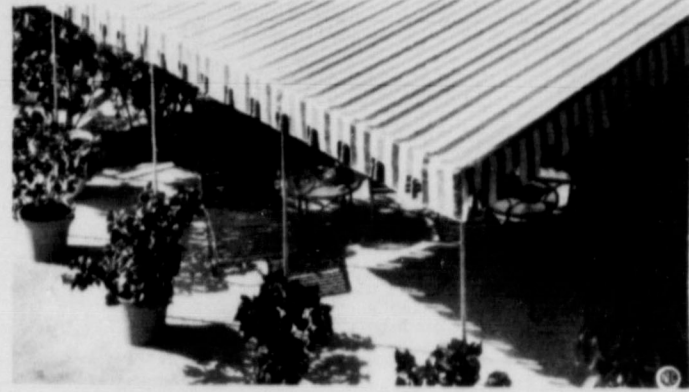

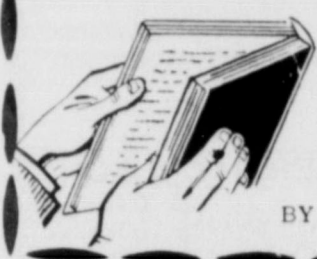

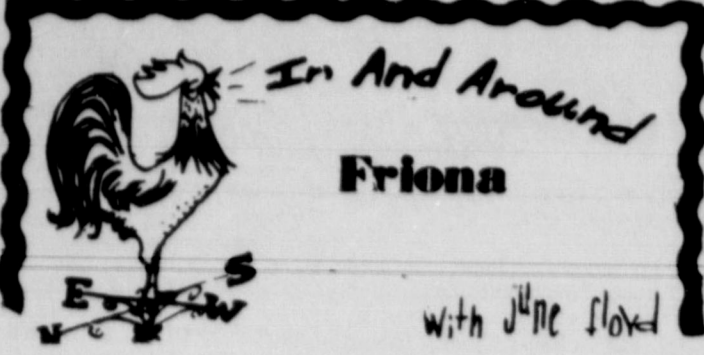

Someone has wisely said, "Seat belts are not the most comfortable things in the world... neither are straps that hold you on a stretcher."

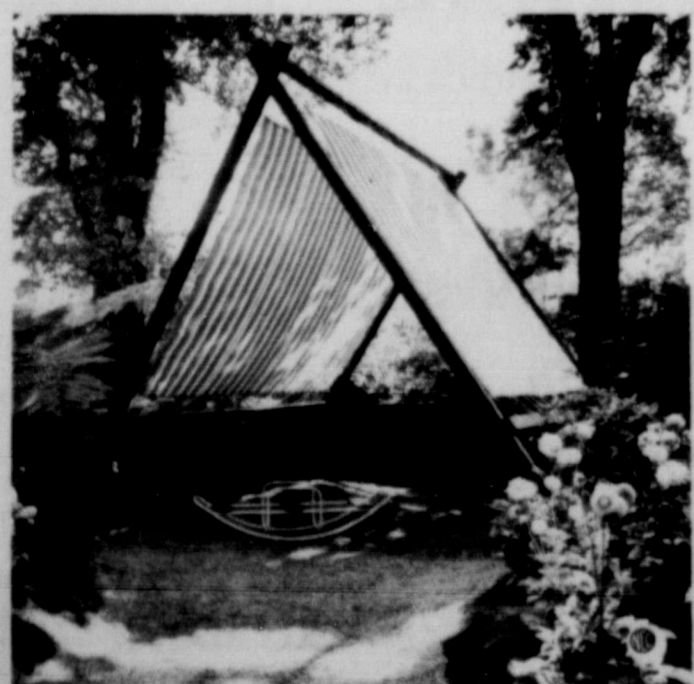


**Ochs Is New**
