



# Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN — Tax plans tailspinned in the House before adjournment last week-end.

A right-running team carried the Stanton Stone "fleas to uranium" omnibus tax compromise. But they threw the ball over the head of the receiver. Net result: The House refused to pass the bill at second reading. It had to be revived for further action.

Some members rebelled because they weren't in on the play. New compromises, with more players and a less taut rein, however, promised an ultimate tax bill. Members have been talking about "100 million new taxes" and that was just about what the new compromise plan embraced. It would involve face saving all around.

The four-point plan included: Acceptance of the Stone cut of the gasoline tax to one-cent, from two, as originally asked by Governor Allan Shivers. At the same time, one-fourth of its revenue — eight million a year — would be given to cities and counties to buy rights-of-way.

One-cent increase on cigarette tax was kept.

### Veterans Land Probe

Far from abating, the veterans land investigation was expanding and reaching as far afield as Minnesota.

Cecil E. Burney, special assistant attorney general, told the Senate Investigating Committee that two years ago, when Attorney General John Ben Shepperd was vacationing in Minnesota, he happened to see former land commissioner Bascom Giles.

Giles invited Shepperd to visit his Minnesota farm of 8,600 acres. When the veterans land investigations began, Shepperd sent an investigator to Minnesota.

As a result of that investigation, Burney predicted, the people will hear that money from the veterans land program went to Minnesota to buy land for Texas.

"It is amazing," said Burney, "that some of the same people who were anxious to buy cheap Minnesota land at high prices were the same persons who were anxious to sell cheap land in Texas to veterans for equally high prices."

\$3,000 in Fees. Another witness before the Senate Investigating Committee was Alvis Vandegriff, a former officer of the veterans land board.

Vandegriff testified that during a four-year period after he left the board, he received more than \$30,000 to expedite block land deals. County Advertising. A bill by Rep. W. W. Allen of Laredo was approved in House committee, permitting counties of 50,000 population and over to use funds for local advertising.

Under the bill, county commissioners could appropriate \$5 per \$100 assessed property evaluation for the purpose. Under existing laws, counties of 100,000 population and over already are permitted to advertise. ### Celebrate 55th Anniversary of Submarines With Newest Model Capable of Long Submerges

As the Navy celebrated the 55th anniversary of its Submarine Service in all U. S. subs sank more than 200 major combat ships. Monday, April 11, the "true" submarine, capable of staying submerged for unlimited periods of time, was a reality. It was on April 11, 1900 that the Navy accepted its first submarine from builder John Philip Holland. It was a stubby cigar-shaped craft powered by a four-cylinder gasoline engine. At that time, the submarine was considered of slight military significance. It was not until World War II that the underwater craft had a chance to prove its worth as a full-fledged member of the Navy's fighting team. During World War I, 20 of our early submarines crossed the Atlantic for duty in European waters. However, they never encountered the enemy — their main battle was in keeping their cramped, uncomfortable and relatively unreliable craft operating. For the first two years of World War II, American submarines bore a heavy brunt of the fighting — holding the defense line in the Southwest Pacific and leading the Navy's offense in the Central Pacific. The final submarine score tells a never-to-be-forgotten story. During World War II, American submarines in the Pacific sank 1,850 Japanese merchant vessels, and

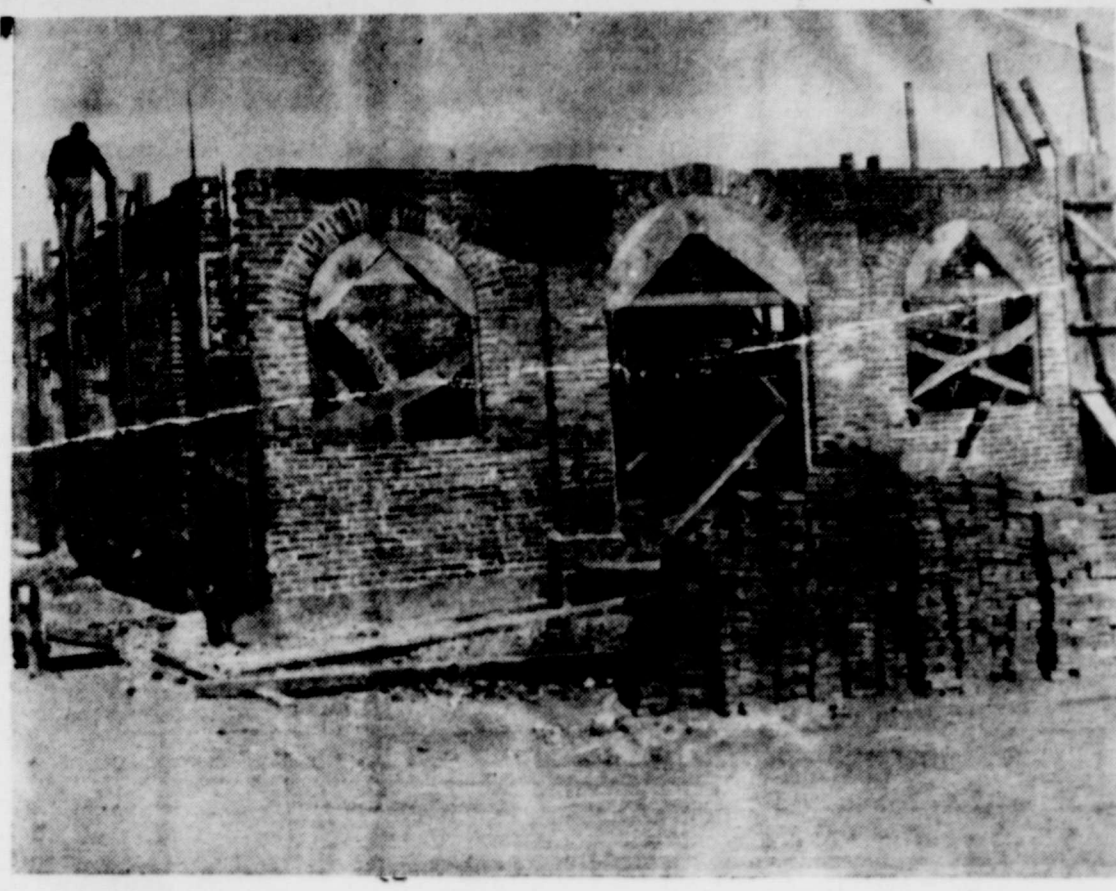

Texas Viewpoint

In Washington

By PRICE DANIEL

At the National Guard Armory on Saturday night, Democrats throughout the nation paid tribute to Speaker Sam Rayburn of Bonham, the Texan in Washington who holds the highest office and the longest term of service. The dinner had been scheduled to be held at one of the Washington hotels, but when the acceptances exceeded the 1,400 capacity of the hotel dining room, it was necessary to use a larger hall. There were about 4,000 people present. Among the many speakers was Senator Lyndon Johnson, who paid tribute to Mr. Rayburn on behalf of the Senate.

Former Vice President John Nance Garner of Uvalde had planned to make this the occasion for his first trip to Washington since his time of service here, but had to change his plans at the last moment on the advice of his physician. To state the names of all the Texans present would require more than this column would permit, but the State was well represented. Prior to the dinner, Mr. and Mrs. Burris Jackson of Hillsboro were hosts to the members of the Texas delegation in Congress at a coffee. All in all it was like Texas Day in the Capital City, although Democrats from every state in the union joined in this high tribute to Speaker Rayburn.

Interior Department Honors Texans Judge Guy C. Jackson, Jr. of Anahuac and Dr. Water Prescott

Webb of Austin last week were presented the Conservation Award of the Department of the Interior for their contributions to water resources development throughout the nation and particularly in Texas. Secretary of the Interior McKay presented the awards to the two Texans in his office in Washington.

Dr. Webb, professor of history at the University of Texas, is the author of a book, "More Water for Texas," dealing with the water problem and pointing out the role of the Bureau of Reclamation in working toward a solution. Judge Jackson for many years County Judge of Chambers County, is President of the Texas Water Conservation Association and First Vice-President of the National Reclamation Association. He is recognized as an outstanding leader in water resources development in Texas.

Texas Onions Last week each Senator and Congressman received a small sack of onions grown in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas through the courtesy of the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers and Shippers. A large truck rolled into the grounds of the National Capitol with a sign on the side reading "Texas Onions for Congress," after making the trip from Laredo to Washington. Mrs. Lyndon Johnson and Mrs. Joe Kilgore, dressed in Mexican costumes from the Charro Days celebration in Brownsville, distributed the onions from the steps of the Capitol.

This is the first time that a full truckload of Texas agricultural products has been distributed from the Capitol steps, although many of such products are advertised through placement in the Senate and House dining rooms. Austin Anson of Harlingen was in Washington to assist with the project which was handled by Congressman Joe Kilgore of McAllen.

Prosperous Prospects Unless Communist China decides to initiate a war soon, every indication here is that the nation will enjoy continued peacetime prosper-

ity in the immediate future. Much of it will be in evidence in Texas, which is still rated as one of the brightest spots in the country for future industrial growth and expansion. The hydrogen and atomic age will witness continued decentralization of industry, and there is no State in the nation which has more to offer in the way of resources, good relations between business and labor, and other attractive environments.

It is only in the agricultural that prospects are not as bright as we should hope for. Overproduction of crops and livestock, and reduced allotments for farmers, present a problem which must be met by cooperation between the government and those engaged in agricultural pursuits. The biggest need now is to develop markets for our products and to improve price support and allotment programs so long as they are necessary. Congress can be expected to do considerable work in this field, because many members are unhappy with the injustices that are now being felt by farmers and livestock producers throughout the country.
