





Strict Tests Through Every Process Assure Safety of Salk Polio Vaccine


For the first time in history, a vaccine is protecting millions of human beings from paralytic polio. While the Salk vaccine will not work in every case, American children are being safeguarded against the dread disease, with no more risk than they would take in a vaccination against smallpox or a typhoid shot. The Salk vaccine must pass elaborate tests under the watchful eye of a government inspector at every stage of production. 









But the soil under that covering stays moist and mellow, a wonderful place for worms to get in their well known soil-conditioning work. A short while before corn-planting time Clinton knifes the roots,


