FHA Office Releases Details On New Credit Program In Operation

Details of a new credit program, tailored to the needs of farmers and ranchers in the Great Plains area, combining established real estate and production loan programs of the Farmer's Home Administration with a greatly expanded emergency loan program, was announced recently by Robert C. Cross.

Cross, local FHA manager, said the loans will be available in Cochran County and applications can be filed at the FHA office here.

Loans will be made for reseeded and the establishment of grasslands and other approved conservation and land use practices including soil and water erosion control measures; development and improvement of domestic and irrigation water supplies; repair and improvement of existing farm buildings; and the purchase of additional land needed to enlarge a farm to a family type size.

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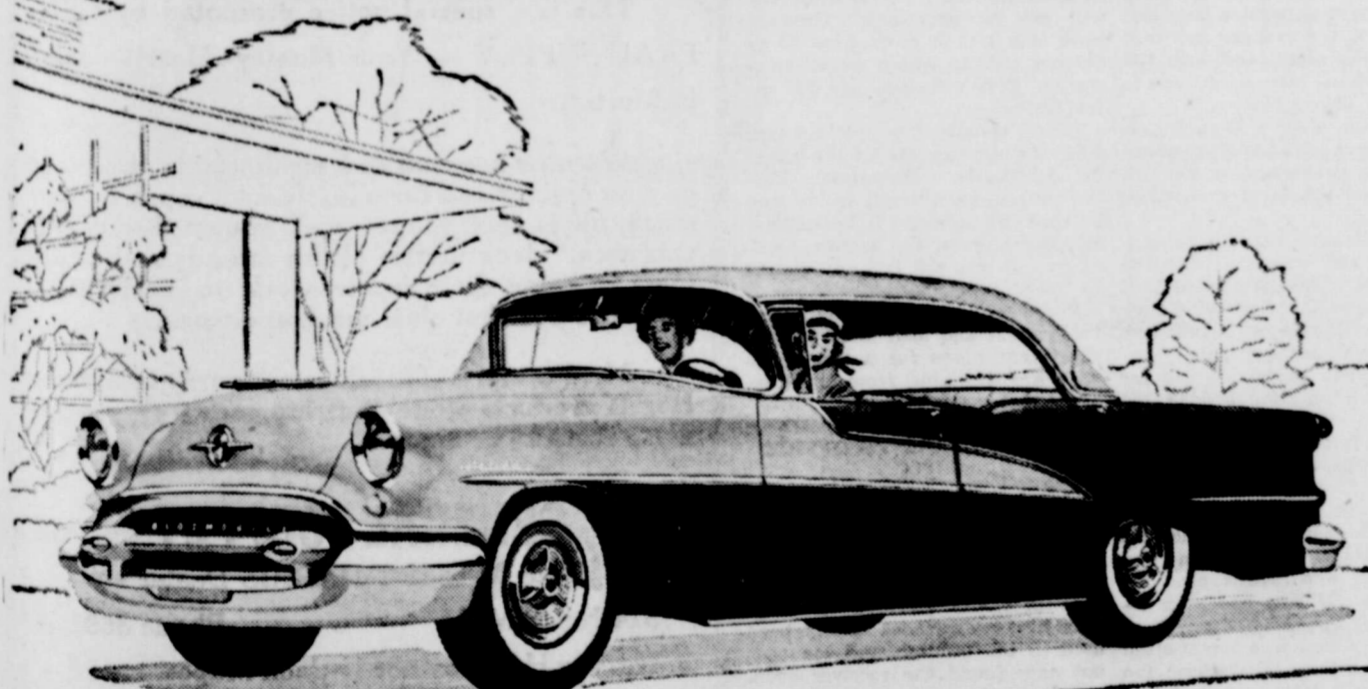
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TWO FLOCK SYSTEM COULD LEVEL EGG PRODUCTION

A tough problem for the poultryman continues to be too many eggs in one season and too few in the seasons when egg prices are the highest. Extension poultry specialist, Ben Wormell, says the answer is simple... a two-flock system of egg production.

The two flock system he explains just means starting a laying flock early in the spring and another in the fall to pick up when the spring started hens begin to drop off in production.

The specialist lists at least five advantages for the two flock system. The problem of too many small eggs could be sharply reduced by having them come in at different times of the year thus relieving the market glut. Too, chick brooding facilities could be used more nearly on a year-round basis with a corresponding reduction in the cost of producing the hen.

Eggs could be produced at a more uniform rate throughout the year thus keeping production more nearly in line with demand. Quality drops in eggs laid during the last few months of the laying year and the two flock system would help solve this problem.

Another major advantage, the specialist adds, the egg producer, by following this program, can have a dependable year-round income from his poultry enterprise.

EARLY CRYSTAL 281 ONION AVAILABLE FOR PLANTING
 Seed of Early Crystal 281, a new Crystal Wax Type onion that matures about 10 days earlier than Eclipse, will be available in very limited quantities for commercial planting in the South this Fall, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces. This new variety has considerable resistance to pink root and is less subject to splitting and bolting (forming seed pre-maturity) than other varieties of similar type.

HINTS ON MECHANICAL COTTON HARVESTING
 The grade of mechanically harvested cotton can be improved or lowered by the practices used during the harvesting process says Fred C. Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agriculture Extension service.

If strippers are used, Elliott advises producers to get the latest information from the local county agent on defoliation. He also suggests that weeds, and especially Johnson grass be cleared from the fields before stripping is commenced. Spot oiling is suggested for this job.

When harvesting is begun, don't strip when the cotton is wet. Most gins, he adds, are equipped to do a good job if the cotton is brought to them in proper condition. One of the most important of these conditions is dryness.

He suggests the use of blowers on the strippers and wire or slatted sides for the trailers. Make the will not be necessary. Growers have told him it costs from \$5 to \$15 per bale to tramp cotton on a trailer. This will soon pay for extra trailers.

When spindle type pickers are used, he advises seeing the agent for defoliation information. Pick the cotton only when it is dry, and be sure the machine is kept clean.

When tramping the cotton, trash is ground into the lint and results in lower grading. Those who must put cotton on the ground and load later are advised that plans for a tractor loader are available from the County Agent.

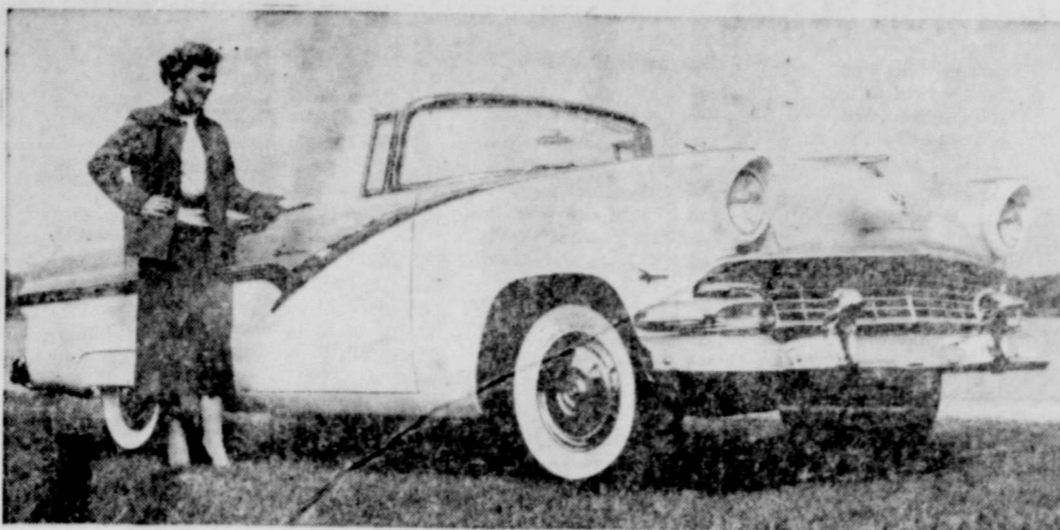

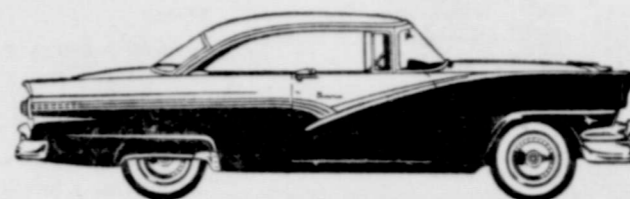

Letter to the EDITOR . . . Local Woman Gives Views On Hospital Issue

Morton, Texas September 25, 1955 M. Eddie Irwin, Editor Morton Tribune Morton, Texas

Dear Sir, On several occasions, you have stated that you were willing to put both sides of any pertinent question before the public. There is no question more important than the health and welfare of Cochran County Citizens; therefore, I should like to present a side of an issue that has been neglected up to now, and I sincerely feel that the majority of the people of this county has never been allowed to think along this line. The more dramatic side has been pushed to the front at all times, and I sometimes think that even those who have been so diligent in putting this side before us, have honestly never given the other aspect a thought. All I ask is that each intelligent family head in this county read these words carefully and with an open mind. There are approximately 7,000 people in this county. There are two physicians in this county at the present time. There is need for a third to really care for the people of this area. We have been told over and over, and over that the county has "lost" \$100,000 in the last four years because of the hospital. That makes \$25,000 per year. Divided among the approximately 7,000 people of our county it means that each person has lost 30 cents per month for the security and privilege of having our own hospital in this area, rather than 30 to 60 miles away. Please keep these figures in mind. Now let's suppose that two physicians had had the hospital leased for the last four years. The \$100,000 would have been their loss. Broken down into months it would mean that a little more than \$200 per month would have had to come out of their own pockets to make up the hospital deficit. Their hands n't been that kind of money in their pockets through these dry years. This, then, is the question I want to ask the people of Cochran County. Should two doctors, their wives and children sacrifice all this so that the people of the county can know that there is adequate medical care for their loved ones? Or should we, each one, sacrifice or "lose" 30 cents per month for that security. Do we say that the county "lost" so many thousands of dollars on county road maintenance? Do we say our grocery money is lost? Do we say our insurance premiums are lost? No, we do not. But there is little difference. The money is

gone. It is paid out for value received. If the fact that we have a hospital here has been instrumental in saving one life, in the easing of the passing of one life, or even in emergency care before being sent on for more specialized care, who can regret the 80 cents "lost"? No, the good people of this area that I've seen rally around when friends, neighbors, or even total strangers needed help! A lot of pain can be suffered and a lot of blood lost in a thirty mile drive. Any mother would rather see her injured school child treated three blocks away, if possible. There are areas in the state where people have banded together to build and support a county or community hospital. I cite one example in Central Texas where my father happened to be an emergency patient last year. The people were so proud of their hospital, they had placed a large bronze plaque in the lobby with the names of the County Commissioners and Judge who had been in office at the time. There was a sign in the lobby stating "This lobby furnished by the Lions Club." Another read, "This nursery furnished by the American Legion Auxiliary." Down the hall on numerous patients room doors were little signs reading, "This room furnished in loving memory of . . . A large oxygen machine in the hall had been donated through the efforts of the . . . (Continued on page 8)

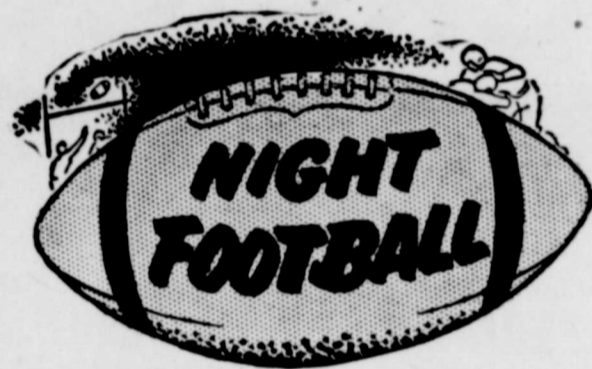

The whole point is — which is more important? Our few dollars or our families health and welfare?

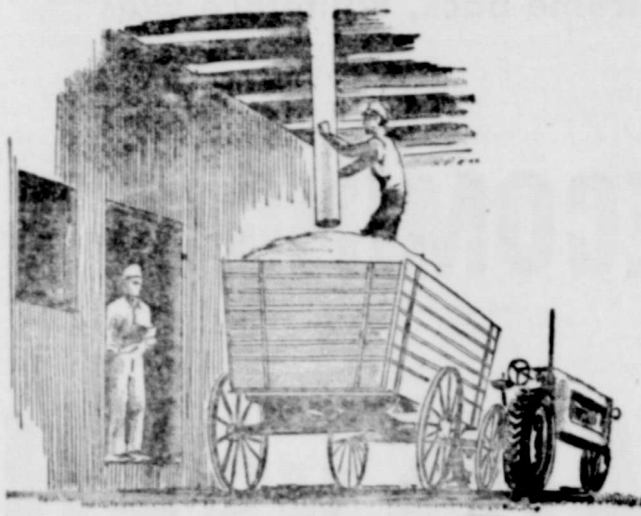
