## 3 to 2 Vote Hikes Salaries 25 Per Cent

### Christmas Comes Early For County Officials

Acting on what County Judge Fred Stockdale has since termed the recommendation of the auditor, the Cochran County Commissioners' Court Monday raised the salaries of the nine elected officials a flat 25 percent, the maximum allowed under House Bill 374. However, the auditor's statement that the county could support the raise was not given in the form of a recommendation simply as the answer to a direct question.

The vote was 3 to 2 with Commissioners Ran Holloman and J. N. Foster opposing and the other Commissioners, Sonny Dewbre and Gilbert Keith speaking for it. Judge

Stockdale broke the tie without any hesitation.

The decision came late in the afternoon after the Court had held 7 men in the morning session that it would be up to the report of the auditor. That report received at about 3:30 said the County, with economies in every department could pay the raise.

The Court rejected a proposal by a member of the Tribune staff that they postpone the vote one month, make the raise retroactive so the delay wouldn't cost them any money, and then give the statement to the people through the press as to how the raises could be afforded.

Judge Stockdale said those that oppose it will oppose it anyway so there's no need for that. Commissioner Dewbre said if they were going to do it, they might as well go ahead, and the people could be told later.

Commissioner Keith said he'd checked in other counties and they all grabbed the raise so why shouldn't we?

Judge Stockdale did release a statement the next day which is reprinted here, stating where the economies had occurred and why the raise was possible. It was in that statement that he referred to the recommendation of the auditor.

The raise gave each Commissioner, the County Judge, the County Attorney, the County Treasurer, the County and District Clerk and the Sheriff Assessor Collector a nice Christmas present in the form of an extra \$1,350 per year, an overall raise of their salaries to \$6,750 per year. With car allowance, it gives the Commissioners a total of \$7,350 per year. The judge, with \$2,600 additional salary being paid by the school district as ex-officio school superintendent and a \$1,050 expense allowance for that job totals \$11,000 per year.

The law was produced and read to the group in the morning session. In answer to whether or not the raise had been figured in the budget, the judge said the budget would have to be amended.

Asked the purpose of the law, the judge said it was because of the cost of living increase and Commissioner said he couldn't live on his salary without additional income from farming.

The judge said no tax would be added to pay the salary raise, and the judge and Commissioner Keith said the Magnolia case was far from settled and expressed the opinion the county will win that suit in the court of appeals and thus the county would not be hurt by the loss of tax money.

Asked if other deputies in the courthouse didn't need the raise more than the elected officials, it was said by Dewbre that he thought most of the others were getting as much as the law allows. This was corroborated by another member of the Court.

After the vote Commissioner Dewbre said there should be an amendment where the Commissioners who didn't want it could turn it back to the county. Foster and Holloman said they would be the judge of whether or not to turn it back.

Commissioner Holloman said a check revealed that one member of the Court had not paid his taxes and that he felt if a man would vote himself a raise he certainly should pay his taxes. Commissioner Dewbre asked who he was referring to and Holloman said he wouldn't call any names. Foster said, "If it fits your foot, wear it." Dewbre said he paid his taxes and whoever it was would have to pay a penalty when he did pay it and he didn't think it was any of the Court's business.

Other business was attended to and will be reported on next week.

### Bula, Mobeetie Clash Tonight

Bula Bulldogs were poised today to take a measure of revenge against Mobeetie, a team that beat the Bulldogs in a bi-district encounter two years ago — a game the Bula team vows they never should have lost.

Bula has waited two years for the opportunity that presents itself tonight at Morton stadium at 8 p.m. The bi-district encounter, first to be held in Morton, sponsored by the Morton Jaycees, will pit undefeated Bula against once beaten Mobeetie. The winner gets to go one game further in quest of a regional title — another thing Bula has searched for a long time.

The Bulldogs from our neighboring Community have piled up a remarkable record in 6-man football. They've put together three straight seasons of undefeated conference ball. The first year of those three they lost their bi-district contest to Mobeetie, playing at Littlefield,

by a 45-40 margin. In that game their top runner was sidelined in the early minutes with an injury. Last year they won their bi-district encounter, then they went to Matador and absorbed a solid thumping from Roaring Springs in the final game.

They avenged that defeat in the first game this season, edging the Roaring Springs team in an exhibition game, their closest game of the year. Now they want that win over Mobeetie.

A sizable crowd is expected to be on hand for the game. Early sale of tickets has been good and local folks are reminded they can still purchase advance tickets, up to the time the gates open, for \$1 and for 50c. Then the price jumps to \$1.50 and 65c.

Bula, in view of their undefeated record will probably go into the tilt favored slightly. But no one in these parts knows much about the

husky Mobeetie team.

Couch Bill Paxton has a good team that swept through six district games and lost only an exhibition encounter. Bula has racked up nine straight wins under Coach Claude Morrison.

It's hard to single out stars on the Bula team. They've several top running backs, at least two glue-fingered pass catchers, and perhaps what the coach is most proud of, a tremendous defensive team.

If anything at all worries Morrison, it's simply that they haven't had enough opposition to force him to play the first team. Consequently nearly every man on the squad has played half of the season.

The Bulldogs won't be without supporters. Folks from their community, who haven't had the weather to raise good crops in better than five years, have grown used to spending their falls supporting the good football teams and their win-

ters pushing an equally famous, topflight girl's basketball team.

They were reported to have sold about 150 adult tickets in the small community through last night.

As usual Bula is confident on the eve of the game. But the Coach emphasizes they won't be cocky. He has prepared them for a rugged battle, and they may get it. The game will also provide somewhat of a novelty for many Morton fans who haven't ever seen a 6-man contest — played on a different size field, by a little different rules and certainly faster than 11 man football.

Bula has guaranteed Mobeetie a \$500 gate and after that, the rest

of the gate proceeds go to Bula. The Jaycees, local sponsors and planners will handle the concessions and programs for their part in the profits.

**HERE'S HOW**

Mr. Eddie Irwin, Morton Tribune, Dear Eddie:

At the regular meeting of the Commissioner's Court on Monday, November 14, during the hearing for the adoption of House Bill 374 by the last Legislature providing for increase of certain elected officials' salaries, we were requested to point out the reasons for finding that the county is financially able to pay the same. Of course this finding must be made on the recommendation of the County Auditor, and on conferring with him further we give you the following:

In November of 1954, the Commissioners Court began a complete outside audit of all county records by the auditing firm of Neimier & Pierce. This audit will include the year 1955 which will soon close. As a result the records and accounting systems of the various offices has undergone many changes throughout, which will result in and is showing a considerable overall saving. This outside audit will cost approximately \$12,000, of which we have practically all has been paid by the county on a per diem basis. Beginning with the calendar year 1956 the outside annual audit will cost only about \$200 per year, thereby reducing this expenditure from the general fund.

Another important change in the system of accounts is the division of the Road and Bridge, Special Road and Car License funds among the four precincts. Hereinafter each Commissioner will operate his precinct from the precinct fund instead of paying all bills for roads, machinery, repairs, etc. from County Wide funds. This will result in a saving of operation for each precinct.

These savings and lower cost of operation for all departments form the basis for finding that the county is financially in position to meet the salary increase.

A movie, "Know Your Social Security" helped to explain how the Social Security Administration works and how it can be managed so cheaply. As Mr. Daniels put it, the program is not something for nothing but something for something.

A discussion period ended the evening's program.

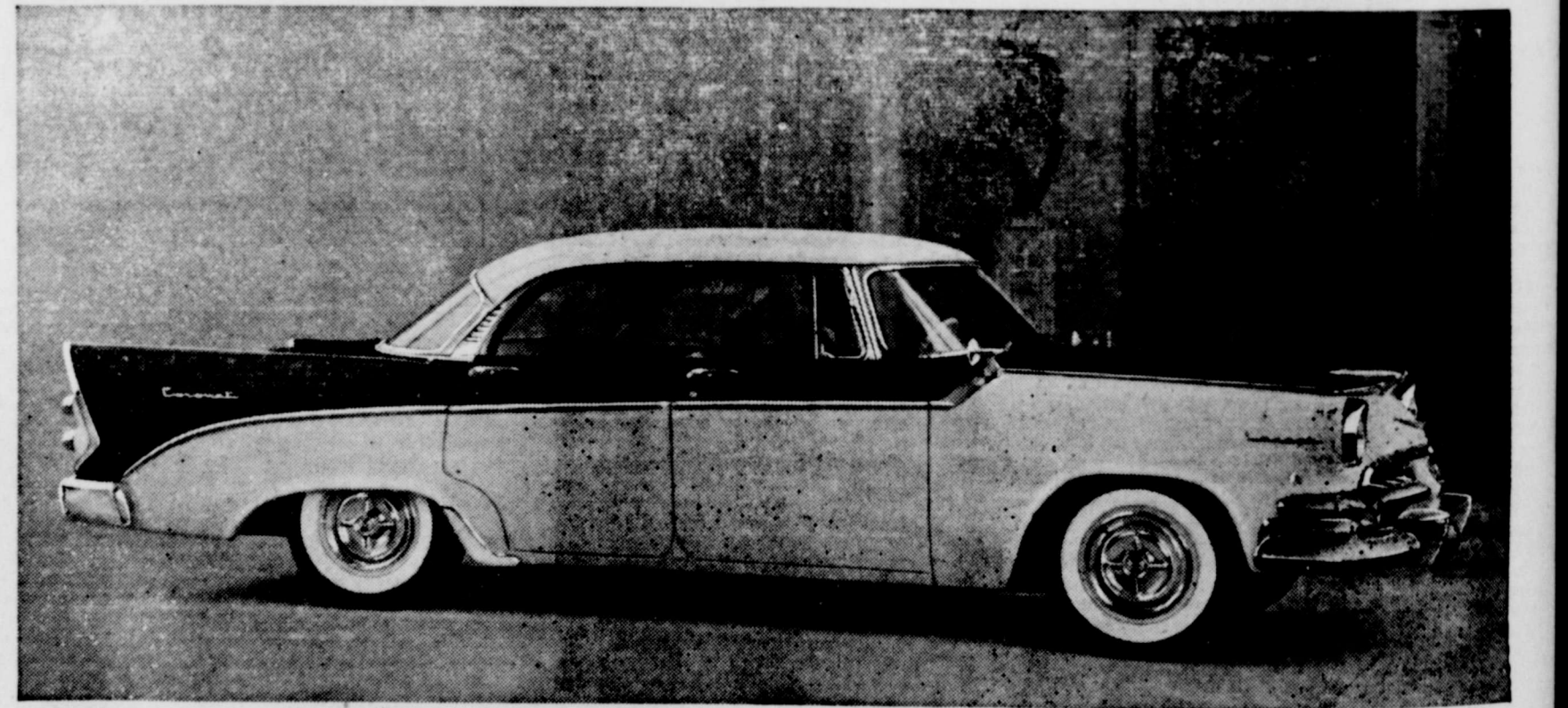

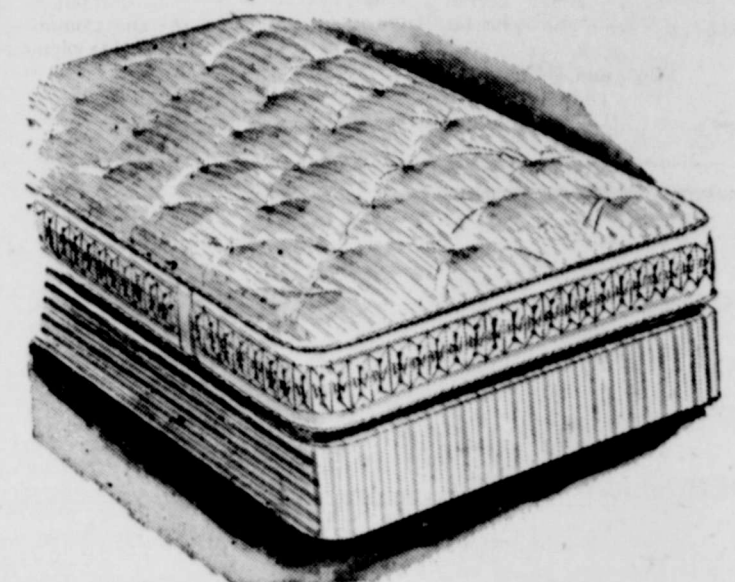

The Home Demonstration Clubs in the county were hosts to the district meeting of the Texas Home Demonstration Association in April when 224 members in a 20-county area attended.

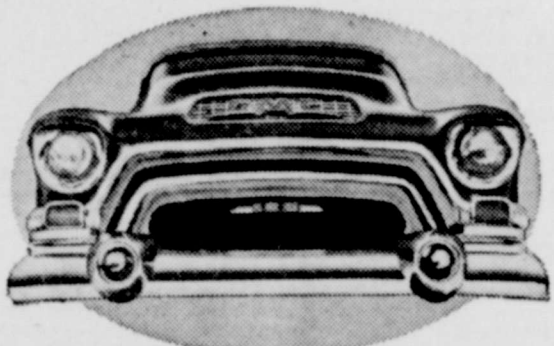

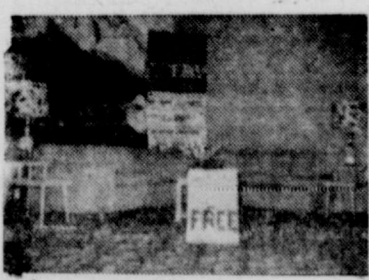

Vetch & Winter Peas increase Value Of Acres and Subsequent Crops

Just what are vetch and winter peas worth? That is a question we are often asked. The answer is that they add from \$7 to \$12 in nitrogen to each acre of soil.

Vetch, when properly inoculated and fertilized with phosphate can be expected to yield from 50 to 75 pounds of free nitrogen per acre plus 5 to 10 tons of humus. The actual nitrogen cost at 15c per pound for 50 pounds of nitrogen would be \$7.50 plus. Many fields will yield more than 50 pounds of nitrogen & naturally the higher volume of growth with the more nitrogen. To get the extra nitrogen and growth, vetch and peas should be left as late in the spring as possible.

All soil in the Cochran Soil Conservation District needs nitrogen badly because the continuous cropping has removed nitrogen at a rapid rate. For instance a bale of cotton removes approximately 66 pounds of nitrogen per acre and 3,000 lbs. of grain sorghum will remove 75 pounds of nitrogen.

Vetch and peas also increase the yields of crops that follow because of the addition of organic matter and soil condition improvement. Where vetch and peas have been used in rotation the following crop of cotton, grain sorghum or corn was increased considerably, and in some instances the yield was doubled.

Vetch and peas will certainly increase the yields of crops by using it one year and will continue and will continue to give an increase when used every year in the rotation. Of course, the purpose of soil improving is to protect and enrich the soil as well as to provide this

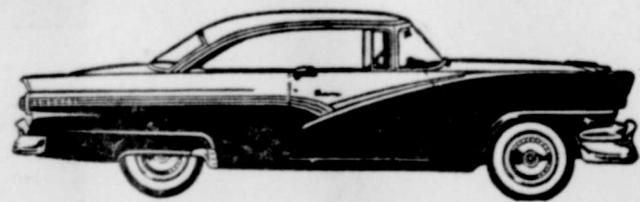
