VETS LAND BOARD NAMED

Albert Morrow, Cochran County Service Officer, Homer Thompson, County Agent and Robert C. Cross, FHA representative, have been appointed to the County Veteran's Land Board by the Cochran County Commissioner's Court.

The action came last week at the regular meeting of the Court.

It is a new office created in the recent re-organization of the Veteran's State Land Board. It is a free gratis job one that requires simply the passing on local or County Veteran's applications. The Veteran must apply to Austin, and he will be sent blanks which he is to fill out and take to the local Board. They refer it to the District appraiser.

The Court's vote was unanimous to nominate and appoint the three men to the board.

In other business at hand the Court heard a group of Whiteface folks ask for an approximate sum of \$2,000 to build a wall around the Whiteface Cemetery and to install an irrigation system.

The group was represented by Cecil Riddle and Jess Burns. They said their plans called for a block fence around the cemetery about 36 inches high. They said they already have the water and merely need to install a pump and pipe on the irrigation system.

The men pointed out that stock is now roaming in the cemetery & the cemetery's condition is generally run down. They said something has to be done soon.

The Court promised to give them an answer as soon as a financial report was available. They were to receive an answer by the end of last week.

Another bit of business concerned the setting of 10 a. m. December 3rd for the newly appointed Fair Directors from each precinct to get together and elect their officers & proceed with whatever preliminary plans they may have for next year's Fair. The Commissioner's each named two persons as directors for next year's Fair.

Named by precincts were: Norman McAnelly and Mrs. Virgil Riley, Precinct One; Ralph Burt and

Mrs. G. C. Keith, Precinct Two; Mr. and Mrs. Gehrome Holloway,

Precinct Three and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph DeBord, Precinct Four.

The Court decided to haul its own Commodities for the Welfare Commodities program to save money on hauling. They also discussed the new regulations on the Commodities program and heard the Judge say that new applicants will have to fill out eight separate requests under the reorganization of the plan. They decided to build a platform to keep perishable commodities off the floor.

Judge Stockdale talked about a possibility of setting up a local Salvation Army office in the same building with the commodities. The idea will be discussed with Salvation Army officials at Littlefield.

According to the results the \$150 was shared among 25 winners. Some of the prizes were awarded.

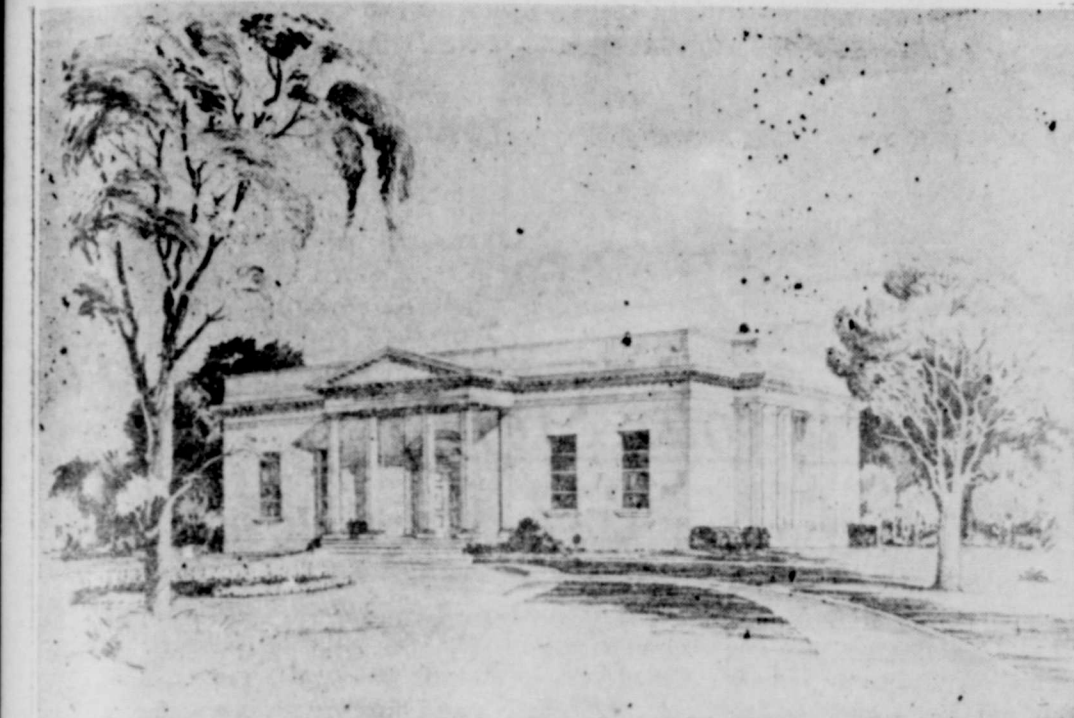

Study Phone Situation

A committee composed of Bill Bridge, Bill Crono, Jack Loran, Merin Roberts and Murry Crono was named Monday by Harold Drenas, Jaycee President, to study the possibility of getting area rural FFA phones tied into the Morton exchange.

Other activity at the regular meeting included plans to have the Jaycees Monday meeting dates put on the Community Birthday Calendar sponsored by the Band Parents club and a financial report on the B-F-Mobecrite game sponsored by the Jaycees.

Guests were Supr. H. A. Reynolds and Coach Claude Morrison of Bula schools, who thanked the club for the holding hand they had in securing the game for Morton & this being it closer to Bula.

Contracts were let some time ago for the construction of FFA dial exchanges at Maple and Lehman. The dial serves the rural area about Morton. In fact, according to reports, rural phones will be in operation by spring it was reported to the group by Bill Glassford.

According to the present plans rural residents desiring to call rural residents will have to pay a toll charge and clear calls as long distance calls.

Recently Earth reached an agreement with their phone company to tie in area rural phones to Earth and thus save toll charges both

from the rural areas into Earth & vice-versa.

Smashing their way to an overwhelming 62-12 victory over Mobeecrite last Thursday night on the Morton field, Bula's powerful Bull dogs qualified for the regional play of today. (Thanksgiving) against the Jayron Jaybirds in a game to be played at Jayton.

Coach Claude Morrison's Bull dogs could be the favorites in the tilt today, their third chance in three years to bring the regional championship to District Two. They won the district crown two years ago and stumbled in the bi-district affair against Mobeecrite. Last year

they got through the bi-district on a tryout in the final of the region against Roaring Springs. This year they evened both those scores, beating Roaring Springs in blasting Mobeecrite last Thursday, an intersectional fray and then the third time could, and if you look at it the way Bula does should be the champion.

The Turkey Day encounter will be played at 2:30 p. m. and District passes will be honored. Others will pay \$1.00 and 50 cents for admission. But even at that, Bula will have ample backing.

In winning their way to the regional final, Jayton whipped the Pain Creek team 33-36 in a game last week. With that decision the Jaybirds have a 9-2 record. They lost a district game to Patton Springs and lost an earlier three point decision to Pain Creek in a non conference game.

Coach Sonny Arthur in his 4th year at Jayton has led his team to two championships, including the three way tie this year, and to two second place finishes.

Morrison, likewise in his 4th season at the helm of Bula has an

even more impressive record with only one loss in the last three years of district play and a third place in his first year. He rates the team this year one of his best with a spotless record thus far.

In fact, it is rumored, some want to see the school forced into 11 man football because of the shambles they've made of district play. But spirit and determination is the key to Morrison's success. The Bula boys like to play ball and for Morrison they go all out.

Last Thursday was a good example. They tore a fair Mobeecrite team to shreds in a game that was only a contest for a few minutes of the first quarter. The Bulldogs scored three times in the first & third periods and twice in each of the other quarters. They never let up, even when the second spring was in the game.

And the type of ball they played was abeauty to behold. They operated as well on defense as on offense. They didn't garner a penalty in the entire game which, after it was over had former Texas Tech great Rick Snider, who was one of the officials, saying their practices as well as their game were hard as well as clean. Burley Roberts was easily the defensive star on a team that played tremendous defensive ball. On offense, a host of ball carriers, Carl Hallord, Gers' Neel, and several others and a fine pass receiver in Jones did exceptionally well.

A sizable crowd of Mortonites as well as Bula fans braved cold weather to witness the game.

Bula Goes for Grid Title Today

Efforts to Hold Cotton Pulling Wage Line Fails; Dept. of Labor Officials Recognize \$1.75 As Prevailing Rate

County Agent Homer E. Thompson said this week, the long and tireless efforts of the past few months to have the regular cotton picking wage scale set at \$1.55, have ended in failure.

He announced this week that he had been advised by the Department of Labor that they have decided to stand pat on their \$1.75 wage and they have ordered this be paid to Mexican National workers.

Here, in the words of the Agent is his summation of the report: "The farmers who attended the meeting of protest held on October 26 will remember that all persons using Mexican Nationals were advised to pay no more than \$1.55 per hundred. If you are a farmer who employed these Nationals and are asked by a Labor Dept. official to

pay more, refuse and state that the price for pulling in your part of the country was \$1.55 and demand a survey for your area of employment.

If a survey is made in your area it will be made around your farm. And, it will be up to you to see that your neighbors know the price paid to workers for pulling cotton. This may never happen, but if it does, it is your ace in the hole — demand a survey around your farm.

Do not get excited if you are requested to pay the \$1.75 — just be calm, and I believe we can whip this by giving neighborly assistance, and if you need more help, you may contact the County Agent in working out your plan of approach.

It seems like this is the time to let sleeping dogs lie. Do not dis-

cuss this problem with the pullers. If the problem come up, we will approach it in a business-like way. The way things look now, it may never come up, but it certainly could and I wanted you to be familiar with how you can handle the problem.

I understand the Department of Labor did not take the figures of the survey taken the night of Oct. 26 in our general farmer's meeting. Had this figure been taken, I don't believe the department could justify establish Cochran County on a rate of \$1.75.

Again let me say, I don't think this matter will come up, but if it does, we have the above survey taken to re-open in the Labor Dept's face.

My advice now is to sit tight, to keep quiet and to let matters roll along.

The body was then taken to Rix Funeral Home in Lubbock. Services were conducted Monday at 2 p. m. in the First Baptist Church of Knox City, with Youngblood's old pastor, Bro. S. E. Stevenson conducting the rites. Masonic rites were read and burial was at the Knox City Cemetery.

Youngblood, a thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Blue Lodge in Knox City, a member of the Scottish Rite lodge in Dallas & also of the Kiva Shrine in Amarillo was a member of the First Baptist Church of Lubbock.

Survivors include his wife, one daughter, Mrs. V. L. Bridges and one grand-daughter, Margaret Ernestine, all of Anton, and several brothers and sisters.

The victim had lived near Anton since 1922 and had previously lived in Lubbock since coming from Knox City in 1944.

Irrigation Wells Are Added By SCD Cooperators

George Hinds, five miles southeast of Morton has drilled an irrigation well located near the center of his farm, and, with the technical assistance of the local Soil Conservation personnel has designed and is in the process of installing a sprinkler system.

Tom Greer, six miles northwest of Morton is also installing a sprinkler system on a pair of newly drilled wells. He plans to connect

these together by the use of steel pipe laved underground.

Ben Rejino, six miles southeast of Morton has installed approximately 1200 feet of concrete pipe for irrigation.

There are many ways a sprinkler or concrete pipe irrigation system can be of advantage for flood irrigation. Some are:

- Requires less maintenance, gives better control and distribution of water; better weed and insect control; saves on labor, and most important allows conservation of water because proper application is available and minimum evaporation is effected.

With Your... COUNTY AGENT

The County Agent met with six 4-H Clubs during November...

Some of the subjects selected to be taught were: beef cattle, safety, entomology, electrical demonstrations, rifle safety and shooting, swine, dairy, land judging, cotton, grain sorghum hybrid production, and soil and water conservation.

The adult leaders elected by the clubs areas follows: Whiteface Hi Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Garrett and Ed Stokes; Bledsoe - Clyde McCormack and J. D. Dye; Morton 5th and 6th Grade - Fred Collins; Morton 7th and 8th - Ken Coffman and A. R. Coleman; Whiteface 5th and 6th Grade - Ray Carter and George Martin; and Whiteface 7th and 8th Grade - H. L. Whittenburg.

May I take this time to express to you leaders how much these 4-H members are depending on you. They have elected you because the boys have confidence in you. They do appreciate your giving of your time and your efforts. We all know this is a "Thank You" job, but it is one of the best jobs in America today.

Some of these jobs for which no value in dollars can be set. The work with these kids pays off in helping make America strong. So please try to attend the regular club meetings and give leadership advice on the questions the boys may happen to ask you. I'm hoping that each of you leaders may be able to mak at least 60 percent of the 4-H club meetings between now and next June.

WHITEFACE - The art department of the Whiteface Junior High school finds there is no limit to subject matter, especially during the recent Armistice Day and the present Thanksgiving seasons. Some of the boys have completed their harvest of cotton. Yields are good to outstanding, but no official figures can be given at this time because gin tickets and record books have not been turned into the county agent's office. If any of the boys need an extra 4-H crop record book, they are requested to get the gin tickets together and bring them into the agent's office and Mrs. Hudson of the Agent will be glad to assist them. Don't forget, the gin tickets are a part of the record and must be brought in. As

Several 4-H Club boys are listing their request with County Agent Homer E. Thompson for enough seed to plant one acre for production of hybrid grain sorghum seed for next year. The boys have agreed to plant on land in 1956 that was not growing grain sorghum or Sudan in 1955. They have also agreed to plant no other grain sorghum within 220 yards of this area.

Of course the club boys must agree to rogue out the off-colored heads from the female stock and the odd sized or odd shaped heads. The work should be done prior to doe stage or between the blooming and doe stage. Following this program the boys may want to become commercial hybrid seed growers.

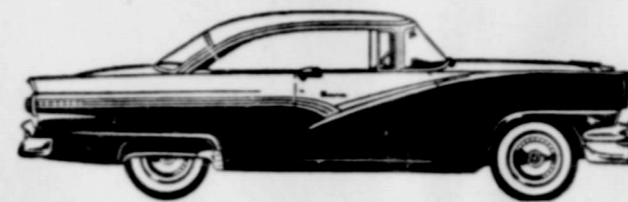
