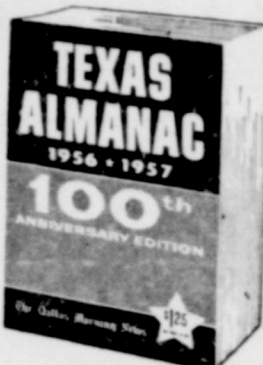

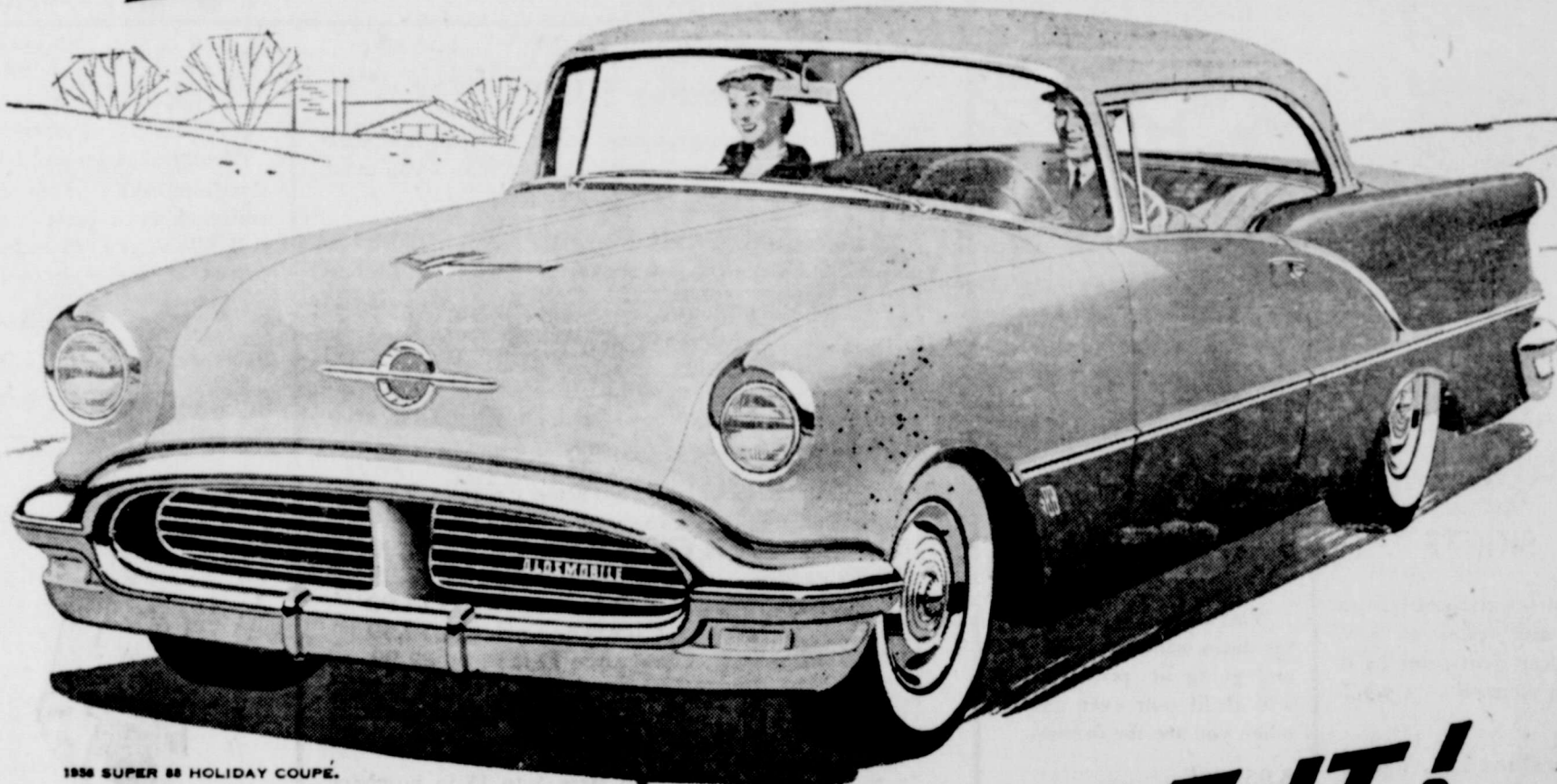

More irrigation systems are being installed in the County to cope with the conservation of irrigation water.

T. Seaman, whose farm is 4 miles northeast of Morton has drilled a new well and is in the process of installing a sprinkler system.

Ray Carter, five miles Southeast of Morton has drilled a well near the center of his farm, and with the technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service personnel, is also installing a sprinkler irrigation system.

Lawrence Smith, whose farm is 12 miles northwest of Morton is installing approximately 3,000 feet of 15 inch concrete pipe as a means of conserving irrigation water.

To date 100 lbs. of switch grass, 100 lbs. of ovalle side oats grama grass, 500 lbs. of Indian grass and 100 lbs. of weeping love grass for seed production has been ordered by cooperators of the Cochran Soil Conservation District. These seed will be planted in 40 inch rows in order that the grass can be cultivated. This lot of seed will plant approximately 400 acres.

Others have indicated that they will plant different grasses for seed production.

H. V. Waller, another cooperator who lives three miles west of town plans to try Hairy Vetch for seed production. The crop for seed will be planted in February. This is strictly a trial planting and will be seeded in good grain sorghum stubble. H. V. has a sprinkler system.
