FOREHAND SEEKS RE-ELECTION; IS 3RD COUNTIAN TO ANNOUNCE

One more candidate has authorized the Morton Tribune to announce his candidacy for re-election.

A. D. Forehand, long-time resident and incumbent in the office of Justice of the Peace, Pol. One, will be a candidate in the coming Democratic primaries.

Forehand's announcement brought to a total of five the number of announced candidates for the announcements for County office, but so far there are no contests.

Forehand is completing his second consecutive two year term of office and this will be after his third term, but his first four year term under the new laws.

Other candidates already announced are Hazel Hancock for Sheriff, Mrs. Otha Denny for the new office to be created, Assessor-Collector of County taxes, Carroll Cobb of Lubbock candidate for State Senator and J. O. Gillham, Brownfield banker, candidate for reelection as State Representative from the 98th District.

Gillham Announces for Re-election As 98th District Representative

State Representative J. O. Gillham announced today that he would be a candidate for re-election to the House of Representatives in the forthcoming Democratic primaries.

Mr. Gillham was first elected to the House in 1922 to represent the people of the newly created 98th Representative District and was re-elected in 1924 both times without opposition. Representative Gillham, who is a widely known banker, was appointed on some of the most important committees during both terms he has served as a member of the House of Representatives.

He was a member of the important Appropriations Committee during his first term and was also the vice-chairman of this committee in his second term.

He was also a member of Banks and Banking, State Affairs, Conservation and Reclamation, Municipal and Private Corporations in addition to some minor committees.

Gillham has been active in Democratic Party affairs for many years, and has been a delegate to several State Conventions. He took an active part in the Presidential Campaign in 1928 and made several speeches in the interest of the Democratic National Candidates. Mr. Gillham stated that he had never been cross filed, nor had he ever failed to support the nominee of the Democratic party.

Here is Mr. Gillham's statement: "In making this announcement of my candidacy for re-election to the House of Representatives for the 98th Representative District composed of Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties, I do so with the thought in mind that my experience as your Representative during the past two regular sessions and one special session, should make me better qualified to continue to serve the people of the 98th District. Although I consider myself a conservative, yet I have never been charged with being a reactionary; neither have I been labeled a flaming radical, although I have voted for progressive legislation.

During the two terms I have served, I have voted to increase appropriations for Education, Highways, Hospitals and other state departments where I felt that additional funds were needed to make Texas a better place in which to live. I have always opposed any sort of deficit financing, therefore, I have voted for ample taxes to support additional appropriations. I don't think that it is honest to vote for tax bills. That sort of voting is, in my opinion, demagoguery of the worst kind.

I want to give you very briefly, some of the legislation which I have sponsored. I was the author of the House bill which created the Commission on Higher Education.

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PICKUPS, CARS ALL SOLD, DARICEK SAYS

No Definite Delivery Date Is Set On Army 'Surplus' Pick-ups and Cars

We aren't making anymore deals for pickup trucks and automobiles through Army surplus and we never have contemplated making any deals for jeeps," said Alec Daricek, Maple area farmer, Friday.

He was speaking concerning the 'Army Surplus' deal that has kept area folks talking the past month, about which most of them have known very little.

Daricek and his son Jimmy, who admit they can't help but feel a little responsible for the flood of folks wanting Army surplus vehicles at bargain rates came to the Tribune office to give what is the official word on the deals as they now stand, and to correct some wrong information the Tribune had received.

First, and foremost on their minds was to say they are making no more deals. All of the pickups and autos that were supposed to be deliverable are now sold. They never did know anything about any possibilities of selling jeeps.

The second thing they wanted to get straight was that they haven't gone to San Antonio to pickup and deliver any of the vehicles and, at this time, do not contemplate in doing so.

The third thing they want to be reported is that they did not know, as of Friday afternoon, anything definite on the proposed delivery of the vehicles.

"All we want now," the elder Daricek said "is to wait and see what develops and then get the thing over with."

All the Dariceks know is what they have been told. They have checked with Clyde McKnight, the nephew of Alec by marriage, who is attempting to deliver the cars and pickups. As soon as he is able to deliver them he will let them know.

The whole thing started as the relative was to try to get Alec and Jimmy some pickups. They were telling some friends and when Alec was visiting recently, some of the friends asked Jimmy if they could get some of the vehicles. He told them he could sell all he could get in Ft. Worth, but agreed to try to help them as a favor. From that point on, the whole thing snowballed. Everyone who heard about it wanted one. Now, some may be a little jittery, but there's no cause for it. Jimmy says he's still got all but two of the checks that were handled through him and if anyone wants his money back he can sure have it.

He did note a few more discrepancies in the stories, but rumors have been flying so thick and fast he asked the Tribune to check with him before saying anything more.

Just to get the records straight, here's some more of the information the Dariceks were originally told. The pickups are 1933 models, Fords and Chevrolet and the cars are 1931 models Fords and Chevrolet. All are new, that is, unused, they are sold for \$500 and are to come equipped with bumpers, dry batteries and four tires. The state tax of about \$5.50 will have to be paid and the Dariceks were told nothing about a Federal tax.

That's what they know up to this time and the Tribune will try to keep in contact with them for any further information.

Reuben Senterfitt Is Candidate For Governorship

Reuben Senterfitt, first announced candidate for the governorship of Texas in the coming Democratic primary, released a statement this week as he filed his official application and the required fees.

Said Senterfitt, "Today I filed official application and the required fees to become a candidate for Governor in the Democratic Primary on July 28th thus becoming the first candidate to do so.

Unlike the "old pros" of Texas closed shop politics, I do not believe it is "too early" for Texans to begin thinking about the important political decisions they face this year. I did not think it was too early when I announced for the office last June.

Many thousands of people in this state do not think it is too early either. . . . I have been hearing from them ever since I first announced, and the response to my television speech last month could only be described as overwhelming.

I would like, through the press, radio and TV to thank the many thousands of people who have sent me Christmas and New Year's greetings. In the spirit of the season I would like to say that along with the vast majority of right thinking people of Texas I hope to help bring about a true revival of the principles which made Texas great at the time when my grandfather came to San Saba County - when a man's word was his bond; when public office was a sacred trust; when public welfare meant more than catchy vote-getting slogans and personal gain; when a man was what he was without apology or concealment.

Particularly at this season of the year I want to pledge to the people of Texas that we will work together to entrust the authority of Texas government to those who will give conscientious obedience to the basic moral principles and the laws of our state not in many words but IN PURITY OF ACTION.

 I am proud of the fact that I co-authored the bill passed by the first called session of the 53rd Legislature which increased the sala-

ries of our public school teachers. I voted for a big increase in tax on beer and opposed the 2 cent gasoline tax. I voted for an increase in corporation franchise tax, although this directly affected me, since most of my personal assets consist of stocks in corporation. I opposed a general sales tax a-

ment to the tax bill. I also voted for an amendment to the tax bill which would have placed a tax on natural gas being sold out of the state. I am sorry, however, that it failed to pass. It was largely through my efforts that the 3c per \$100 of assessed valuation water amendment resolution was killed in the House, after it had passed the Senate. I did not feel then, and I have not changed my opinion, that it was Democratic or fair to levy an ad-valorem tax on all of the people of Texas in order to provide a few dollars along the Trinity, Colorado, or Brazos Rivers. I took the position that the people who would get the benefits from the building of the dams, should pay for them through a water user's tax. I am still proud of the part I had in killing this vicious legislation, though I do realize that we have a water problem in this State and I did lend my support to all good water legislation.

County Agent Gives '55 Report

During the year 1955 the following work was done by the Cochran County Agricultural Agent. He made 899 farm and home visits, he traveled 17,711 miles while on office business and 1657 people came by the office requesting information. The office handled 1396 telephone calls. He turned in 60 news columns and articles to newspapers & appeared on television three times. A total of 2609 Extension bulletins were distributed by the local county agent's office. Fourteen adult result demonstrations were conducted in 1955. An adult demonstration is conducted by a farmer or other person under direct supervision of the extension worker, to show the value of a recommended practice. Ten training meetings were held

for local leaders, with an attendance of 196. The local leaders held 6 meetings with an attendance of 180. Nine training meetings were held by the County Agent for the 4-H Club leaders. The attendance at these was 174. These leaders held 20 meetings with an attendance of 410. The agent held or participated in 51 other meetings with a total attendance of 5860. These were all for adults. He held or participated in 65 meetings for 4-H Club members, with an attendance of 3644.

The agent worked 297 days during the year. Of this time 180 days was devoted to adult work & 117 to 4-H club work. Enrolled in the 7 organized boys 4-H clubs were 187 boys and 36 others were not enrolled in a club. Of the 213 total, 113 completed at least one demonstration. Quite a few of the boys are enrolled in more than one demonstration and completed more than one. Boys received definite training in

judging, giving demonstrations, group recreation leadership, money management, farm and home safety, citizenship, soil and water conservation. Three families were enrolled in

the Farm and Home Development Demonstration. The agent showed movies to groups 28 times with attendance of 115. Slides were shown 28 times with 200 attending.

SEED PLANTING

Plans are made early for 1956 crops and planting seeds. Farmers who have decided on the 1956 crops and who need seed for the variety selected, can contact the county agent who will be glad to assist you in getting these seeds. The earlier you get these seeds, the safer you'll be in having them on hand when you wish to plant. And, too, the price of the seed now will likely be less.

For example, 1956 approved practices for payment of seed is now in effect for grain sorghums being interplanted with area Chinese Red or Iron Clay peas in Cochran County. This practice allows 10c per pound for the peas. If seed peas are purchased now, this allowance will just about pay for the seed. To wait until May or June, the price will likely be doubled.

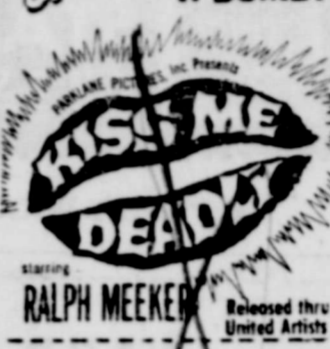
