BROWNFIELD (Sp) — State Representative J. O. Gilliam of Brownfield is in Washington this week to contact members of Congress and Agriculture Department officials in connection with the farm credit situation.

Those accompanying Gilliam include Fred Barker, Levelland; Everett Fulgham, Lubbock; Burton Hackney, Brownfield; Irby Metcalf, Post; John J. Kendrick of Brownfield and A. M. Muldrow of Brownfield. Others in the area it was indicated, may join the group later in the week.

Rep. Gilliam stated that the purpose of the Washington trip was to find out if some kind of reasonable long range financing program can be worked out for our farmers. We also want to find out what the programs already set up are doing.

"We want to find out, if we can," the state legislator continued "who is to blame for the apparent complete breakdown of our farm credit program. Administrators of the various farm programs blame the Congress and Congress blame the same on the Administrators. So we just want to find out who is to blame and who the head man really is all we have had up to now."

CITY UNDERGOING BUILDING BOOM

Mortons building boom, one of the first real booms in building in several years in this city, continues unabated this week as others announced plans for building.

The official announcement from the First State Bank was made as the plans and architect's drawing of the newest depository were placed on display at the bank. It will be constructed across the street diagonally from the Activities Building.

Meanwhile Parnell Schon, local mechanic, also announced plans to open a new business, an automobile repair shop, south of Tarver's Service Station, as soon as a new building is completed.

At the same time several houses are under construction on the Slaughter land, across from the Hospital Road, in and near the location of the softball field. At least three homes are already set for this general area.

The Morton band will leave Morton at 6:45 a.m. and arrive back in Morton at approximately 5:30 p.m.

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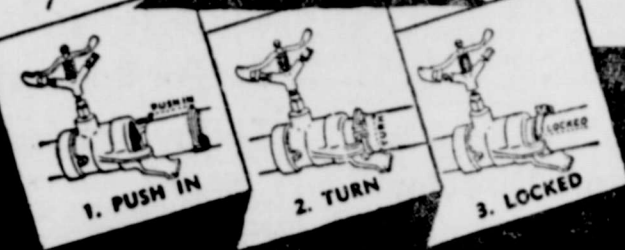

MISLEADING VERSE

A person once said, "Explain Acts 2:38. Why is a verse so misleading placed in the Bible?"

The passage reads: "Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins..." It means that for one to enjoy the blessings of forgiven sins he must turn from error and be baptized in the name of Christ.

The verse is not misleading as is supposed. Rather the doctrine that man can be saved before and without baptism makes harmony with the plain statement of Acts 2:38 impossible.

Many religionists do not want to admit that baptism is of vital connection with salvation. They try to explain away those verses, as the above, that declare such a connection. Some say that "for" in this instance means "because of."

Yet, whatever men may say to explain away baptism in order to "the remission of sins" they are wrong. Suppose they should succeed and prove that baptism is "because of remission." In order to escape from one difficulty they run head-on into another.

The same word is used in Matt. 26:28: "For this is my blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." If "for" in Acts 2:38 means "because of" then it means the same thing in Matt. 26:28 & thus you have Jesus saying his blood was shed BECAUSE their sins had already been remitted.

The sentence in Acts 2:38 has a compound predicate made up of the terms "repent" and "be baptized" joined by the coordinate conjunction "and." Both are modified by the phrase "for the remission of sins." What is said of one must be true of the other. If baptism is "because of the remission of sins" then so also is repentance. One is to repent because his sins are remitted! Nonsense! It is evident that one must repent in order to have remittance of sins, and baptism is for the same purpose — in order to the remission of sins.

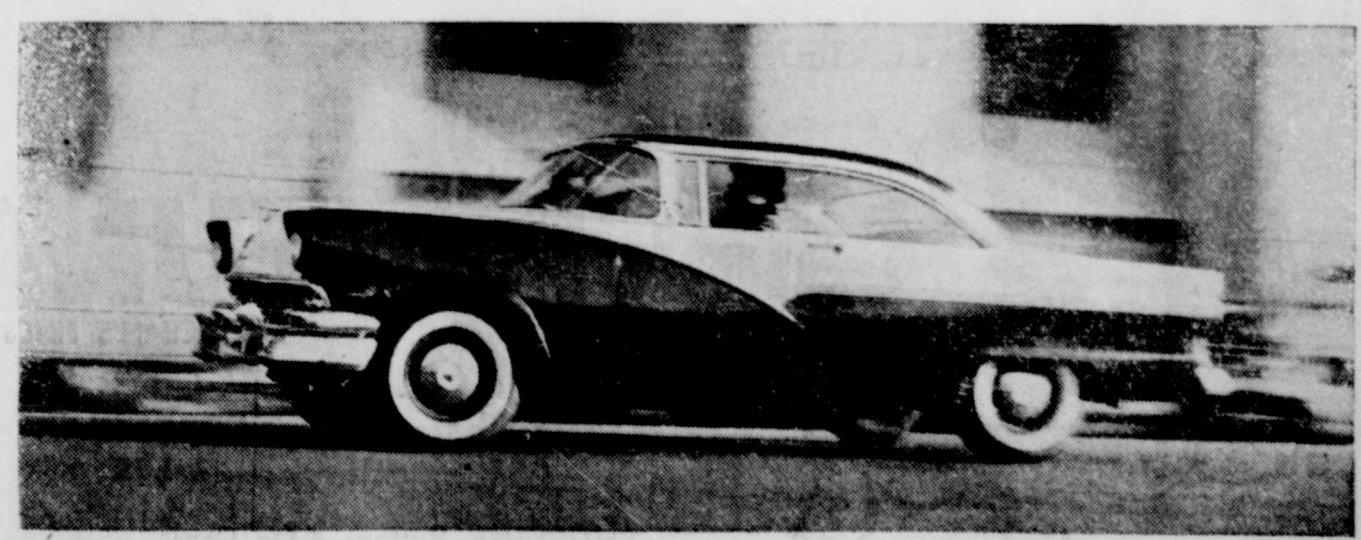
