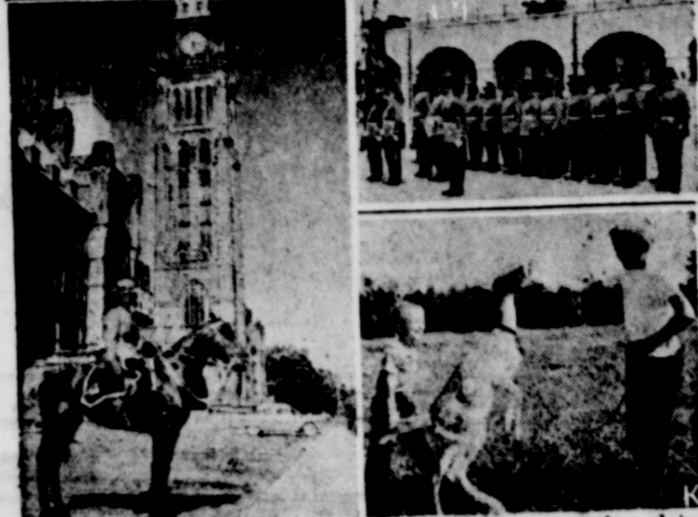
Several farmers have been inquiring about elephant grass in the County Agent's office. As you may note from several news articles lately - this is being promoted.

attachment can be used for early weed control. This is followed by one or two cultivations. Care should be taken not to build up a ridge around the drill to such an extent that the lower beans are covered.



TEXAS FHA HEAD TELLS OF SUCCESS OF LOANS PROGRAM TO FARMERS

More than \$19,800,000 has been borrowed by farmers for soil and water conservation since this type of credit was made available a little more than a year ago, Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director for the State of Texas announced in a pre-press release recently.

Farmers used the loans to improve their farms and increase the efficiency of their operations.

A report recently made by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson shows that about 79 percent of the funds were used for irrigation including the purchase of pumps and piping, the drilling of wells and the construction and repair of irrigation ditches and laterals. Irrigation systems were developed or improved for about 282,000 acres.

In Texas, through December 31, 1955, 85 percent of the \$2,282,000 loans used for irrigation. Irrigation systems were developed or improved for more than 34,603 acres. The remainder of the funds was used for such soil conservation measures as terracing and pasture improvement, and developing water systems for household use and farm livestock.

"We expect that during the coming months, and particularly in the Great Plains Area, farmers will use a larger portion of the funds they borrow to finance soil conservation measures," McKay said. "We have held a number of meetings in cooperation with Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, and other agricultural agencies to make certain that all farmers know that funds are available for soil and water conservation loans."

"Increased yields from this type of loan are already apparent, but not, of course, to the extent they will be after the changed system of farming is in full operation," McKay said. For example, in Dawson County, an \$11,200 loan for ir-

rigation was made in May of 1955. This was too late for the farmer to pre-irrigate much of his cotton land. He irrigated 62 acres and harvested 63 bales of cotton without using any fertilizer this year. Dryland cotton in this area on similar land made about 1.3 of a bale per acre. He pre-watered approximately 60 acres of land planted to milo and applied water one time after planting. It yielded 2500 lbs. where his dryland milo yielded only 500 lbs. per acre. In addition to watering his row crops, he seeded a two-acre plot to alfalfa and this provided a good hog and cow pasture. He seeded an 8-acre plot to vetch and oats and now has a good pasture. At the time the loan was made the farmer had 10 head of livestock and two brood sows. He now has 20 head of livestock and 21 hogs and has sufficient pasture and feed to take care of them. He has a good poultry program. By having the winter pasture and vetch, this farmer is utilizing his irrigation system year-round, and is successful in his farming operations where other farmers in the area, hard hit by drought, are having to go deeper into debt to continue their operations.

Private lenders provide most of the funds from which these loans are made. The Farmers Home Administration makes and services the loans and insures repayment of the funds advanced. Farmers pay 4 1/2 percent in interest or in interest and insurance charges for the loans. The loans are scheduled for repayment within the shortest period of time consistent with the

ability of the borrower to repay. The maximum repayment period on loans to individuals is 20 years. To be eligible for a soil and water conservation loan, a farmer must have reasonable prospects of conducting successful farming operations. He must also be unable to obtain the necessary credit on reasonable terms from private lending sources.

Applications for soil and water conservation loans may be made at the county offices of the Farmers Home Administration. The local County Farmers Home Administration committee determines the eligibility for these loans.
