## COCHRAN COTTON GROWERS ASS. OPENS FINANCE DRIVE FRIDAY

The Cochran Cotton Growers' Association, bolstered by the addition of a few weeks ago of two directors from the Whiteface area and the prospect of support from that area on problems that affect the County's cotton situation, will hold a financial drive Friday.

The drive will be in the form of a double breakfast at which members of the Finance Committee and their workers will make their plans and then move out to contact everyone interested in helping support the Association. One breakfast will be in Morton, where T. K. (Ty) Williamson, as chairman of the finance drive, and other members of his committee will begin their rounds of local businesses. Names and contributions to this important project will be published in the Tribune at a later date.

The other breakfast will be in Whiteface where Hubert Taylor is in charge of the finance drive, and they will contact Whiteface businessmen.

More than \$1500 was collected in a day or two after the association was formed about a month ago. At that time they announced that farmers should pay about 10 to 15 cents per bale on cotton harvested the previous fall. Later they said businessmen members should "let their consciences be their guide."

At a directors meeting, Monday night, Williamson was appointed finance chairman and on his committee were named J. D. Hawthorne, M. A. Tanner, Lloyd Miller and Hubert Taylor.

The directors originally elected at the first meeting were Willard Cox, president; Peques Houston & Bailey Kern, farmer representatives and Leonard Coleman and E. O. (Red) Willingham, businessmen.

## Car License Plates To Be On Sale At Whiteface, Sat.

With the deadline for the sale of license plates for 1956 drawing near, the office of Sheriff Hazel Hancock will be in Whiteface Saturday, March 24th from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. to issue license plates.

One week later is the deadline, Saturday, March 31st. The office will be closed, as usual, at noon on that date and folks who have not purchased their new plates are urged to do so as soon as possible to avoid waiting in line.

Driving a car without the new tags, after the March 31 deadline is punishable by fine.

## Bucky Walters Head Coach Here Resigns Position

W.B. (Bucky) Walters, head grid coach for Morton High school for the past two years, and previous to that, Junior High coach has tendered his resignation, effective immediately, as of the date on the resignation, Friday, (tomorrow) March 23.

The resignation was accepted by the school board at a special meeting Saturday night, but they did not announce any plans for replacement.

Walters, who said he has already accepted another job in a "considerably larger" city, will be out of the coaching profession, at least temporarily. He did not announce his destination.

However, in a story he had put in the Avalanche Journal this week Walters was stated as saying he did not have a job yet.

## James F. Moore Is Candidate

James F. Moore, 3222-26th St., Lubbock, Texas, announces his candidacy for District Attorney of the 72nd Judicial District, subject to the Democratic Primary.

He is a native Texan, although he did live in New Mexico just prior to his enrollment in the University of Texas in 1939; he received his BA degree there in January, 1943. He then went into the Air Forces, served overseas and was honorably discharged in 1946.

He then enrolled in the Law School of Southern Methodist University and received his LLB degree in 1948. He was licensed to practice law in 1948.

In 1949 he moved to Lubbock from Soden where he had maintained his office for the general practice of law. In Lubbock, he was employed by the City of Lubbock in the Legal Department where he remained two and one half years. He handled the cases wherein the Corporation Court had jurisdiction and prosecuted misdemeanor cases.

He helped in civil cases where the City of Lubbock was a party, wrote ordinances; helped on the right of way purchases; and handled other legal matters for the City.

In February, 1952, James F. Moore was named Assistant District Attorney for the 72nd Judicial District; and has remained in the office to this time. For the past eighteen months he has been the first Assistant District Attorney. During the four years he has had extensive experience in investigating cases, filing cases, drafting indictments, presenting the cases to the Grand Jurors of the Counties in the District, trying cases, working on cases that have been appealed, all of which qualifies him for the office he is seeking. Also, he has represented the State of Texas in civil matters that have been filed in the name of the State, such as injunctions and damage suits.

Here is his statement: "During the past four years as an Assistant District Attorney, I have become thoroughly familiar with all phases of the duties of the District Attorney.

"My experience includes investigating cases, drafting and presenting indictments to Grand Jurors, prosecuting all types of criminal cases in the District Courts, and working on cases appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

"I know what tremendous responsibilities go with the office of District Attorney, but I feel that my extensive experience qualifies me for the job and justifies my asking the people for a promotion.

"If promoted, I pledge diligent and faithful performance of all the duties of the office and an impartial service to all citizens."

Moore is married to the former Miss Pat Smith of Falls and they have a daughter, Linda Gail, 20 months old. He attends St. Elizabeths Catholic Church. Mrs. Moore is a member of the First Baptist Church.

He is a member of the American Bar Association, State Bar of Texas, Lubbock County Bar Association, the American Business Club where he serves on the projects committee; South Plains Trust & Estates Council; he is President of the Phi Kappa Alpha Fraternity Alumni of Lubbock, and a member of Delta Theta Phi Legal Fraternity.

## FAT STOCK SHOW APRIL 6-7

Planning committees began the last two weeks work on preparing details for the Cochran County Fat Stock Show to be held in the County barn, east of Morton, April 6-7.

County Agent Homer Thompson, told the Morton Lions' Club Wednesday that most of the plans have been completed and estimated about 100 to 115 fat barrows; 18

lams and 15 or 16 calves will be entered in the competition.

One of the innovations this year, Thompson said, was for the judging of calves to be done Friday evening starting at 6:30 p.m. The reason for having this at night instead of in the afternoon as previously done, is to give more of the boys, the merchants, and the

interested farmers a chance to see the actual judging and see how the top animals are determined.

Paul Gross will do the sifting on Friday morning after all animals are in place by the 9 a. m. deadline. Jack Bourland, representing Swift and Company packers out of Ft. Worth will do the judging for the entire show.

The sale begins promptly at 10 a.m. Saturday morning, April 7th. Thompson urged the support of the show and of the 4-H and FFA boys who will have animals shown. This is a County Show, he pointed out and it is the only show in which most of the 4-H boys have animals entered. Local and other County FFA boys have entered the Levelland and Lubbock shows.

Raymond King of Lubbock has notified Peques Houston, chairman of the committee in charge of selecting the winners of the herdman awards, that he will be glad to serve in that capacity.

Hank Matthews of Anton, well known area auctioneer, will handle the sale and of course a committee of local businessmen and farmers is at work in promoting the sale already. J. W. McDermott said as soon as they get a list of the entries they will prepare the sales sheet.

The show this year is for fat stock only, all breeding animals having been ruled out. This new ruling was passed to save the breeding animals for the Stock show to be held in conjunction with the 'F' in the fall of the year.

This will also be the last time the Fat Stock Show will be held so late in the year if rules that were recently adopted are adhered to. In January, the Fat Stock Show committee voted to have the show on the first Friday and Saturday in March in future years. That way the show will be over with before the Hockley and Lubbock shows are held.

Other survivors include two brothers, Marvin Jones of Wichita Falls and R. E. of Vernon, and two sisters, Ozella Bernbelow of Vernon and Bessie Clark of Anadarko, Oklahoma and four grandsons.

At least one Board member also made it clear that Bucky's won and lost record hadn't anything to do with the firing.

The Board re-hired the only teacher they had not acted upon at the meeting a week ago Monday, in their Saturday session. They hired him by a unanimous vote, citation at Whiteface.

A nice crowd was on hand for an open house, Thursday night.

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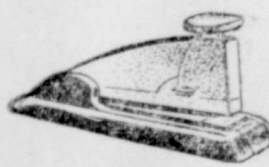
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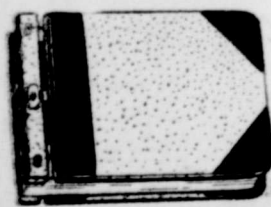

**WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"**

While there are perhaps pros and cons concerning the investigation of the automotive business carried on by a committee headed by Senator Mahoney, the probe has established one thing.

The Congress of the United States still exercises considerable power, if and when it chooses to exercise that power.

Of course, exercise of that power is becoming rarer and as Senator Jenner recently pointed out, there is a substantial alliance of bureaucrats who have been consistently for the past two decades trying to take power away from Congress, aided by some of the most high powered tax paid press agents of all times.

Yet most powerful corporation in country, perhaps world, recognized this power of Congress.

Even while the head of this great automotive concern was still on the witness stand, the corporation announced an end to its "sudden death" system of writing dealer franchises.

Instead of a dealer, who of necessity has a great investment in his dealership, being kept under thumb by a franchise subject to cancellation at the end of any year, franchises would now be for five year's duration.

It is also significant at recent national automobile dealers convention the dealers started telling the factories about some of the oppressive policies they will no longer tolerate.

Undoubtedly, the knowledge that a Senatorial committee was concerned about their situation was a great impetus to them.

Actually, there are still some people, some in high government posts, who feel that the greatest expression of American achievement is to be found in Big Autos.

Perhaps it smacks of bringing up age old riddle of the precedence of the egg over the chicken, or visa versa, supreme achievement of American business system would undoubtedly be fact there came into being an independent corps of dealers willing to invest substantially to sell and service cars.

This was accomplished by independent businessmen with integrity to live with a proposition a long time, with courage to put up all their cash and credit. Without these independent businessmen, Detroit could still be an obscure Indian trading post.

Yet in the modern growth of huge corporations, management now composed of employees instead of owners, tend to have forgotten what made the corporation, what permits it to exist. And it is perhaps that the mind of management, being that of employees, is incompatible with the minds of independent businessmen who are not only dealers, but employers.

Thus, it was fortunate that Senator Mahoney and his colleagues recognized the creeping "Corporate Socialism" and took steps to curb its growth.

After all, the automotive business has become vital to the welfare of the entire nation. A few cannot be permitted to play ducks and drakes with it. Anyone doubting this has to but imagine what would happen to their local community if all the independent auto dealers in it disappeared. In any given community independent auto dealers are not only community pillars, but also important employers.

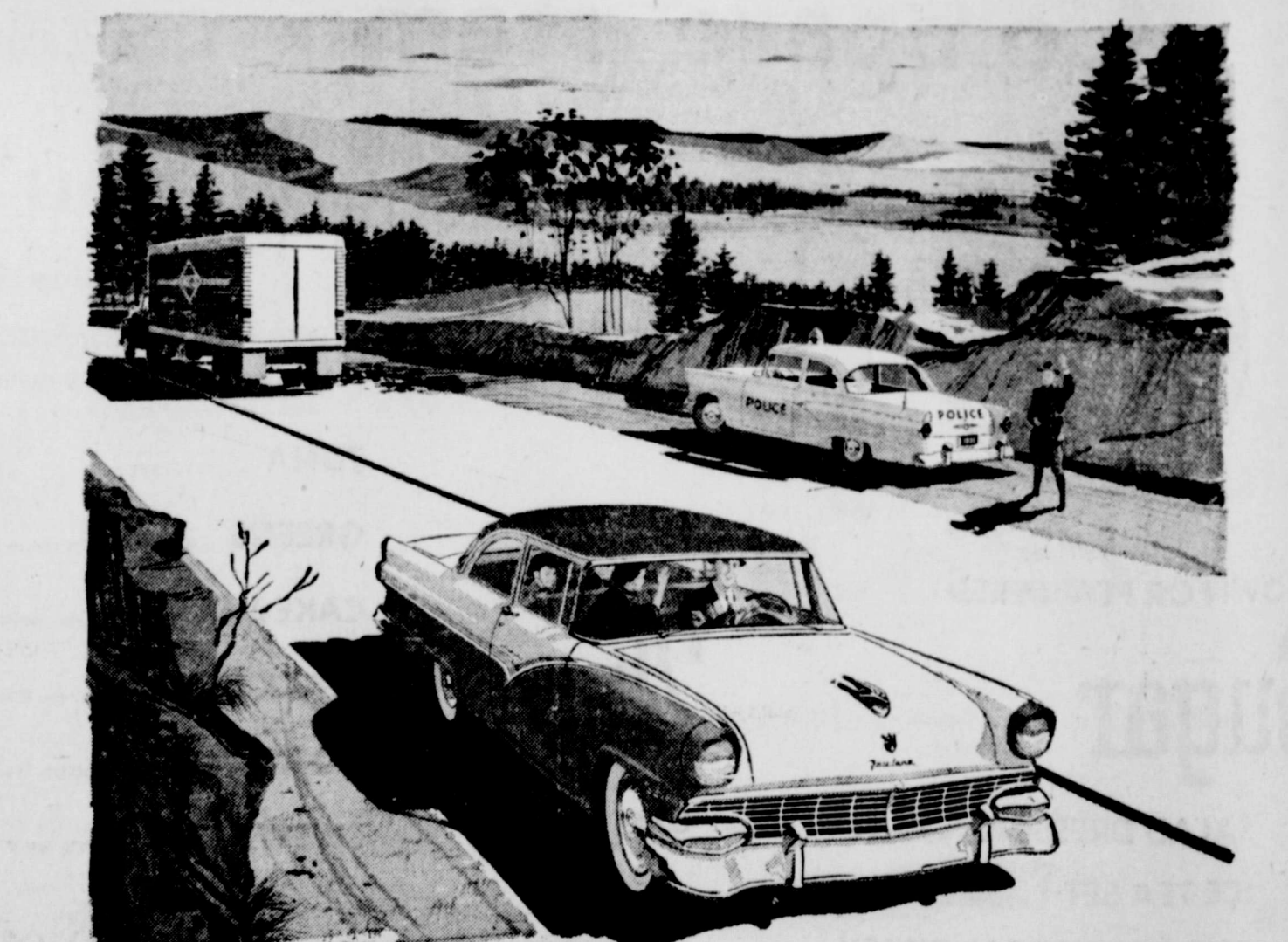

### LOSS OF PLANT FOOD

Producing pasture plants remove plant food from the soil unless the losses are replaced. For example, a ton of grass hay contains about 30 lbs. of nitrogen, 10 lbs. of phosphoric acid and 30 lbs. of potash.

... or the equivalent of 100 lbs of ammonia nitrate, 50 lbs of two percent superphosphate, and 50 lbs. of muriate of potash. Too, a ton of legume hay contains 25 percent more plant food element, than grass.

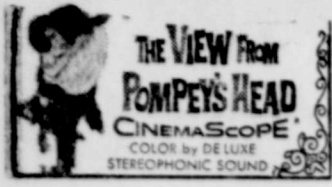
Most of our soils are high in potash; so up to now, that is not a needed element. But phosphorus is lacking. Both phosphate and potash should be worked into the soil where needed - usually ahead of planting. Our soil is usually high in lime; so phosphate and potash should be banded for most efficient use.

Mixed fertilizers should be applied on temporary pastures before or at planting time advises E. M. Trew, Pasture Specialist.

Cool season grasses, such as fescue or perennial rye should be fertilized in early fall ahead of the growing season. Warm season grasses - as Bermuda or blue panic should be fertilized in early spring ahead of growing season.

### IMPORTANT ITEM TO FARMERS

Let me urge all cotton farmers to keep records of your cotton enterprise. Keep all cotton records for at least 10 years, it may come in handy. Keep records on tracts of land designated by legal description. If several tracts are given on one work sheet, for your safety, please break it down by units showing acres planted on each tract by legal description, and too it may be best to keep yield records on these same units. Land changes hands and land under one worksheet in 1955 may not be the same as in 1953. The landlords may be the same and different tenants may have farmed it. It is up to the tenants and landlord to keep this cotton history. It is to the landlord's advantage to keep this history annually by getting the information from the tenant who worked it. If it becomes necessary to prove your cotton history - better have these records filed in a safe keeping place. We are in a control period and we never know what next year's demands may be. Gin tickets are very important; so it would be a good idea to know and have a record of lbs. of lint produced from each legal tract of land by possessing gin tickets or have a record of bales ginned at each gin and the weights of each bale of cotton.

This may sound like a lot of baloney, but this county has consistently lost cotton acres because no record was kept. Example, a record of acres measured in cotton in 1955 in July may not be the amount of acres planted to cotton in May of the same year. The planted acres and growing acres are not the same. Keep a record of planted acres. The lack of information on how many acres were planted has cost this county plenty of allotment acres.

Let me say here, when your cotton acres are measured in 1956, if the land growing cotton is less than your allotment, show the man where you planted cotton in 1956 that is not growing cotton; so you can get credit for having planted your full acreage allotment. It could have been hailed or blown out. If you do not plant your full allotment, turn the acres back to the County ASC committee to give
