Capt. Doss had been in the Army 19 years, having served as a special investigator for the armed forces in Berlin and other European cities. He had also served as European bodyguard for Gen. Dwght D. Eisenhower, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgeway and Margaret Tru-

Capt. Doss attended schools in Ralls, Littlefield and Sudan. He joined the Army while living in Sudan where his mother formerly resided.

While working as a special investigator. Capt. Doss led a raid to close down an internationally famous counterfeiting ring in Berlin and helped search for hidder Nazi treasure

Capt. Doss was a member of special EUCOM investigation detachment of six men conceded to be among the best detectives in Europe. These men specialized in major international crime ring activities such as counter eiting, narcotics smuggling, fraud and large scale black marketing Once, in an internationally publicized raid, Doss, two other Army seized counterfeiters while their presses were turning out military ayment certificates just before

IMPORTANT ITEM TO FARM'RS Let me urge all cotton faremrs o keep records of your cotton entrprise. Keep all cotton records for at least 10 years, it may come in handy. Keep records on tracts land designated by legal desiption. If several tracts are givon one work sheet, for your sa please break it down by unts showing acres planted on each act by legal description, and too may be best to keep yield recrds on these same units. Land hanges hands and land under one worksheet in 1955 may not be the ame as in 1953. The landlords nay be the same and different tenants may have farmed it. It is up to the tenants and landlord to keep this cotton history. It is to the land lord's advantage to keep this history annually by getting the infor mation from the tenant who worked it.
