Two Get Three Year Sentences Monday; Two 3-Year Sentences Are Also Probated In 72nd District Court

Two three year penitentiary sentences and two three year probation sentences were handed out in District Court here early this week by Judge Victor H. Lindsey, and no cases on the docket were consumed.

Hubert Baker, wanted on other felony charges around the area besides in Morton, had been indicted on a forgery count and pleaded guilty to forging a local business man's name to a check. He was sentenced to three years at Huntsville.

Tommy Ray Murphy, who pleaded guilty to burglarizing the Morton Malt Shop several months ago, also was sentenced to three years in the Penitentiary.

CITY ANNOUNCES AUDIT; GAS DEPT. SHOWS SIZABLE GROSS INCREASE

The Morton City Commission received at a meeting this week the fourth audit of the city books in an 18 month period, according to Van Greene, City Secretary and the report, in the words of the auditors, Hearne and Lawrence of Lubbock, shows the city to be "a good profit making operation."

OIL COMPANY vs. COCHRAN COUNTY TAX SUITS UNDER ADVISEMENT OF JUDGE; FUTURE TAX DOLLARS CAN BE AFFECTED VERY MUCH

The Continental Oil Company suit vs Cochran County, after a hearing Tuesday morning in District Court here, was placed in almost the identical position of the Magnolia Oil Company vs Cochran County suit, and the final decision, hinging on an obscure, fine point of the law, rests with District Judge Victor H. Lindsey.

The two cases, which in reality began nearly a year ago when the Tax Equalization Board met last September, have changed in aspect considerably, but both are in essence alike, both contend the County has invalidly assessed the property in question, and in Tuesday's hearing the County sprung a mild surprise by admitting the illegality or invalidity of their assessment. This admission could have cost the county the decision in the case, and may yet.

T. J. Milan, representing the Oil firm, contended that the agreement by the county of the invalidity of the assessment based on a \$529,000 plus figure for the value of the disputed property, automatically leaves only one valid evaluation — the original rendering of \$197,000, and that this sum would should be used as the basis for the taxes to be paid.

Judge Lindsey said he would take all information submitted up till this time and briefs each of the lawyers will submit into advisement and would render a decision soon.

Egg Operators Making Good Progress on Debt Payment in Gaines

(SPL) from the Gaines County Review of Seagraves

Figures on the first five months of the Seagraves cage egg program show that operators in the project have made good progress in liquidating their obligations. Bill McMurry, Seagraves Lion, told the Lions club Wednesday.

He quoted figures from the escrow account of the program for the period from Nov. 1 to March 31. Total receipts of eggs sold to the Seagraves Egg company amounted to \$234,504.44 for the five-month period. During the same time, the operators paid a total of \$185,601.41 on their indebtedness.

McMurry estimated that total obligations of the operators at the start of the period amounted to around \$600,000, including houses, cages, pullets, and initial feed stocks. Thus during the first five months, operators have taken care of more than a fourth of their indebtedness, as a whole.

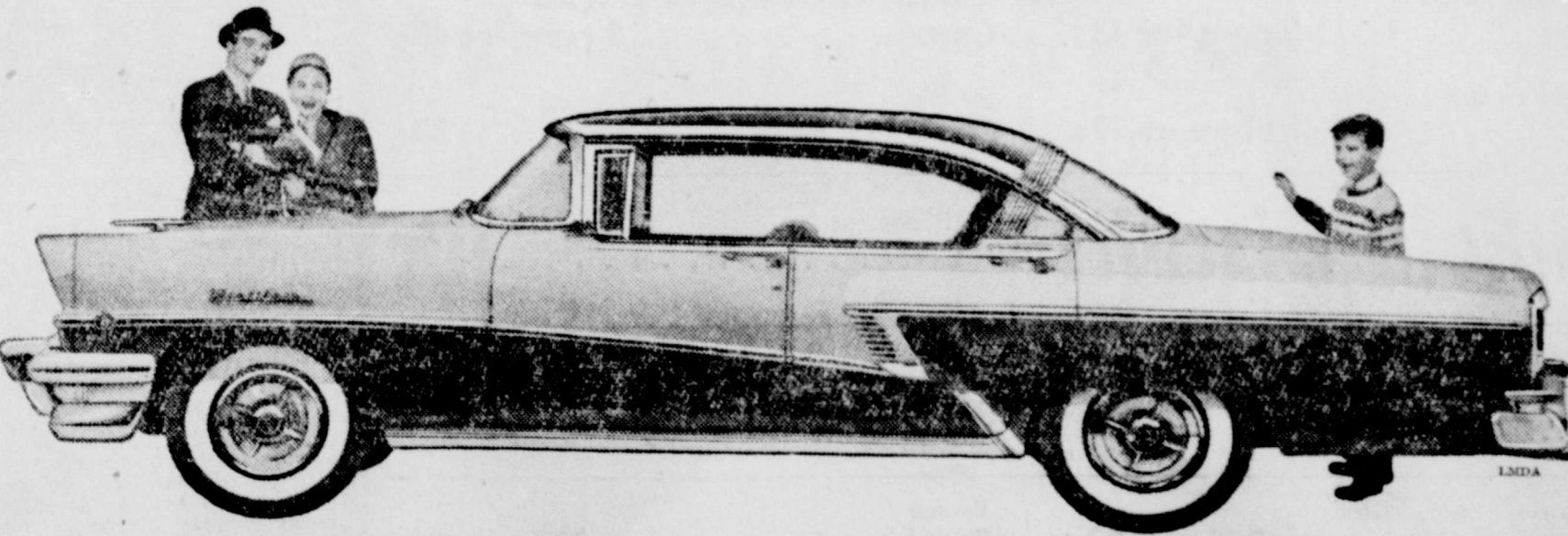

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

A coordinated soil and water conservation plan has been completed by 18 land owners within the Soil Conservation District on their respective farms. Taking part are Raymond Hoffman, John L. McGee, W. F. Strout, C. T. Seaman, John T. Williams, F. J. Mowatt, Odell Thomas, Eva McMunish, Ethel Strickland, L. E. Thrush, C. W. Wynn, O. K. Horden, Marie Benson, Lee Bonham, Eddie Silban, W. C. Bonham and R. E. Bonham. Practices that will get immediate attention are, fertilized grass seedlings, grain sorghum interplanted with cowpeas, management of stable soil erosion control and alfalfa sods as a rotation with grain sorghum.

We would urge interplanting of cowpeas in all grain sorghum for soil improvement and soil condition as well as soil cover. Seedlings are available and should be purchased before planting time. Usually, if we wait, there is most always additional storage and handling charges added.
Planting of grass seed will start very shortly. Equipment will be available in the way of grass drills and detachable seed boxes for broadcast and row plantings. Where broadcast plantings are to be made, leave all existing sods stable undisturbed. Your Cochran Soil Conservation District has ample seedling equipment and it can be secured from Hoffman Welding shop. Your Soil Conservation District personnel will be available to lend assistance in planting procedures. Fertilizer distributors are also available. Fertilizer should be applied prior to seeding.

LIONS, JAYCEES TO ELECT NEW OFFICERS AT MONDAY, WEDNESDAY MEETING

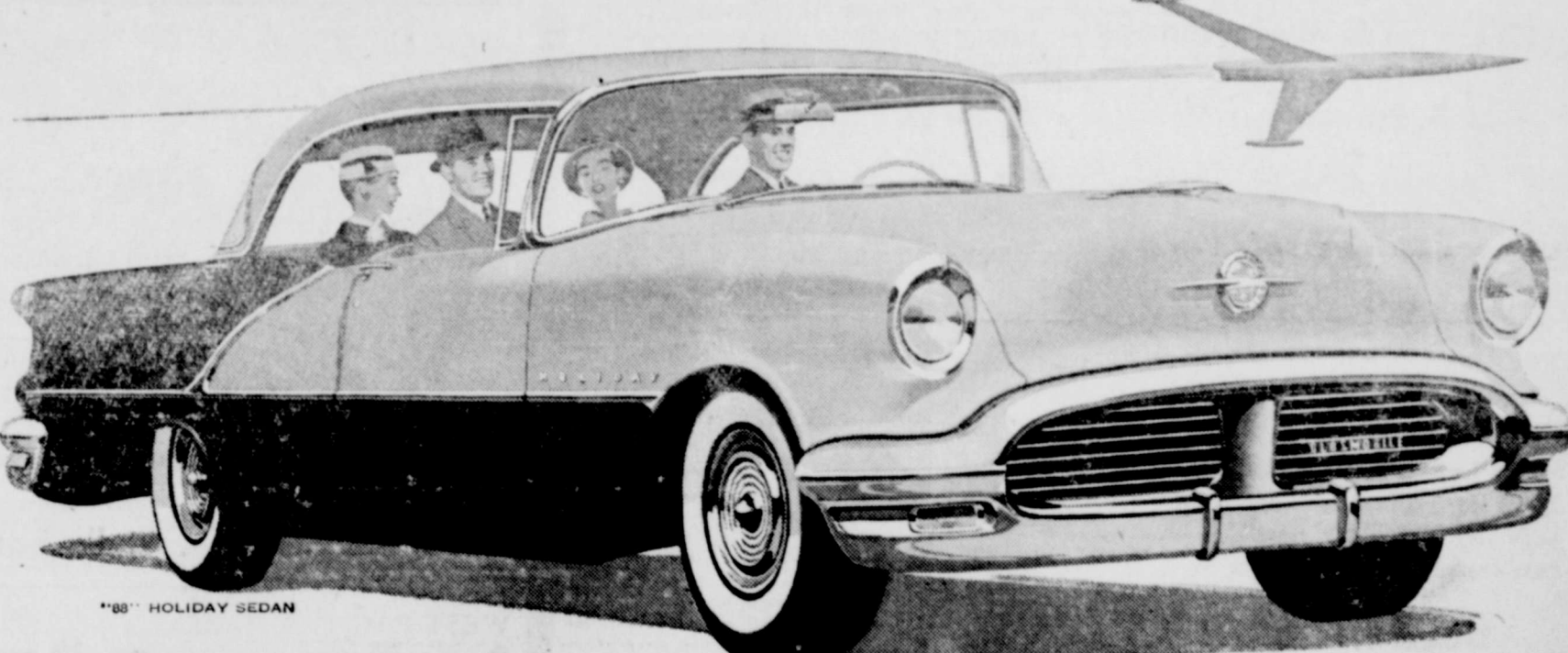
The Morton Jaycees and Morton Lions Clubs will both conduct officer elections at their regular meetings next week.

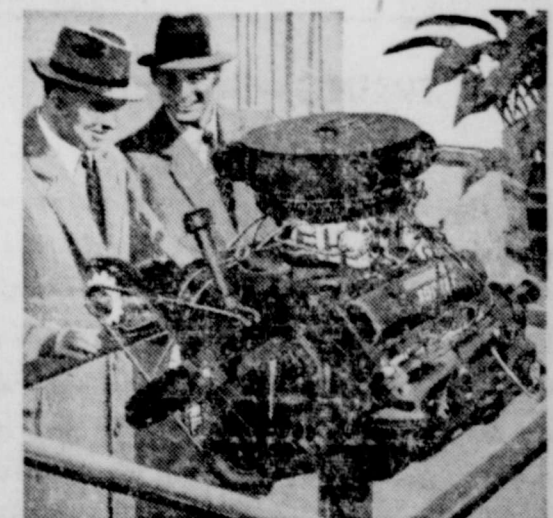
