> McDermett started his soil improvement program in July, 1950 at the time he developed a conservation plan with the Cochran Soil Conservation District and beran receiving technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service There have been 61 acres of land bench leveled to be used for the planting of alfalfa and Kentucky Fesque for grazing and hav prodaction, as livestock is an important part of the program on the Mc Dermett farm. Some cattle have been kept on the farm the year ong, but now, steers are purcha sed and fed on the alfalfa hav and ensilage that is produced and storazed on the irrigated pasture & blue panic during the spring and rmmer before being put on full

The cotton and ensilage are irrirated using underground tile and urrow method with a minimum amount of grade to insure an even application of water and a great reduction in erosion. Balboa rye and hairy vetch are used as a soil improving and cover crop planted in the middle of the cotton during the month of August. Mc Dermett has found that an application of nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizer will make the cover crops grow fast and produce adequate growth to afford protection against wind erosion where the unfertilized will not. His cotton averaged one bale a a quarter per acre in each of the last two years. To speed up the soil improvement, there has been an application of cotton burrs using a truck with a spreader attachment that was purchased for that purpose.

The grain sorghums are usually harvested for ensilage and followed with a drilled, fertilized cover crop of Balboa rye and hairy vetch. Last year fifteen tons of ensilage corn was harvested per acre, then stored in two trench silos

The manure which is a product of the feed lots, is stockpil ton burrs are put in feed lots in the fall to provide first a dry bed for feeders during wet weather. Around mid-winter the stockpile of manure is spread on top of the cotton burrs. This, together with rainfall, assists in decomposing a mixture for fertilizer. Farmers To Get Federal Refund On Gasoline Tax

The farmers will get a federal refund on gasoline tax. The recently enacted law also applies to diesel and other motor

fuels according to a release from County Agent Homer Thompson. Good records will make the job of preparing a claim for refund on gasoline used on the farm easier, and the farm tractor a more efficient tool of production. Farmers are not eligible to ask for a refund covering the 2-cent per gallon

Federal Excise tax. To get a refund, a farmer must file after June 30 and before Oct. 1, a claim with the District Director of Internal Revenue covering the gasoline used during the first 6 months of this year (1956). After 1956 refunds will be made for a 1 year period from July 1, to June

30 advises the County Agent. Refunds will be made only on Gasoline used on a farm for farming purposes. They will not include gasoline used in cars or trucks used on the highways even though

on farm business. The claim must be filed on form 2240 which will be available after June 1. Forms may be obtained from County Agents, banks, post offices, and Internal revenue off-

Urge all farmers to keep a good set of records on all gasoline or other fuels, used on the farm. When claim filing time rolls around, these records can mean money. If studied they may be the source of information that can save additional money from gasoline or fuel not fully utilized by the tractor and in maintenance cost. SCD's are legal sub-divisions of state government, compar able to counties and school districts, but they have no taxing power. Each is governed by a Board of five supervisors who must be landowners themselves and who
- are elected by the farmers and ranchers of the District. Of course the goal is for complete conservation of land in the entire district. Any landowner can become a SCD ecoperator by applving to the board of supervisors. Becoming a cooperator does not in volve any financial obligation. Texas SCD's now have 172,000 farmer and rancher cooperators, and the figure grows by 15.000 each year. Last year these cooperators cover eropped 1.180.000 acres and stubble-mulched 256 000 acres of Texas land. They controlled brush on 1 322,000 acres and had 6,963,000 acres under deferred grazing. They built 10.700 miles of terraces, 7, 540 miles of waterways, built over 10,700 ponds and leveled 74,000 ac-

res of land for proper irrigation.
