Band Nets High Rating In Regionals

The Morton High School Band earned two "Excellent" ratings & a "Superior" at the Region I University Interscholastic League Band Contests at Levelland Saturday evening a successful school year of activities.

The local band, winner of plaudits wherever they have been the past season, won a Division I rating in marching and Division II ratings in concert and sight-reading. According to the judges they missed the triple crown of band performances, three superior ratings, by only a slim margin. It still left them with the best overall record ever achieved by the Morton band in Regional contests.

In thirty public appearances in the past season the band has appeared before more than 80,000 people. This does not include the attendance at numerous pep rallies, basketball games, and similar events.

In addition the band won 2nd place for Class A bands in the Panhandle South Plains Fair Parade of Bands and 1st place for class A bands in the West Texas Music Festival Parade at Snyder.

Plans are now being made for the band to appear next year. Any student wishing to join the beginner or high school band for next fall should make that wish known before school is out next week according to Band Director John M. Bonham.

Suspicious Looking Man Proves Out Escapee from Colorado Penitentiary

A man arrested in Morton Saturday and listed here as Johnny McMillan, with alias of Bonnie Ubrman has been identified as an escaped penitentiary inmate from Canon City, Colorado named Morley.

The story of the man's arrest here makes an interesting tale and hinges on the alertness of a local man who visited the Sheriff's office and heard an announcement of a stolen car.

The story started when Huelon Coon was talking to deputy Chester Miller in the Sheriff's office and heard Plainview police report a stolen car. As it happened, the license number just happened to be a catchy one, easy to remember.

A few hours later Coon was on the sidewalk near a local store and happened to witness a business transaction where a stranger bought a watch and paid for it with a \$20 check. As the man came out the front door Coon noticed he appeared to be drinking heavily. He suddenly turned around and went back in the store and had to be half ushered out the store. He then made a pointed remark to call someone's attention to his pretty new car. This again aroused Coon's suspicions and when he looked at the license plate it seemed to ring a bell. He went to the Sheriff's office and asked what the number of Plainview's stolen car was. Then he told deputy Miller the car was at a certain service station. Miller & Constable Hardy Rhyno made the arrest. The man identified himself as McMillan of Muleshoe. He is 37 years old.

Transferred to Plainview the next day he was soon being investigated by the FBI and it was determined he was one of those men who escaped from Canon City, Colorado on Monday. They had stolen two cars in Colorado, it is believed & stayed together as far as Hereford. Then they split up. The others were still at large Wednesday night as far as Sheriff Hazel Hancock could determine.
