Some forty-one Precinct One voters Saturday night attended the Democratic County Convention to be held at the County Activities Building at 10 a. m. this coming Saturday, August 4th.

## All But One Voting Precinct Held Democratic Precinct Conventions

Cochran County Democrats not only turned out in large numbers to vote Sunday but at least five of the County's Six Voting Boxes were also the scene of Precinct Conventions.

At Neely Ward, election Precinct 4, LeRoy Johnson was named permanent chairman and Mrs. J. K. Griffith permanent secretary.

One resolution was approved. It was to send instructed delegates to the County Convention, Saturday, whereby one member may cast all four of the Precinct's votes.

Delegates to the County Convention are Johnson, Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. Donna Doughty and Mrs. J. K. Griffith.

Approved was a resolution to support Senator Lyndon B. Johnson for President of the United States at the National Convention.

Delegates to the County Convention are Johnson, Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. F. L. Fred was elected permanent chairman of the Precinct 2, Voting Box 5, convention held at Lehman J. W. Pond was named secretary. Delegates to the County Convention are Ralph Burt, J. W. Pond and Fred, alternate.

## CRONE-SMITH; DENNY-HODGE; FOSTER-LEWIS IN RUNOFF; HANCOCK, RHYNE, HOLLOWMAN, EDWARDS, LYONS WIN

Exceptionally heavy balloting a total of 1,700 votes, only about 100 short of the all time records, was the feature of Saturday's election in Cochran County as two opposed County officials swept to election without a runoff and three other county office seekers lacked only a scant few votes of eliminating all opposition without a runoff.

Oldly enough, there wasn't what could be termed a single close race in the County. But the District and State votes, as cast in this county, show close battles and even included one tie in the District Attorney race.

Sheriff Hazel Hancock and Commissioner of Precinct One, Ran Hollowman swept to victories over their opposition. Hancock polling a surprisingly strong 1,029 votes to gain an overwhelming edge over two opponents. Hollowman collected 559 Precinct One votes to beat the total of two opponents by more

than 100 ballots. County Attorney M. C. Leubetter without opposition was swept into office.

Bill Crone, serving out an appointive term as Treasurer lacked only five votes of having enough to gain his first elective term without a runoff. Crone polled 828 votes. Mrs. Pat Smith edged into the runoff with 842 votes as her vote and that of the third candidate, J. P. Burdett of Whiteface totaled 822.

Mrs. Otha Denny of Hefrod also came within an ace of becoming the County's first Tax Assessor-Collector without a runoff. She tallied 834 votes. Dub Hodge got 698 and edged into the runoff when he and the third place man, totaled 876. Six more votes would have won the seat for Mrs. Denny.

In Precinct Three, Commissioner J. N. Foster, seeking a third term, just missed election by 7 votes. He polled 93 to his opponents.

G. D. Lewis went into the runoff with Foster, grabbing 72 votes. Hardy Rhyne led a list of four incumbent constables to victory. Only two, Rhyne of Precinct One

## Local Residents' Relatives Involved Dumas Disaster

At least two Cochran County families had relatives injured or killed in the fire which hit the Shamrock Oil Co. refinery Sunday at Dumas.

Killed was Lewis H. Broxson, a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Bethwell of Morton. Mr. Broxson, a 28 year old member of the Sunray Volunteer Fire Department was holding a blazing tank when a group of other tanks exploded.

Receiving burns which hospitalized him Sunday, was J. W. Wharton, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Wharton of west of Morton.

Wharton is an employee of the Shamrock Oil Co. According to reports from his wife, a number of employees working with John Wharton were killed in the accident.

At least 19 men were reported killed in the explosion and fire.

John Wharton's condition was described by his brother in law, Wednesday, as "settling along fine."

Wharton told of having been in the area of the exploding tanks, rolling off tanks and had come back out of the area. He was about 250 to 300 yards from the explosion. He said the flames belching out the terrific heat knocked him down and each time he would try to get up, the heat would knock him down again. He was burnt about the back and on top of his head. He lived formerly around Enochs and Maple and was known as J. W.

# 6TH ANNUAL RODEO OPENS TOMORROW

The curtain goes up on the 6th annual Rodeo for Morton, Friday, the fourth edition known as the Texas Last Frontier Rodeo, and a glance at the bill of fare shows a varied celebration that should provide more general interest than any of the previous shows.

Though float entries were slow in coming as the paper went to bed in nearly every other respect the entries and interest was running a good bit ahead of schedule.

Directors and sponsoring organizations were putting the finishing touches on the planning this week and two booster trips described as "every successful" made sure the word was passed to all neighboring towns Monday and Tuesday of this week.

More western bands, a renewal of the Jaycee sponsored bathing beauty contests; some added awards as well as the same \$1075 in cash awards plus added monies, all were highlights of the program which gets underway tomorrow afternoon at 4:00 p. m. with a big parade and won't let up until Saturday night when the overall winners are determined.

A wide open barbecue, for which advance tickets must be purchased, will follow the parade and the bathing beauty revue. Colorful visiting Sheriff Poses will add their bit to the parade which winds thru the downtown streets. The swimsuit clad entries in the bathing beauty contest will ride in the parade also, in convertibles.

The rodeo itself promises to be as good as any before. The stock still will be furnished by Sonny Woods as has been the case the next few years and the events will be the same; calf roping and double mugging, barrel races, bareback bronc riding, steer riding, and saddle bronc riding. In addition they plan to stage another posse wagon race—an event that caused a lot of commotion and laughs last year.

The rodeo, still sponsored by the Sheriff Posse, the Jaycees, the Roping Club and the Lions Club is a two night affair with awards to the cowboys being made for each go-round and for best average. A beautiful saddle, valued at \$150 is to be awarded the top roper and another to the top rider for the

Another special feature of the two day show is a carnival at the Park for the kids. It will consist of the Bell rides that were in town last week plus other rides sponsored by other area concerns. The rides will be free to those youngsters who can be at the County Park, both Friday and Saturday at term.

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



### OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Again let us emphasize the saying we have repeated again, and again, "Conservation doesn't cost, it pays."

Last week we discussed the phase of cover crops, (summer legumes) and establishing of sorghums as dead cover for 1937 grain plantings. Another phase of conservation that your Cochran Soil Conservation District, as well as the Soil Conservation Service are interested in is seeding of winter legumes such as vetch, alfalfa peas and clovers and small grains. Not only will the practice provide wind erosion protection, but will add organic matter to the following crop. In the case of legumes nitrogen will be stored in the soil.

Should you want to take advantage of ASC payment, an application for seed and fertilizer should be made now. Buy your seed early and plant late in August. I would encourage early plantings, especially on irrigated land, where we will be seeding in cotton or feed middles, preferably before the crop is irrigated the last time. The Cochran Soil Conservation District have available at the Hoffman Welding Shop, equipment to plant and fertilize with. Small grain, rye and barley can be used very successfully for cover and at the same time not rob the land of moisture, by undercutting with a flat sweep in early spring.

Important booster rains, totaling from an inch up to 1 1/2 inches in most of the southeast, northeast and the central, south central and north central parts of the county, should be as beneficial as any received in the past two months.

His condition was immediately critical and no guests are allowed. He suffered a broken leg, broken and dislocated vertebrae, a crushed pelvis and badly crushed forearm. According to his father, Tuesday night was the first sign of improvement as his temperature went down. He couldn't keep anything on his stomach for at least 12 hours. Wednesday morning he began to show slight signs of improvement but his condition was still critical. Doctors said it would require three weeks to a couple of months for the leg to stay in traction. A pin was inserted in the knee to give enough pressure to stretch the leg back into shape. He will move there likely be bedfast several months.

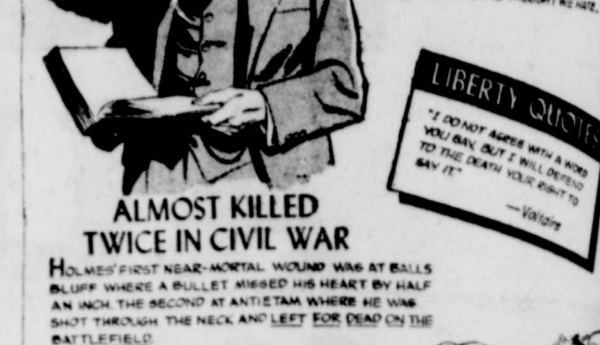
Mr. Autry said the boy never lost consciousness during the accident. Only a week previous he had received a blow on the head while playing tag that gave him a sick headache for awhile.

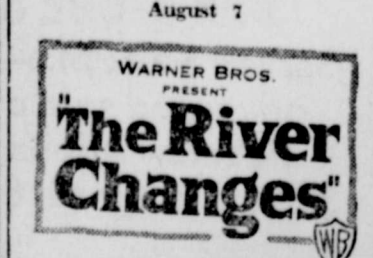

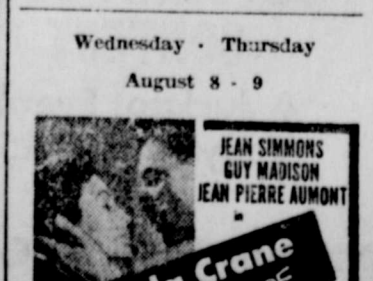

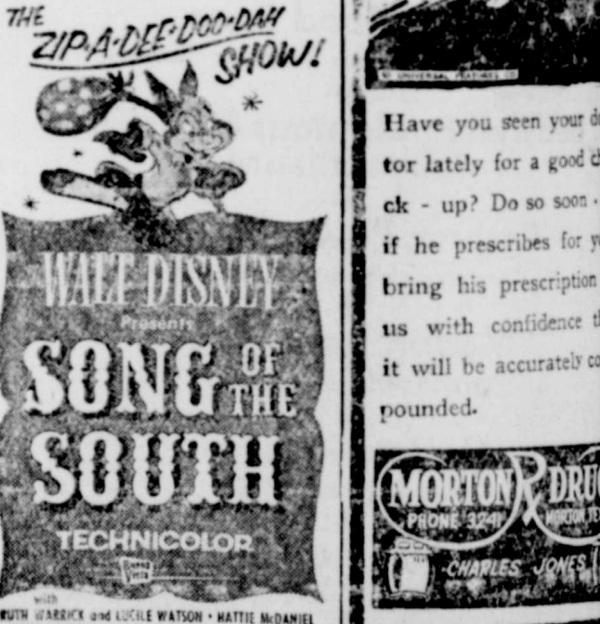
