### Road Construction Contract Is Let

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm - to - Market Road 301 and 1780 in Cochran, Hoodly, and Yoakum Counties was awarded in Austin this week. S. C. McCarty, District Highway Engineer at Lubbock has announced.  
The firm of Bryan and Hoffman of Plainview, Texas submitted the low bid of \$163,316.30 on the project which runs from present end of FM Road 1780, east 3 miles; from FM Road 301 south to Yoakum County Line; from Cochran County Line, south to FM Road 2195, a distance of 16 miles.  
Resident Engineer Carl R. Hart of Brownfield will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 160 days to complete.

J. B. Strickland, of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division, Texas Education Agency, was guest speaker for the Morton Lions Club on Wednesday noon, also showing a film of the work being done to help handicapped persons find a place in our working society.  
Strickland briefly touched the local scene mentioning that five of Cochran County's residents are receiving some kind of aid in the program. He cited the efforts of the Commissioner's Court and of the Lions' president, County Judge Fred Stockdale, as helping a great deal. He also singled out the medical examinations of the county's 12 county area, his works.

## Memorial Service Set In California For Crash Victim

Memorial Services are set for sometime today in Palmdale, California for 28-year-old John Foy O'Brien, brother of two Mortonites, whose body has never been recovered following a plane crash in the ocean off the California coast.  
The family left from Clovis by train Monday morning to attend the memorial rites to be held at the First Baptist Church at Palmdale for the ex-area man, father of three children.  
One body was recovered after the crash a little over a week ago. The bodies of O'Brien and the pilot of the light plane are missing.  
O'Brien, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. O'Brien of Lamesa, was born in Eastland County and attended schools in Dawson County. He also attended Texas Tech and in 1942 he moved to California. Since the war he had risen to the position of Superintendent of the Palmdale factory of North American Aircraft, an experimental plant.  
The aviation man is survived by his wife, Corlene; three children, Earl, 15, Tom, 12, and Cathy Ann, 8; and three sisters; Mrs. O. L. Harp of Welch; Mrs. John Kennedy of Morton and Miss Mamie O'Brien of Houston; and four brothers Cecil O'Brien of Lamesa, C. H. O'Brien of Eastland, Connie O'Brien of Lockney, and J. C. O'Brien of Morton.

## Joe Evans Flown to Dallas for Surgery; Condition Critical

Failure to negotiate a curve on the road leading to New Mexico, southwest of Bledsoe, resulted in the critical injury of Joe Evans, 37 year old Ft. Worth man who has been residing in Morton for about a month.  
Evans, whose wife was engaged in a business next door to the M & M Barber Shop, was flown to Baylor Hospital at Dallas late Wednesday afternoon for delicate brain surgery that doctors have said is necessary to save Evans life.  
Evans' 1954 Buick Riviera was demolished as it overturned and the driver suffered severe chest injuries, in addition to the head injury. Rushed to the Cochran County Hospital, he remained unconscious. Members of the family summoned two doctors from Lubbock and an operation was performed to allow him to breathe easier. Wednesday a specialist was flown in from Albuquerque. He recommended surgery as necessary. At about 5:30 Wednesday he was placed on a plane at the Cochran County Airport and was flown to Dallas. He was expected to arrive there at 8 o'clock.

## Also To Be Voted On Tuesday

"Support is growing for Constitutional Amendment No. 4, the Teacher Retirement Amendment on the November 6 General Election ballot, as the public is given the facts," John Barnes, Superintendent of Morton Schools said today.  
"This effort of Texas teachers to attract and hold good teachers is one of the most unselfish, public spirited movements ever seen in the interest of good education for Texas children," Barnes declared.  
Local school teachers, working with their local and state associations and in cooperation with local Parent - Teacher Association groups, have helped spearhead the drive for adoption of the amendment.  
Amendment No. 4 will improve the Teacher Retirement System created in 1937, a depression year. The system covers all employees of public schools and state supported institutions of higher learning.  
Increased benefits, Barnes feels, will encourage teachers now leaving the classrooms to remain in the teaching profession. Approximately 7,000 experienced teachers are lost each year to the schools. The program would also help attract some of the 3,500 new teachers needed each year to instruct the 100,000 new children who jam Texas classrooms annually.  
The new program, as passed by the Texas Legislature last year — unanimously in the Senate and with only two dissenting votes in the House — would work like this:  
A teacher would pay into the retirement fund each year six percent of his salary (present rate is five percent), and would earn a retirement based upon these deposits. The state of course would match these funds.  
In addition, the amendment adds some benefits which are common in the retirement plans of private industry but have not been included in the teacher retirement system heretofore.  
These are: (a) benefits for teachers who become unable to work because of disability; (b) death and survivor benefits for the family of a teacher who dies while in school employment; and (c) a guaranteed minimum retirement payment for teachers now retired and for those who retire in the future. This minimum of \$100 per month would go only to those who had at least 20 years service and who reached the age of 60.  
The new program would cost the teachers, through increased deposits into the fund, \$4,500,000 annually with the state paying the same. No additional tax will be needed, Barnes emphasized, either at the local or state level. He explained it this way:  
(1) The local school district pays no part of the retirement deposit, so local school taxes could not be affected. (2) Increased industrialization and population of Texas are producing more tax money, enough additional each year under existing tax laws to pay several times the state's \$4,500,000 share of the retirement program. Thus the causes of the present school situation will help pay for its solution.  
"It is true, of course," Barnes stated frankly, "that if the program were not adopted the Legislature would have an additional \$4,500,000 to spend for some other purpose. But it would be most difficult to find any state service that would be of more value than supplying teachers for Texas children."

## 55 Enrolled In Spanish Course

A very successful first night in the Conversational Spanish course which was inaugurated for adults here Monday night.  
Registration was even higher than the previously anticipated number, with 55 persons signing up for the 12 week course.  
The instructor for the course, Dr. Ezequiel Gonzalez of Lubbock, was highly pleased with the turnout.  
The class meets each Monday at the high school at 8 p.m. and will run about an hour and twenty minutes per session.

## Attempt to Murder Charge Is Filed

Paul Morales entered a plea of not guilty this week in JP Court on a charge of assault with attempt to murder on another Latin American.  
The fracas occurred between the man charged and a group of other Latin Americans, Saturday night, in Morton.  
Morales entered his plea of not guilty before Judge A. D. Forehand and his bond was set. He later made bond.

Lewis Doyle, recently released from the service, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Doyle of Morton, has announced the opening of Doyle Electric and Repair on Northwest Second Street, just west of the Doss Super Food Store.  
Doyle, who now lives in Leveland, will move his family to Morton as soon as he locates a house. The Lewis Doyles have two children, Delana, 3, and Beverly Ann, 18 mo.  
The new business will offer appliance repair, house and commercial wiring, and electrical motor repair.

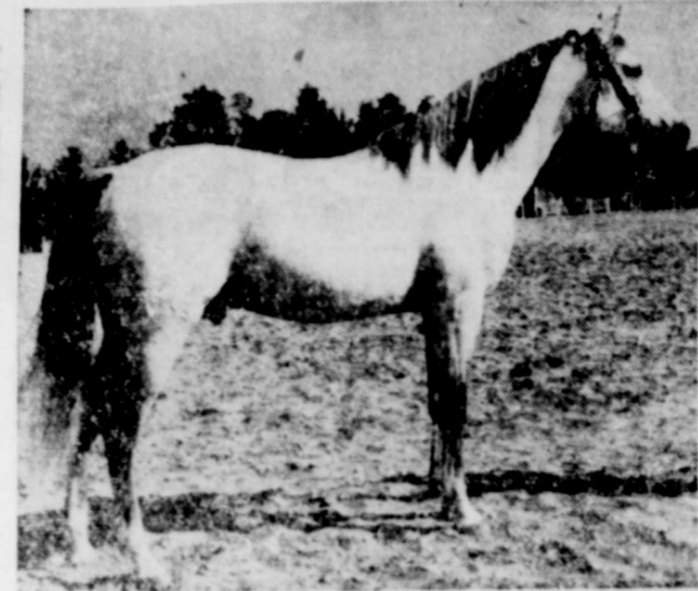

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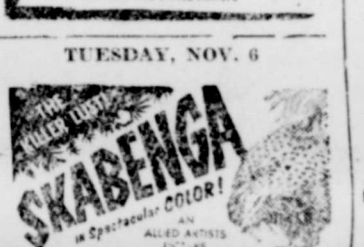

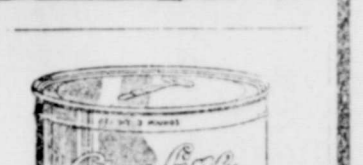

### Sudan Trounces Morton, 27 to 0

A trio of 160 lb. backfield men, led by a 170 lb. end, combined their talents last Friday to guide a first-year Sudan Hornet eleven to a 27 to 0 victory over the Morton Indians on Homecoming night.

paratively tight ball. But the Sudan eleven, loaded with seniors, had too much experience for the Indians and outplayed the home boys completely until they used substitutes in the fourth quarter.

Their complete dominance can be seen in the total statistics showing Morton mustering only one 1st down in the first three quarters, to 13 for the winners.

Even with all that extra yardage, it might have been a different story without three pass interceptions posted by Sudan.

The terrible trio that sank the

Indians' hopes were substitute quarterback Dan Wood, who played most of the game and booted three extra points; fullback Larry Bates who ripped for two touchdowns; and Jimmy Williams, halfback who added the remaining two scores.

In addition it was end Ronnie Fisher who intercepted two of the Indians passes.

Morton almost scored once in the final quarter. They posted six fourth period first downs and chucked up 116 yards gained but a pass to Seany in the end zone was incomplete when Perry Don's knee kicked the ball out of his hands as he caught it and started to turn around.

Sudan drew first blood midway in the initial period. They rolled up a 65 yard march the first time they got the ball and tallied on a two yard crossback by Bates.

Early in the second period the talented fullback outraced Morton with a 33 yard burst right through the center of the line for a TD.

The third Sudan score was a real heartbreaker for the Indians. Backed up deep in their own territory, with only about a minute to play, Thompson got a bad center. It soared over his head into the endzone. In a desperate effort to keep from having a safety chalked against him, Thompson grabbed the ball, turned and kicked while on the run. It was a clever, quick-thinking maneuver but Sudan had just enough time left to run the three plays necessary from the 11 yard line where the ball went out of bounds. They punched over the third score to put the damper on Indian hopes.

Williams tallied that score and added the final six pointer on a 3 yard smash to cap a 50 yard drive in the third quarter.

Everything went well for Sudan. They gambled twice on fourth down runs in midfield and barely got over each time. They picked off two intercepted Morton passes, recovered two Indian fumbles and took advantage of three Indian bad centers. Throughout the game they looked like the most powerful team the Indians have faced this year.

### PFIEFFENBERGER REVIEWS PLAINS COTTON PROBLEMS FOR FARM BUREAU MEMBERS

Asserting that the Plains Cotton Ginners "is not an organization to tell you how to run your business," George Pfeiffenberger, told a group of Farm Bureau members, Thursday night, that though research and marketing we can find the answer to problems that face Plains Cotton farmers.

Pfeiffenberger, executive vice-president of the Plains Cotton Growers, told the group he felt that progress was being made. He listed the fact that the organization sent a group to Washington to fight the changing of the loan base, and the fact that the loan base wasn't changed; and the fact that we have at least stopped the loss of more acres of cotton to East Texas, as achievements through organized efforts. He warned that we cannot relax our vigilance. He said the Plains got back 70,000 acres of cotton land they had lost, though he said there were 164,000 more acres we should have had that we do not have.

Impressing his audience with a tremendous knowledge of the cotton industry, the speaker outlined a fighting program which he hopes will lift Plains cotton to a position of national importance. And, he told of a conference being held in Lubbock today and tomorrow, Thursday and Friday, which will get together some of the top men in the cotton industry to talk about short staple cotton and how to improve and market it.

Pfeiffenberger said one of the most important fights was to secure a loan price for light spot cotton. With actual samples he demonstrated how light spot cotton is in fact more nearly the equal of white cotton, and is instead being classified with spotted cotton. The result is, he pointed out, that the farmer gets less for the cotton and the buyers snap it up at the lower price and then sell it as middling cotton. He said there are two approaches to accomplish this end, (1) to have a special price for light cotton, (2) or to have it classified in the same box with middling cotton. He said the actions of the buyers are proof positive that Plains light spot cotton is nearly, if not, the equal of white cotton. He said this fight was going to take strong support.

A man who has had a long career in cotton, he refuted the oft heard idea that Plains Cotton growers are growing cotton just to put in the loan. But he went on to place part of the blame for this idea on the farmers. He listed five unofficial suggestions that are being proposed to improve the system of cotton classing — because, he said, "cotton marketing begins with classing."

He said they were exploring the idea that cotton classers should have numbers so that it could be seen which classers were doing the particular classing and if one was doing a poor job he could be spotted and methods could be taken to correct his mistakes. He said the possibility of a Review Board, rather than just reclassification of cotton, was being considered. He said an important point in classifying cotton was the proper conditioning of the cotton and pointed out how in this country, where cotton is forced to sit out in hot, dry weather for sometimes many hours before the sample is classed, the staple will appear to be less. He said a recent consideration asked for is humidifiers in the classing office where cotton samples could be conditioned before they are classed. He said it was only a matter of time before microne tests a test of the maturity of cotton — will be demanded as a qualification for admitting it to the loan.

George said we must do something about the maturity of Plains cotton.

Pfeiffenberger was not dismayed about the prospects of not being able to grow long staple cotton in the area. He said, during his years in research with all types of cotton under all types of conditions

they had determined that many types of West Texas cotton were ideally suited for certain things, even without long staple. He said the solution of our problems lay in a voluntary program to raise cotton of uniform quality. As a method of explaining this point he told the group that he felt some of the reasons mills do not want Plains cotton are justified. He felt it was up to the farmers to do what they could to make Plains cotton bales more uniform, more favorable to buyers, and to strengthen the quality. He cited practices of putting green cotton in with mature cotton, of late watering, of using poor seed control as things that would cause mill owners not to want our cotton. Then he cited incidents where an area improved the quality of its cotton by cooperation and control. He told the group there is a good strong market for short staple cotton with a good micronaire test and good quality. He said experiment stations were doing a good job of telling farmers how to improve the situation. He also felt that the conference being held today and tomorrow, would provide a lot more information of benefit to farmers who want to do something about the problems at hand.
