



# City Leases Pool; Open By Monday

We were real proud of our city council the other night when it voted to lease the Dive-In swimming pool, in order to assure that swimmers in Friona will be able to swim this summer.

It was a sign of a civic-minded and forward-thinking city council to make such a move, which undoubtedly will draw at least some criticism.

However, it would appear to us that the City's tie-in with the pool was a logical move. Many cities the size of Friona operate municipal pools. Since swimming pools have trouble making money in towns the size of ours, it would appear that the municipal participation is the best bet.

Also due a pat on the back is Truitt Johnson, owner of the pool, who was willing to work out a lease agreement with the city at a nominal fee.

Johnson has operated the pool at a personal loss the past few summers - something many Frionans and users of the pool probably did not know.

For what it's worth, we'd like to tip our hat to this civic-minded individual, who built the pool in the first place, and who continued to operate it even though it did not pay its way.

Recreation is something the city is woefully short of, and by keeping the pool open, Friona swimming enthusiasts are given this facility once again.

Rent property continues to be the number one problem in Friona. People have been coming by our office practically daily in search of something--anything--that they can rent. Regrettably, our "for rent" column has been a bit on the skinny side for many weeks now.

Builders are doing a good job in providing homes for sale to those wishing to buy -- but the majority of people being hired at Missouri Beef Packers don't arrive in town ready to buy a house -- they need something to rent.

It is surprising that no one has started additional rent property in recent months, with all of the influx of prospective renters. Other prospects are undoubtedly having to locate in nearby towns until something is available locally.

Some builders bemoan the fact that with the prime interest rate being what it is, it is difficult to build anything on a moderately-priced rental basis, and expect it to pay off. Be that as it may, it would appear to us that in this event, additional rent could be charged -- or perhaps build a little nicer apartment to start with. Something needs to be done, and fast, it seems from this corner.

One of the drawbacks to rent property is that few people want to be bothered with keeping up with it. This is the one factor that has undoubtedly kept many people from investing in rent property.

Some talk has been heard about a group of Friona businessmen forming a cooperation and moving in several FHA houses, which could be bought "worth the money."

A manager would be hired to take care of the property, including the rent. Since it would be on a corporation basis, no individual would lose if one or two houses were vacant -- it would be spread out over all investors.

Personally, this sounds like a good plan to us. We'd like to see some action along this line. Maybe it's a project which the Chamber of Commerce could look into. The Chamber is vitally interested in locating homes for prospective new residents.

The City of Friona will lease the Dive - In Swimming Pool from Truitt Johnson and operate the facility as a non-profit function of the city.

Action came in a special meeting of the council with Johnson and Baker Duggins last Wednesday evening. The city will pay Johnson a lease as well as assisting him in getting the pool ready for opening.

Duggins, who is acting as supervisor of the pool, states that the pool will be open by Monday, June 24, and could possibly open this weekend. That will give the public two months of swimming this summer.

Bob Owen will serve as general manager. Cecil Maddox will be assistant manager, in charge of water safety, and Roscoe Parr, Jr. will be the building custodian. These will be the three paid employees.

Duggins will be employed by Johnson to teach private swimming lessons in the mornings.

Duggins stated that because of the additional personnel this summer, he felt the condition of the water should be excellent at all times. Also, with the city bearing the cost of utilities, water use will not be a factor.

Pool hours will be 1-7 p.m., daily, seven days a week. Admission price will be 50 cents for children and 75 cents for adults. Season tickets will be available at \$15 for children and \$20 for adults for the two-month period.

As custodian Parr will clean the entire building each morning. He will clean all walks and dressing rooms every two hours during pool hours.

Private parties may be held on evenings, at a charge of \$25. Those interested in having a private party should contact Bob Owen. Duggins plans to enroll stu-

dents for swimming lessons Friday from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. He will offer all levels of instruction from beginning swimming to advanced lifeguarding with the only limiting factor to a class being the demand. It will be necessary for at least 12 students to enroll for a particular level.

Thus, it is important for those interested to register on Friday, Duggins points out, since this is the time that classes will be set. The classes, at \$1 per lesson, will run five days per week for three weeks. A second session may also be offered if the demand is great enough.

## Ben Franklin Sets Grand Opening Sale

Grand Opening for Friona's newest store -- Ben Franklin -- will be held Thursday at the store's new location at 719 Main Street.

Kenneth Williams is the new owner. He bought the Ben Franklin franchise earlier this year from Mr. and Mrs. Marion Fite, and recently moved into the building re-modeled by Eric Rushing.

Williams says he hopes to be able to give Friona shoppers many things they previously have been unable to get locally. The new store features many new lines which the store was unable to offer in its smaller location.

"I believe we're competitive with anyone -- discount stores included -- on our cosmetics, hair spray and the like," Williams said. "In fact, we think we are competitive in all of our lines. We expect to do a lot of volume in the store," he said.

## Ford Takes Issue With Clayton's Tax Bill

Frank Ford, Republican candidate for the Texas Legislature, has expressed sharp criticism of the tax bill introduced this week by Rep. Bill Clayton.

"This bill, which would increase the state sales tax to 3%, remove some exemptions, and double tuition at our state supported colleges," stated Ford, "Does not contain any provisions for returning any tax monies to the cities or counties, where ad valorem taxes are carrying a maximum burden at present."

"Nor does the bill provide

for any increased support for education and vocational training," Ford continued. "It has been my belief that any broad-based increase in taxes of this nature should be used either to strengthen local self-government by returning taxes to the local level, or provide more support for our future through better education."

"As the Clayton Bill does neither of these things, I believe this is bad legislation to be proposed in this short session of the Legislature."

Ford and Clayton are opposing each other in the 72nd Legislative District, which includes Cochran, Lamb, Bailey, Farmer, Castro, and Deaf Smith Counties.

## Mary Rando Is Guest Of Rep. Price On Trip

Mary Rando, Friona High School student, was a house guest of Congressman and Mrs. Bob Price recently. While there, Mary did a TV recording of her now famous recitation, "I Am The Nation" which she has given before numerous civic, youth and church organizations.

Price said the message she delivers so impressively is particularly timely and inspiring. "We, as Americans must regain an appreciation of a respect for the greatness of the history and institutions of this nation," Price said. "Thoughtful discussion and reasonable debate must replace the growing climate of violence and civil disorder."

Two directors were re-elected at the 34th annual meeting of Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. last Tuesday.

Ralph Wilson and Curtis Murphree were re-elected to the board. Wilson is serving as president and Murphree as secretary-treasurer. Hold-over directors are E.L. Fairchild, W.M. Massie and E.F. Osborn.

Bernie Gowens, accountant, presented the company's yearly audit report, showing sales of \$3,077,560.03; gross income of \$174,093.35 and net profit for the year of \$21,797.69. The elevator handled 155,497,270 pounds of coarse grain and 24,452,040 pounds of wheat during its fiscal year.

# Weaver Resigns As Chamber Manager

Ted Weaver, who has served as manager of the Friona Chamber of Commerce since January, this week tendered his resignation to the board of directors, effective July 15.

Weaver cited the small amount of money in the Chamber treasury as the major reason for his resignation.

In a letter prepared to the board, Weaver stated "With current obligations, the Friona Chamber of Commerce will be flat broke on August 15 of this year."

Charles Allen, Chamber president, said the directors were shocked and concerned to receive Weaver's resignation. "While some efforts to enlist new members have been underway for the last six weeks, people have not responded as well as we had hoped for, and it is now apparent that if we are to keep the Chamber of Commerce office open and operating under any circumstance, we will need to increase the dues of our present members," Allen said.

Allen indicated that the directors felt that it is the desire of the people of Friona to keep the office active and to have a manager. "If we are

able to attract some other person as manager of our Chamber of Commerce, he will have every right to feel as Ted does, and if there is not enough money in the till when he comes to look us over, he more than likely will not be willing to

take the job," Allen continued. "If other towns the size of Friona can have a full-time manager, it would seem possible that our aggressive town, the Beef Capital of Texas, can afford one, too," Allen concluded.

# Packers Hit High Of 982 Cattle One Day

Missouri Beef Packers hit a high of 982 cattle killed in one day during the past week--the new single-day record for the Friona packing plant.

The 982 figure came on Friday, June 14.

"We're just waiting for the cattle to get ready, and for our markets to build up. When this happens, our kill figure will go up," stated plant manager Bill Gilbert.

For the week ending Friday, June 14, the plant killed a total of 4072 a new week's record, averaging 812 cattle per day. "We could branch out a little further in our buying, in order to get above the 1,000-mark,

For instance, there are thousands of cattle up in the Perryton area on the North Plains--an area we haven't worked as yet," Gilbert said.

But, he indicated that until the company's market was built on a firm foundation, there was no reason to go after the larger figures. The bulk of the cattle being slaughtered are still coming from a 35-mile radius of Friona, Gilbert stated.

# Early Wheat Termed Fair

First wheat for 1968 came to Friona area elevators this week and was termed as about "fair" in most quarters.

Actually, the first wheat to arrive in Friona was dryland, and was much better than average, running from 12 to 20 bushels per acre.

The first load to come to a Friona area elevator was marketed at Hub Grain last Wednesday (June 12) by Walt Mabry. His load tested 59 pounds per bushel, 14.8 per cent moisture. The wheat, with one irrigation, was expected to yield around 30 bushels.

Roy Clements had the first load of wheat in Friona, bringing a load of Concho to West Friona Grain Thursday, June 13. Clements' wheat tested 60 pounds per bushel, 14 per cent moisture, and was yielding about 12 bushels. This was grown 18 miles northwest of town.

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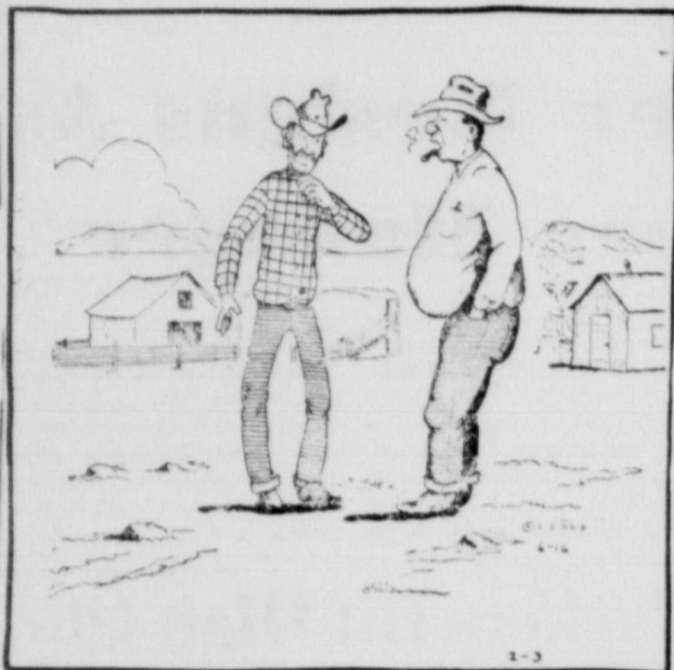

Perhaps one way we could show our appreciation for the job he's done (strange as it may seem) is to render these "semi-annual" dues to assure a successor to carry on Ted's work.

Story hour is not being held this summer for the pre-school children but please don't let this be an excuse for not bringing the little ones to the library. They loved to be read to anytime.

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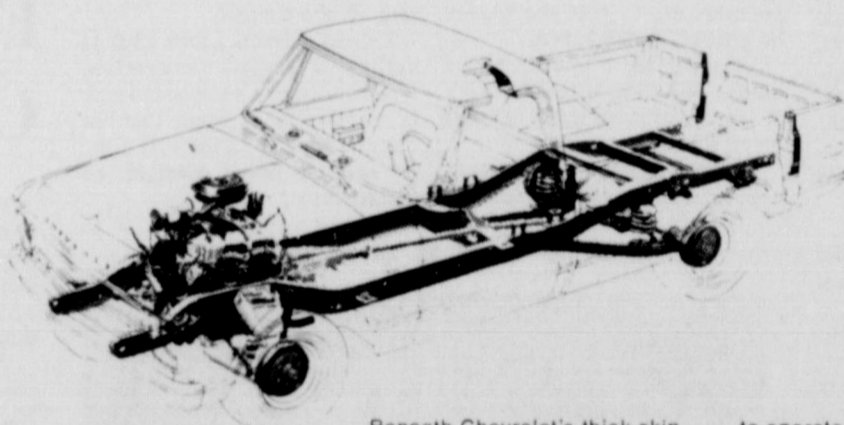


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**WEEK'S RESULTS**

**May Report**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of May, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$4,300.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1968 shows a total of 46 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 34 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$26,420.

ORDINANCE NO. 410  
An Ordinance establishing a NO PARKING ZONE on a portion of ELEVENTH STREET in the CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS; providing a penalty; and requiring publication.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to pay a fine, and upon conviction of any such violation shall be fined in any sum of not less than ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) nor more than TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00); and each day any such violation shall be permitted to exist shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Section 3. It is required that this ordinance be published in one issue of the official paper, and that this ordinance shall

take effect and be in force from and after the publication thereof.

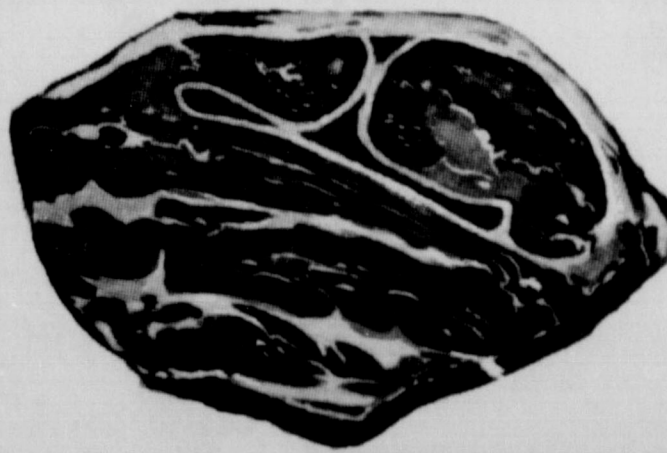

#### CALCIUM A BARGAIN IN NUTRITION

Are you looking for a sedative to bring restful sleep at night? A good one is in your refrigerator (or should be) and it is not habit forming, it

is inexpensive and it is a bargain at any price, according to Cricket B. Taylor, County Extension Agent. Along with this sedative many other valuable nutrients are free.

The sedative is CALCIUM and it is found abundantly in the bottle of milk in your refrigerator, and calcium does more than act as a sedative the agent says. It can be as soothing as a mother, also, as life saving as oxygen. Some calcium deficiency because of lack of fat in the diet to combine with soluble calcium. Other foods containing calcium would require such huge amounts to supply daily requirements that the idea is ridiculous.

Do you know about nerves? One of the functions of CALCIUM, according to scientists, is to aid in transportation of nerve impulses to all areas of the body. If the useable calcium in the body is less than the minimum that a person can become tense, grouchy, unable to relax and at the end of day, in a state of fatigue out of proportion to amount of work done. Lack of calcium can do more. It can make you nervous, irritable quick tempered and lose you a neighbor, perhaps. Lack of calcium causes cramps or muscle spasms.

Do you know about insomnia?

Insomnia can be a calcium deficiency. Hot milk just before going to bed at night sometimes will help. The heat quickens digestion and calcium soothes the nerves. Sometimes doctors prescribe calcium tablets along with hot milk. They are sometime referred to as "lullaby pills."

Do you know that calcium aids blood clotting? If someone has nose bleed frequently check diet for calcium food. In advancing years it seems diets are more often deficient in calcium. According to research, if diets are too low in calcium, the calcium is

### Clayton Votes Against Bill

The "mini-bottle" liquor by the drink passed the house of Representatives today by a small margin. Bill Clayton opposed the bill all of the way. He feels the bill is demagoguery and that the legislation is unworkable. Clayton said, "We fought heavy odds and lots of outside lobby influence and we were outvoted. We felt it was our responsibility to continue to oppose the bill. Some amendments were added to the bill that will cause the senate to take a close look at the overall picture and perhaps they will vote no on the bill."

Clayton tried to convince the members of the house that the legislation was bad, but in the end the measure did receive enough votes to finally pass it. The legislation now goes to the senate and the state of the mini bottle liquor by the drink bill is in the hands of the senate.

Buttermilk and home-soured whole milk can be used interchangeably for baking. Sour milk by adding one tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice with enough sweet milk to have a liquid cup. Let this stand five minutes before using.

### Draw Work Plans Are Revised For County

The revision of the tentative work plans for upper watershed protection projects on Running Water Draw have been completed. The revised work plan for Upper Running Water Draw Watershed calls for three dam sites. One will be in Curry County north of Clovis, and two will be in Parmer County -- one north of Bovina on Cat-

fish Draw and one large site north of Lazbuddie on Running Water Draw. The tentative work plan was revised by the Soil Conservation Service at the request of the local sponsors. The entire project is being carried out under the authority of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (Public Law 566, 83rd Congress). The primary purpose of the project is flood prevention. Major floods on this draw cause severe damages to crops, fences, farm improvements, county and state roads and bridges, and low water crossings in the agricultural area of the watershed.

#### GRAIN SORGHUM

The critical stages of growth that require adequate soil moisture for maximum yield potentials are the boot, bloom and soft dough. The pre-boot stage of growth may also be considered under high yield cultural practices when deficient rainfall is encountered for an extended period of time after seedling emergence.

Tests show that if only one summer irrigation is applied, maximum yield and efficiency is obtained when the application is timed at the boot stage which is generally 45 to 50 days following planting. When two summer irrigations are planned, the first should be time at boot and the second at bloom stage for maximum yield and efficiency.

If three irrigations are planned applications should be made at pre-boot, first bloom, and soft dough. When four irrigations are planned the first application should be made at pre-

boot followed by applications made at approximately ten day intervals.

COTTON The most critical period of water used by cotton is the peak bloom stage. Tests show that if producers can apply only one summer irrigation, highest yields and water use efficiency are obtained when cotton is watered 20 to 30 days following bloom initiation.

Cotton irrigated twice was found to produce more efficiently when the first application was applied at bloom irrigation and the second, 16 to 30 days later. Intervals between irrigations will usually be shorter for sandy or shallow soils than for loam or clay soils and will vary with rainfall.

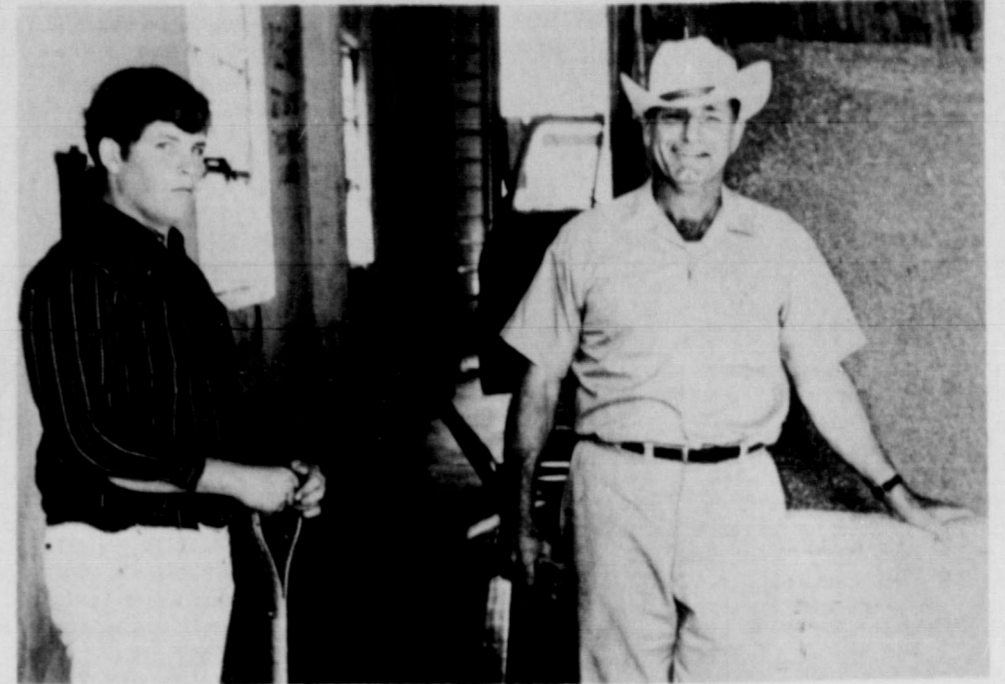
If three irrigations are available applications should be made at the first bloom stage, peak bloom and at about 20 days following the peak bloom application.

SOYBEANS Maximum yields from soybeans normally require a summer irrigation prior to bloom initiation with succeeding applications made on 10 to 20 day intervals until pods are well filled. The most efficient use of total water, rainfall and irrigation, has been obtained from a preplant plus 2 summer irrigations (bloom stage and 20 days later). An additional irrigation may be necessary in early September if soil moisture is not replenished by rainfall.

Water Draw Watershed covers Curry and Parmer Counties while Lower Running Water Draw Watershed covers Castro, Lamb, Swisher, and Hale Counties. These two subwatersheds have been developed simultaneously since they are component parts of the whole watershed.

Only one small recreation area is planned, and that is the Clovis Site, just north of Clovis.

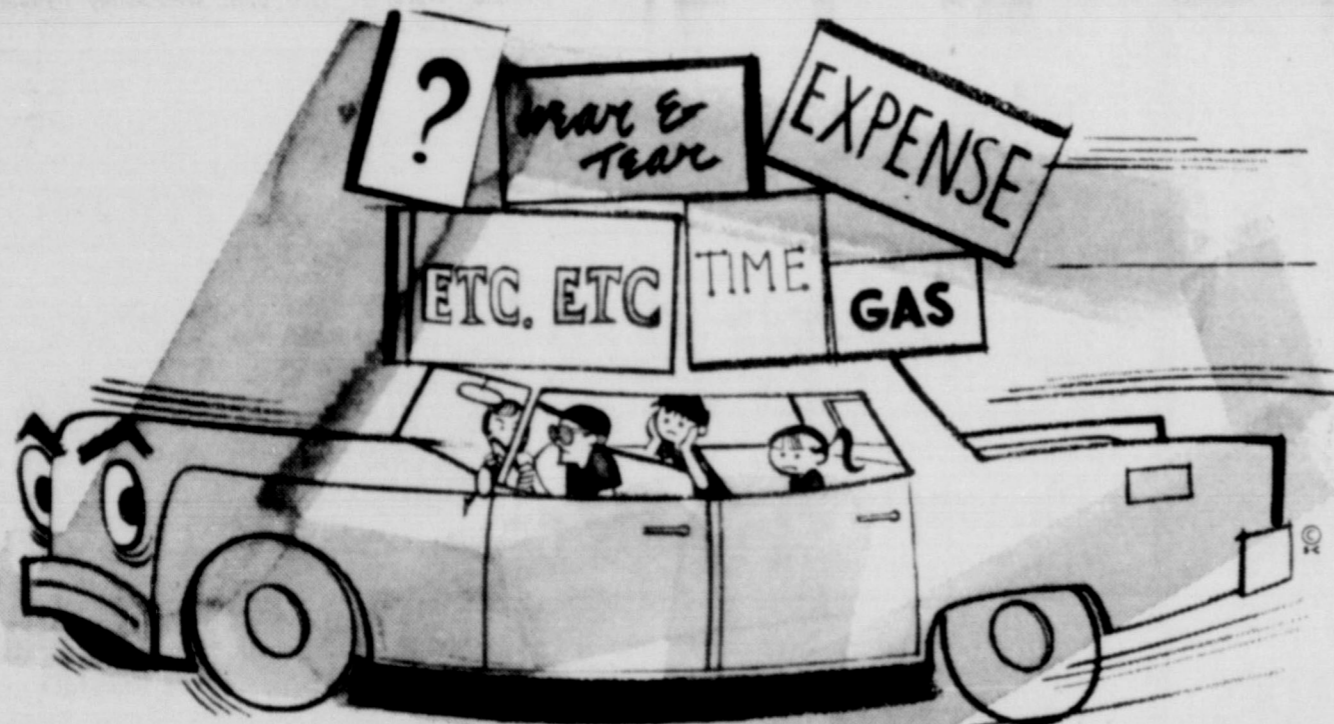

## Friona Gardener Has A Real "Green Thumb"

While most folks in the Friona area may be just getting started with their gardening, Joe Greer of 1110 Euclid is about ready to begin harvesting some vegetables.

Greer, whose garden is a major part of his life, has tomatoes, squash, onions, beets, lettuce, cabbage and turnips in his backyard garden - in plenty.

He has a total of 110 tomato plants. He has 29 plants which already have tomatoes as large as "hen eggs." He sells some tomatoes to at least one local restaurant.

The Greers live on Mrs. J.P. Wilson's rent property. He is a retired farmer, having spent 23 years as a farmer, thus coming by his "green thumb" honestly.

Greer says he does all the garden work in the large backyard garden with a hoe and spade -- with no power machinery to plow up the ground.

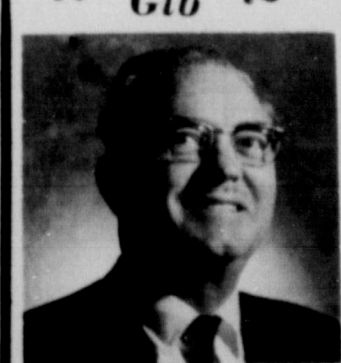
