000 GRAIN SORGHUMS - YIELDS:

Late maturing varieties or hybrids made the largest yields. If water was limited to only a preplanting irrigation an early maturing hybrid made the largest yield.

000 WATER EFFICIENCY OF GRAIN SORGHUM

The greatest return of grain per inch of water was made with a late maturing variety given 4 summer irrigations at Lubbock, and 5 at Tulia. Hybrid RS 590, an early maturing variety, almost equalled the efficiency with only a pre-planting irrigation, by yielding 4,000 lbs. per acre. This would indicate that part of the grain sorghums crop should be planted in an early hybrid and produced with pre-planting irrigation. The remainder, if water available, could be planted in a late variety, fertilized and watered every 14 - 16 days for maxmum yield.

It was pointed out water requirments for grainsorghum will average .33 inches of water per day from boot to soft dough stage, if water is available.

These plants are regular water pumps. April and May plantings do not increase the maturity dates, over June plantings. It was pointed out that earlier planted grain sorghums require 8 to 10 inches more water than June plantings and usually yield less. These tests prove about the same each year. In other words, no percentage in planting in April and May, but June plant ngs usually have moisture through July and at any rate later crops require less water to make a crop. Set cultivation shallow to save mo isture. Earlier plantings gave no increase in maturity date, but did use much more water by pumping it out of the ground.

GRUBS IN SICK LAWNS

Spotty damage to lawns, or general unthriftiness for which there is no obvious cause, may be the result of work done by beetle

Remaining in the soil throughout their larval stage, these grubs feed upon the roots of grass and other plants. If a sufficient number are present in the lawn whole root systems are destroyed and the grasses

Though lawns may suffer from the ravages of a great many in-sects, bettle grubs do most damage, and their activity is harder to de-

There is an easy method of checking for the presence of grubs in the lawn. Cut down on three sides of a square foot of sod, two to three nches deep, with a sharp spade. Then, forcing the spade under-neath, lay back the foot of sod, using the uncut side as a hinge, and examine for grubs. If six or more grubs are found in this area of soil the lawn is subject to demage and some treatment is needed

Tests so far have shown chlordane to be the most promising insecticide for lawn treatment, but others include aldrin, DDT, and dieldrin and heptachlor.

Richard W. Rush, assistant prossor of geology at the University
Texas, has traced the sequence events which led to the developent of the cavern from the time.

As the glaciers retreated, about 50,000 years ago, the climate of Texas became drier and the ground water level began to drop, dissolving the limestone as it fell.
