



It's Wise To Ease Baby Into First Bath In Family Tub



Baby's first big-tub bath is likely to go much more smoothly loo both baby and mother if mother remembers that babies are creatures of habit and are often frightened by any sudden change.

The shift to the family tub will seem less sudden and scary if for the first few days you start bathhas grown used to, after you have put it in the big tub into which you have run a few inches of warm water. Talk to baby as you lower him into his tub in its new surroundings and as you start to

Then, as soon as he begins gurg-ling and splashing in the water, lift him gently out of the little tub into the big one, using the big tubfor rinsing. The change from one tub to another will seem so slight that he will take it in his stride. Within three or four days he'll be so used to the big tub that you will no longer need to start him off in the one he had grown accustomed to and had liked so well.

familiar bath routine. End the bath session as you always have by wrapping him in his towel and patting him dry. Smooth his body all over with his special baby lotion that protects his tender sin against chaffing and disper rish A against chafing and diaper rash. It is always a good idea to assemble everything you will need for baby's bath before you start to bathe him. Place the articles beyond his grasp, but where you can easily reach them without loosening your hold upon him even for a moment. Bables are sometimes moment. 

JORDAN IN HISTORY



Jordan, situated in the heart of the Arab World, has since ancient times, witnessed the impact of successive civilizations which have greatly influenced human progress. It has seen the empires of Egypt, Assyria and Persia; it was the battlefield of the Romans and their Byzantine successors, and Christianity was

born within its borders. In April 1950, after the end of hostilities between the Arabs and Israelis, the Jordanian Parliament, representing Central Arab Palestine and Trans-Jordan proper, approved the union of these two regions into the new country called the Hashemite Kingdom

The total area of present-day Jordan is 37,500 square miles, slightly larger than the state of Indiana. The population of 1,500,000 is predominantly Arab in race and Moslem in religion with about 12 per cent Christian Arabs and a great variety of other distinct groups and cultures. This mixture of cultures adds

a picturesque diversity of dress and customs. Jordan contains most of the sacred shrines of Christianity Within its borders lie Bethlehem; Jericho, the site of the oldest walled city in the world; Hebron, where Abraham is buried; the River Jordan; the Dead Sea, the Mount of Olives and the

ancient walled city of Jerusalem. The country offers a great variety of climate and sceneryfrom the temperate heights of the rugged mountains of Moab, to the gently rolling hills of Judea, to the tropical Jordan Valley with its luxuriant vegetation; the Dead Sea, the fantastic, sandstone mountains of Wadi Rum and, finally, the dry arid desert of the eastern plateau.

Winter often brings snow to the mountains and Spring carpets the countryside with myriads of beautiful wild flowers. Rainfall occurs only in Winter, from November to April, so for the rest of the year the people of Jordan rarely see a cloudy day.




