One will be voter apathy, or perhaps, more appropriate, "voter absence," due to Memorial Day weekend; and the other will be trying to win a greater percentage of the state's sparsely populated area's votes than Yarborough wins in the state's heavier-populated centers.

In addition, Smith will be out to pick up some votes from supporters of Waggoner Carr, Dolph Briscoe, John Hill and Eugene Locke, and perhaps win majorities in a few more of the larger cities than he did in the May 4 primary. However, the potential long weekend may hurt his efforts here.

. . . . Although Smith won a plurality of the votes in 112 of the state's 254 counties on May 4, to only 50 for the Houstonite, Yarborough won eight of the state's 10 most populous counties, piling up about half of his total number of votes - some 203,776-- in these ten coun-

Smith, meanwhile, winning only two of these counties (Austin's Travis and Lubbock), totalled 150,410 votes in the same counties.

A big question will be: What percentage of each candidate's voters will return to the polls on Saturday -- and what percentage of the approximately 230,000 (in the top ten counties) who voted for other candidates will turn out - and, how will they vote?

. . . . Otherwise, Yarborough is a pretty good bet to do about as well as he did on May 4, in the metropolitan centers - and Smith will do even better "out west," without Waggoner Carr on the ballot to split his vote, primary.

Yarborough, leaders of the liberal forces, carried his home county of Harris (Houston) with a whopping 69,220 votes, to 48,553 for Smith and 18,490 for Carr. It was a bit closer in Dallas County, 31,734 for Yarborough to 24,072 for Smith. However, they finished third and fourth here, as Eugene Locke carried his home county, and Waggoner Carr was

second. Smith ranaclose race in Tarrant County (Fort Worth), where Yarborough, Carr and Smith had very similar totals. Smith's victory in Travis County (Austin) was somewhat a surprise, but perhaps it shouldn't have been, since he's had 18 years around the capitol city to become acquainted.

Excluding the top ten counties from the state's total vote, Smith out-polled Yarborough, 232,078 to 219,047. And he natually had an even greater margin than this in West Texas -- his "backyard."

The man who ran fourth on the May 4 ballot, Dolph Briscoe, actually carried more counties (69) than did Yarborough. However, the South Texan also had the misfortune of having his best support in sparselypopulated areas, so his total vote wasn't too high.

Gen. Ross Ayers, one of Smith's local supporters, points out that if the present lieutenant governor gets just one of every four votes from supporters of defeated candidates who have pledged their support, it would be enough to give Smith the victory, provided those who voted for Smith in May will again do so.

The only catch, as Ayers points out, is getting those same voters back to the polls on Saturday.

The fact that the runoff comes during the Memorial Day holiday, right at the close of school, will undoubtedly hurt Smith's potential vote. A turnout of voters anywhere close to the May 4 primary would give him a shoo-in.

However, a light turnout, as the case no doubt will be, would be to Yarborough's advantage. Smith can only hope that some

Smith, Joy Are **Political Picks**

As we did in the primary election, we would like to once again recommend Preston Smith to the voters of the Friona area in the Democratic runoff on Saturday.

If a majority of the qualified voters go to the polls on Saturday, then Smith should win the runoff. However, if a small number turns out, then the liberal minority could prevail.

Therefore, it is important for everyone who wants Preston Smith as governor to make a point to vote for him on Saturday. Every vote will count big.

Smith is definitely the man for West Texas -- as seen by the large number of votes he received in the May 4 primary. This is the golden opportunity for West Texans to elect a fellow West Texan to the state's number one post.

Without arguing the conservative vs liberal viewpoint, Smith stands head and shoulders over his opponent, who has no experience as a state officer. Memorial Day is a day for all Americans to lay aside all personal political convictions, prejudice, sectional and regional preference, and any other private or selfish opinions.

This day we have set aside to pay homage to the valiant ones who have made the supreme sacrifice to preserve for us the liberties and freedoms which we are inclined to take for granted. Our national holidays are meant to be enjoyed each in its own individual way.

Christmas and Easter, days of great spiritual rejoicing, have for centuries renewed the hope of the civilized world and thus far have not been outlawed by the forces of evil as represented by "marchers," demonstrations by minority groups, or by the infiltration of communists into civil and religious organi-

Just as the Fourth of July is a time for jubilant celebration, this thirtieth of May warrants our most serious contemplation. A year ago the area news media very seldom found it necessary to report the death of a Panhandle fighting man in Vietnam. Currently we are reminded almost daily of this war's tragic

toll on our young manhood. The noose tightens!

"How dear to this heart are the scenes of my childhood, When fond recollection presents them to view" (Old Oaken Bucket - Woodworth)

One of my earliest memories is of a "Decoration Day" parade. I was a big boy before I ever heard it called Memorial Day. Every Decoration Day there was a parade up Main Street, from the river bridge to Springwood cemetery.

Memory fails in recalling each unit taking part, but I do remember that the hometown militia was present, complete with flags and military band. More than half a century has passed but the hot brick pave-

ment and the blistering steel trolly tracks made a lasting impression on a barefoot boy. Marching along behind the soldiers came almost the entire

student body of the city's grade schools. Each child carried a small bunch of flowers to be placed on

the graves of our men and boys whohad given their lives that we, their kith and kin, might be free. Up the long gentle slope of Main Street we trudged. Past the

Post Office and the Court House, past the hotel and the closed There existed, except for the band way up ahead, a Sunday

morning quiet. The curbs were lined with Mamas in big, wide, flowered

summer hats and long dresses. The proud Papas, those not in the parade, stood in groups near the hotel, barber shops, and pool rooms, their heads protected from the bright sun by the stiff brims of "straw kellys." At the top of the hill, smackdab in the middle of the street,

stood the statue of a Confederate soldier. One block past the "Confederate Monument" two stone pillars and a wide open, wrought iron gate gave access to the cemetery. A sigh of relief went up from the small pre-spring marchers when they found themselves in the sade cast by the hundreds of

trees that lined the cemetery driveways and sidewalks. Each child stopped beside a grave and at a given signal leaned down and carefully, almost tenderly, placed his bouquet in the

A minister prayed, a man made a very brief speech, and it was

However simple, this ceremony, however small in the grand scheme of world affairs, it was an experience long remembered. Today more than fifty years later I should like to return to that place beneath the trees and flowering shrubs and again offer a handful of blossoms to my great-great uncle, Capt. Green Pettis-Pool, C.S.A., who fell in the first battle of Bull Run at lanassas, Virginia, in 1861.

Other hands will make the presentation this year, as they have for several years past; while I, half a continent away, will enjoy Memorial Day by speaking to the Girl Scouts on my favorite subject, - patriotism!
