Smith-Yarborough Clash Is Highlight Of Election

AN EDITORIAL

Smith, Joy Are Political Picks

Preston Smith, who is bidding to become the first governor elected from the western half of the state, will have to combat two things in his effort to win the Democratic runoff on Saturday against Don Yarborough.

One will be voter apathy, or perhaps, more appropriate, "voter absence," due to Memorial Day weekend; and the other will be trying to win a greater percentage of the state's sparsely populated areas' votes than Yarborough wins in the state's heavier-populated centers.

In addition, Smith will be out to pick up some votes from supporters of Waggoner Carr, Dolph Briscoe, John Hill and Eugene Locke, and perhaps win majorities in a few more of the larger cities than he did in the May 4 primary. However, the potential long weekend may hurt his efforts here.

Although Smith won a plurality of the votes in 112 of the state's 254 counties on May 4, to only 50 for the Houstonite, Yarborough won eight of the state's 10 most populous counties, piling up about half of his total number of votes - some 203,776-- in these ten counties.

Smith, meanwhile, winning only two of these counties (Austin's Travis and Lubbock), tallied 150,410 votes in the same counties.

A big question will be: What percentage of each candidate's voters will return to the polls on Saturday -- and what percentage of the approximately 230,000 (in the top ten counties) who voted for other candidates will turn out - and, how will they vote?

Otherwise, Yarborough is a pretty good bet to do about as well as he did on May 4, in the metropolitan centers - and Smith will do even better "out west," without Waggoner Carr on the ballot to split his vote, as he did somewhat in the first primary.

Yarborough, leaders of the liberal forces, carried his home county of Harris (Houston) with a whopping 69,220 votes, to 48,553 for Smith and 18,490 for Carr. It was a bit closer in Dallas County, 31,734 for Yarborough to 24,072 for Smith. However, they finished third and fourth here, as Eugene Locke carried his home county, and Waggoner Carr was second.

Smith ran a close race in Tarrant County (Fort Worth), where Yarborough, Carr and Smith had very similar totals. Smith's victory in Travis County (Austin) was somewhat a surprise, but perhaps it shouldn't have been, since he's had 18 years around the capitol city to become acquainted.

Excluding the top ten counties from the state's total vote, Smith out-pollled Yarborough, 232,078 to 219,047. And he naturally had an even greater margin than this in West Texas -- his "backyard."

The man who ran fourth on the May 4 ballot, Dolph Briscoe, actually carried more counties (69) than did Yarborough. However, the South Texan also had the misfortune of having his best support in sparsely-populated areas, so his total vote wasn't too high.

Gen. Ross Ayers, one of Smith's local supporters, points out that if the present lieutenant governor gets just one of every four votes from supporters of defeated candidates who have pledged their support, it would be enough to give Smith the victory, provided those who voted for Smith in May will again do so.

The only catch, as Ayers points out, is getting those same voters back to the polls on Saturday. The fact that the runoff comes during the Memorial Day holiday, right at the close of school, will undoubtedly hurt Smith's potential vote. A turnout of voters anywhere close to the May 4 primary would give him a shoo-in.

However, a light turnout, as the case no doubt will be, would be to Yarborough's advantage. Smith can only hope that some of Yarborough's supporters will also "go fishing" on Saturday.

As we did in the primary election, we would like to once again recommend Preston Smith to the voters of the Friona area in the Democratic runoff on Saturday.

If a majority of the qualified voters go to the polls on Saturday, then Smith should win the runoff. However, if a small number turns out, then the liberal minority could prevail.

Therefore, it is important for everyone who wants Preston Smith as governor to make a point to vote for him on Saturday. Every vote will count big.

Smith is definitely the man for West Texas -- as seen by the large number of votes he received in the May 4 primary. This is the golden opportunity for West Texans to elect a fellow West Texan to the state's number one post.

Without arguing the conservative vs liberal viewpoint, Smith stands head and shoulders over his opponent, who has no experience as a state officer. Smith has almost a quarter of a century of experience in state government. His record as a successful businessman makes for unbeatable combination, in our estimation.

Saturday is a big day for West Texas residents. They must not be complacent and "let George do it." That's the only thing which could beat Preston Smith on Saturday.

James A. Joy of Plainview merits your consideration in the runoff for Judge of the 7th Court of Civil Appeals.

Traditionally, the court is made up of one judge from Amarillo, one from Lubbock and another from the "country." Joy is a native of Plainview. His opponent, Jack Hazlewood is from Amarillo.

Members of the law profession are of the opinion that a second judge from Amarillo would "over-balance" the court.

Besides the reasons of geography, Joy has the qualifications as well. He has served six years as judge of the 64th district court, and handled one of the heaviest court loads in the state of Texas.

His opponent, an attorney, has no actual judicial experience.

The Democratic runoff or second primary will be held on Saturday, with the governor's race once again holding the attention of area voters. Polling places are the same as the May 4 primary. Friona voters will cast ballots at the Junior High building.

Two races will appear on the runoff ballot, but the race which will nominate Preston Smith or Don Yarborough as the Democratic governor's candidate is the one getting the most notice.

Smith, the present lieutenant governor, is bidding to become the state's first governor from the western half of the state, as well as the first lieutenant governor in this century to move up to the governor's chair by election.

The other race, which is for judge of the 7th Court of Civil Appeals, pits James A. Joy of Plainview against Jack Hazlewood of Amarillo. Joy's supporters point out that the election of Hazlewood would make an imbalance in the court, with two justices from Amarillo.

If the number of people casting absentee ballots is an indication, then there might be about as many people vote in the runoff as did in the primary. Some 58 people voted absentee in the special six-day period, termed a "real good" turnout

by County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

A few minutes before 5 p.m. on Tuesday, the deadline to vote absentee, Mrs. Warren said 54 persons had voted, and four more were waiting to vote. This would put the total within five of the 63 who voted prior to the May 4 primary. Some counties reported more absentee voters this time than for the May primary.

"We ran out of forms - it kind of caught us off guard," Mrs. Warren said. "This was real good, considering the absentee period lasted only six days, compared to 18 prior to the primary," she added.

The county clerk pointed out that the number of people voting absentee from the Friona area was fairly light, since it was necessary for people to vote in person at the court house for the runoff.

In the absentee box for the May 4 primary, Smith led the voting with 33 votes. Yarborough polled only three.

Smith was the leading candidate in both Friona and County totals on May 4, with 272 votes in Friona and 701 in the county. Yarborough ran sixth in the field of 10 in Friona, with only 26 votes, and was fourth in the county with 134 votes.

NAMES NEEDED

Head Start Program Makes Good Headway

Friona's first try at having a federally-financed Head Start program for pre-school ages of low-income families is making a good start toward getting underway early in June.

Applications from several prospective pupils are being reviewed by the board and employees for all Head Start jobs have been tentatively hired. Names of pupils and employees will be released at a later date.

There are still openings for pre-school age youngsters in the summer class. Mrs. Gene Brito, chairman of the Head Start committee, urges everyone who knows a child who could benefit from this pre-first grade learning session to contact Rev. Paul Mohr or Rev. James Price with the name of the child and parents. Landowners are especially asked to notify a member of the board if they have poverty-class citizens with pre-school children on their land.

There is also a need for at least eight volunteers to work with the Head Start program. Each worker would help one week during the eightweek session.

Mrs. Don Spring is head of the volunteer workers committee and all who are interested in helping with this program are asked to contact her.

Head Start classes will be held in the Grade School Cafeteria, where the children will be able to study, work, play and eat all in air-conditioned comfort.

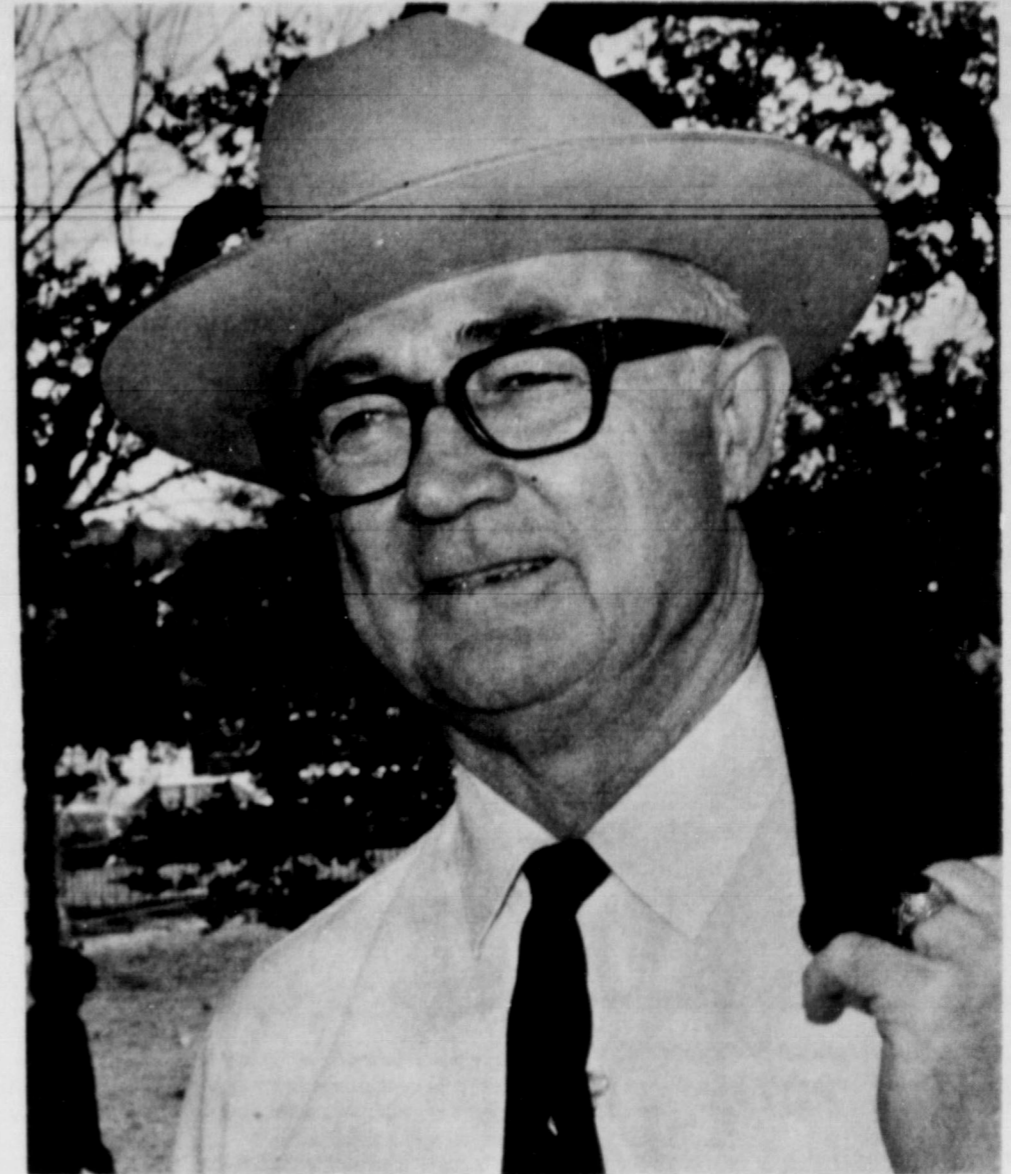

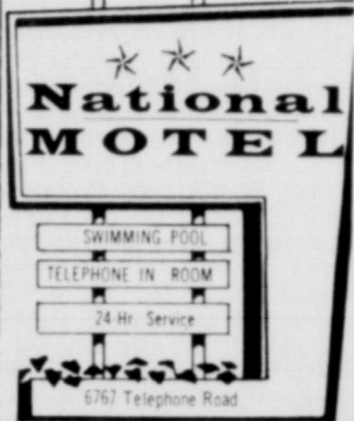

Renner Gets ENMU Degree

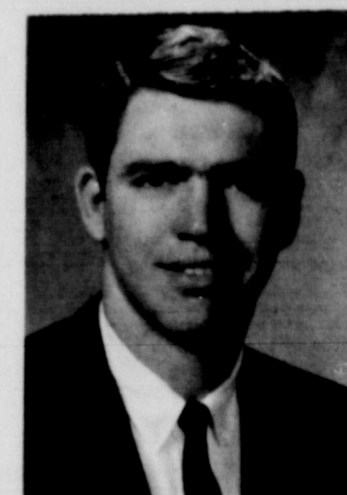

He had been accepted as a Naval Officer Candidate, and he will go to Newport, Rhode Island, in August, where he will attend OCS for four months.



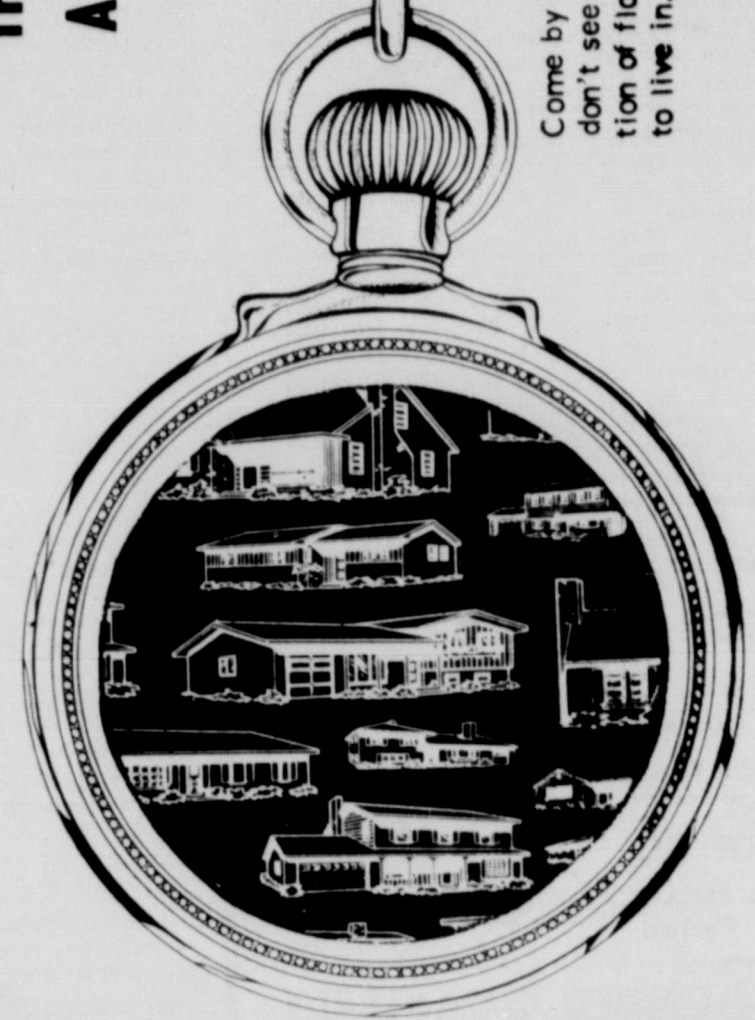

Although Rogers is relatively new to the high plains he has almost 14 years experience in servicing the credit needs of Texas farmers and ranchers. Prior to becoming Assistant General Manager of the local association in April 1967, he worked 5 years for the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, the discounting institution for all Production Credit Associations in Texas. While with this Bank Rogers served as Senior Credit Examiner analyzing thousands of loans for millions of dollars. He also was a member of an operational and management consultant charged with the responsibility for studying Production Credit procedures and recommending steps to increase efficient and reduce operational cost.

Rogers started his agricultural credit career in 1952 as a loan representative for the Tyler Production Credit Association. He becomes General Manager of that organization in 1960.

Rogers is 43 years old, a native of Van Zandt County and a graduate of Wills Point High School. Following 3 years service during World War II, he graduated from A&M College in 1947. He and his wife

Christine and their 3 children; Pam, 16, Jimmy 12, and Mitzi 10 live at 1120 Holiday Drive. They are members of the First Baptist Church of Plainview. Rogers is an ordained deacon of the church and is active in Boy Scout work on District and troop levels.

Capital and reserves are in excess of \$6,200,000. The Board of Directors, according to Shepard look to Rogers' guidance for an aggressive but sound credit policy to accomplish present goals which include a yearly loan volume of \$100,000,000.

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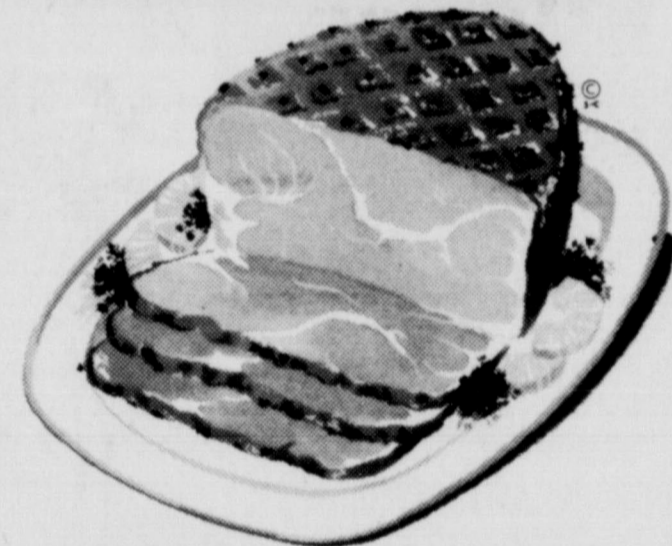
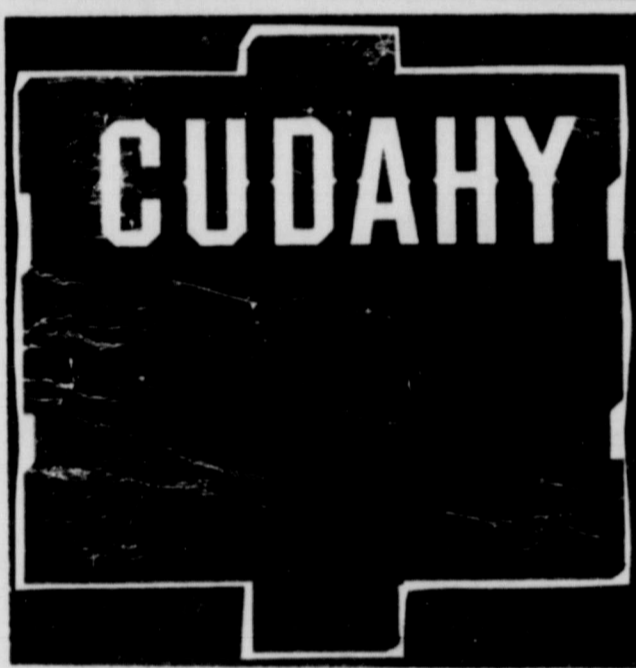

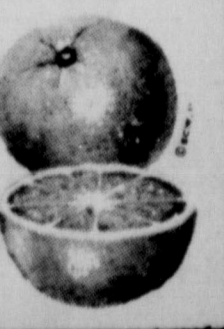

The bride is a graduate of Permian High School in Odessa. Rundell is a Bovina High School graduate. Both are students at West Texas State University.

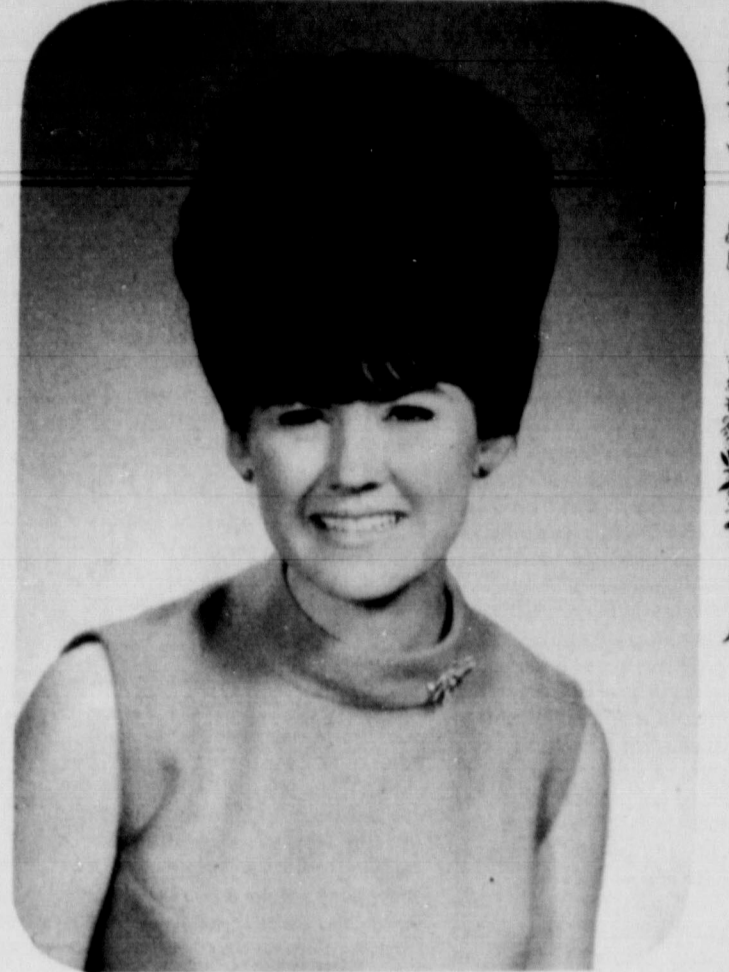

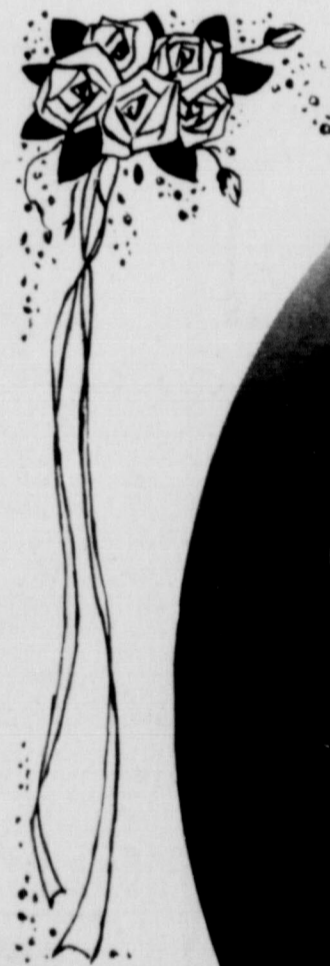

This is the time of year the home improvement swindler begins to descend, so beware! We recently heard of some phony deals. It's better to use a reputable local establishment -- really cheaper in the long run.

Seamstresses Warned Of Pattern Revisions

Beginning in November 1967, major pattern companies revised their sizing. Although the companies follow a standard set of measurements, their patterns differ in fit.

Cricket B. Taylor, Extension home demonstration agent, says shoulder width and slant, shape of armholes and necklines and slant of the underarm may vary, along with ease allowed for body movements and comfort.

Because of these variations, some brands will fit you better than others. While bust, waist, hip and back waist length mea-

surements are a guide, you may need to try different brands of patterns to find the best possible fit, she explains.

When selecting the size, compare your measurements with the chart and select the size which most closely corresponds to them. When you select the correct figure type and pattern size, alteration and fitting problems are kept to a minimum, says the Extension agent.

Take snug, but not tight measurements. Use a tape measure that is in good condition, Mrs. Taylor advises.

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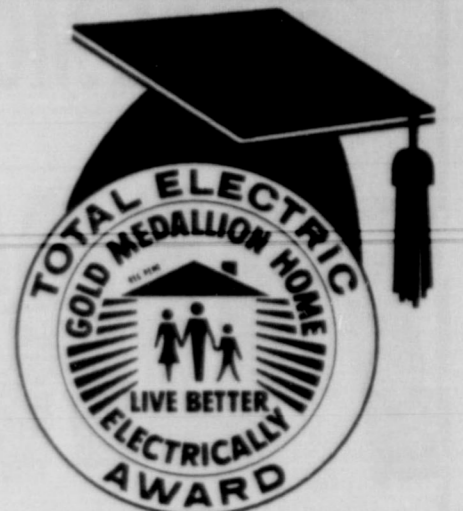
