FARM INCOME STILL LAGS

Prices received by farmers have increased only 1.3 per cent over those of May 1954. But the prices paid by farmers have increased 3.5 per cent and parity ratio in May stood at 82 compared to 81 in May of 1956. Consumer disposable in come in the first quarter of 1957 was more than five per cent above year ago, due mainly to increase ost of living stood a few percen ge points above a year ago.

But the economist says that we should not overlook the fact that consumer credit outstanding in May was 7.3 per cent greater than in May 1956. In some industries inventories remained large relative to sales. Output of durable goods and autos dropped four and 14 per cent respectively from December 1956 to May 1957. Steel mill activity has declined from around 100 per cent of rated capacity in the fourth quarter of 1956 to a low of 84 per ent in mid-May. There was a pick up to 88 per cent of capacit mid-June, but the usual declin expected in July and August.

Agricultural exports through April of the 1956 - 57 fiscal year were estimated at four billion dollar out 7.5 million bales, compared t 2.2 million in 1955 - 56,

County Survey On Needs of Ex-Polia Victims IS Set

A county-wide survey to discover all post-polio patients will be conducted this month by the Cochran County Chapter of the National Fo. undation for Infantile Paralysis, Ch arles Jones. Chapter Chairman, an-

nounced today. The local survey is part of a nationwide project by the National Foundation to compile a roster of polio cases of all ages and degrees of disability, regardless of date of onset. The canvass here is to be completed by Sept. 1.

"Modern medicine has made impressive strides in developing new rehabilitation techniques in recent years," Mr. Jones said, "Pilot surveys already undertaken show that there are thousands of polio-handicapped in the United States who have not yet had an opportunity for medical evaluation to deternine if they might benefit from these new techniques.

"Some of the techniques employed today for those disabled by polio and other causes were unknown or unused as recently as 10 or even five years ago.

"The March of Dimes organization, having scored a tremendous victory in its war on polio, does not propose to walk off and leave the wounded behind so long as it is possible for them to help. We wish to find everyone who has had polio whether paralytic or nonparalytic. We want to know what their special problems may be, so that they may be helped to regain useful lives, if humanly possible, even though it will take a considerable period of time."
