Velinda Sutton Rites Saturday At Bledsoe

Brave little Velinda Sue Sutton, four-year-old youngest member of the Joe Sutton family of Bledsoe, died at 5:00 p.m. Thursday in the Cochran County Hospital after battling for her life 13 days.

Services were to be held at 3 p.m. Saturday, August 31, at the First Baptist Church of Bledsoe. Rev. J. D. Powell, pastor, was to officiate and burial was to be in the Morton Memorial Cemetery.

Burned over 60 percent of her body, little Velinda wasn't given much chance for survival. However, her 12 days she had nearly held her own - until what doctors always fear in such a case - pneumonia, set in.

Velinda was severely burned on four days after her 4th birthday, in a flash fire that destroyed the Sutton family pickup, in the yard of their home at Bledsoe, Saturday, August 17. All of the members of the Sutton family were burned, but only she and her father were hospitalized and her condition was considered critical.

The father remained hospitalized this week, but was able to leave the hospital Thursday.

Survivors include the parents, two brothers, Mike, 9, and Steve, 8, and the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Griffin of Bledsoe and paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Sutton of Seaside, Calif.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR Asked To Help End Hospital Problem

Morton Tribune,
Morton, Texas

Mr. Editor,
I am writing to you in hope you might help to overcome a problem which I believe is of the utmost importance to the people of Cochran County, indeed, all those served by the Cochran County Hospital.

I am a believer that information breeds understanding - which is to say, if the people understand our problem, they will solve it themselves.

The problem is the overcrowding of our hospital corridors, emergency room and X-Ray department at the time of an emergency.

For instance, there was a time when the hospital received five victims of an auto accident. Within minutes after the patients were received, the hospital halls and emergency room were filled with people to the point where the care of the patients was hindered and almost to a complete standstill.

Though it has never happened here, to my knowledge, I can readily imagine, if these conditions persisted, a patient might be lost because a doctor could not attend a patient properly, or a nurse could not reach a patient badly in need of assistance - because a crowd of people blocked her path.

Now someone who reads this might ask, what manner of people are these persons creating such a problem. It has been my experience that they fit into one of three categories: (1) relatives, (2) friends, or (3) curiosity seekers. It has also been my experience that the relatives create less of a hazard than the latter two categories.

The relative is sincere in wanting everything done, quickly. He tries to be careful to remain out of the way. Friends of a victim are far less thoughtful, they have a tendency to push their way into emergency and treatment rooms asking the condition of the unfortunate person, even before the doctor has had time to examine the patient. Needless to say, their presence lends no thing constructive to the examination.

The third category are the real hazard to the life of the patient requiring the quickest attention in an emergency. These people are the ones who come charging into the hospital asking of everyone in general, how the accident occurred, and the location of the scene. They are also the people who are most discourteous to the hospital employees who ask them to wait in the lobby.

To each and every person in this area, I would like to issue this statement of assurance, if you might be the unfortunate, victimized by an accident, and brought to our emergency room, you will be cared for with every resource of Cochran County's Hospital and its medical staff.

staff. If you are a relative of an emergency patient, the next of kin will be notified of the patient's accident and his present condition as soon as possible. Also, if you are a relative, you will be asked to limit the presence of only one to the emergency, X-ray or treatment room. This can only be done with the permission of the attending physician.

To the persons who would fall in the category of being curiosity seekers, common snoopers, I have this to say. At the time the hospital receives an emergency patient, you will be asked to clear the halls, emergency room, X-Ray room, and emergency entrance of the hospital. If you do not cooperate with the nurses and other hospital employees in this manner, the law enforcement agencies of this county have assured me that they will be glad to assist in removing you from the premises.

This is no threat. Nor is it an attempt to be overbearing. But, neither is it an attempt to be diplomatic. Our business is none of these. Our business is to be able to provide care in cases of emergency or medical aid to those who need it. We intend to see it done.

In case there should be an accident that could be termed as a major disaster, in which any member of this community would like to offer his services, there will be someone on duty in the reception room to assign you to a task - if your services are needed.

AREA SCHOOLS OPEN MON.

All of Texas' Last Frontier area schools will get underway tomorrow, Labor Day, it was ascertained when Bula Schools announced they would begin with a 9 a.m. General Assembly of all pupils in the school auditorium.

All other schools, had previously announced they would open Monday. Morton and Whiteface completed pre-registration this week and Bledsoe, Three Way and Bula will register tomorrow.

Supt. H. A. Reynolds said parents are invited to attend the opening general assembly. New teachers will be introduced and other announcements of interest will be made. Registration of all students will be on Monday, at Bula, and regular classes will begin Tuesday.

Supt. Reynolds was one of the last to announce his faculty - having been hit hard by late resignations.

Only Morton's faculty had not been announced when the Dollar Day Special went to press and earlier in the week Supt. John Barnes said he had hired all but one teacher and would fill that vacancy in a few days.

The Bula faculty this fall will include: Reynolds, Superintendent and high school math teacher; Miss Vera Wamack, English; Melvin Howard, social science and 6 man football; Mrs. Ruby Reid, commercial subjects and natural science; J. Logan Green, vocational agriculture, and Mr. Bernice Miller, home economics.

Mrs. Miller, a West Texas State graduate and Coach Howard are new comers.

Grade school teachers include Mrs. Hazel Cook, first and second grades; Mrs. Bernice Swinney, third and fourth; and Mrs. W. C. Risinger, fifth and sixth.

W. C. Risinger is again girls basketball coach and will serve as school custodian. Mrs. John Gunter will teach piano; Hugh Cooke is bus superintendent and Melvin Howard is bus driver.

Among the improvements made at Bula this summer are refinishing of all floors; improvement in the science rooms; and refinishing of the lunchroom.

THREE WAY BAPTIST CHURCH WINS COVETED TOWN AND COUNTRY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

DALLAS - The Three Way Baptist Church, near Morton, has been named winner of the Town and Country Achievement Award sponsored by the West Plains Baptist Association, spokesmen said in Dallas.

The church is now competing with other associational winners in District Nine of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. Both district and associational winners will be recognized at the annual state convention in Fort Worth, Nov. 5 - 7, when the first place state award will be made.

The Rev. Bob Ross is pastor of the Three Way church, one of 335 Texas Baptist town and country churches participating in the competition this year.

The award is designed to stimulate interest in small-church work, to recognize outstanding achievements by pastor and churches and to help Texas Baptists broaden their concept of Christian responsibility.

Achievement competition is divided into three categories with points given for projects which help build a better church, community and world.

The association is one of 122 geographical areas in which the BGCCT promotes work each year. The denomination includes one out of every six persons in the state, with 3,754 churches and 1,524,000 members in Texas.

Approximately two-thirds of the churches are classified as town & country congregations.

Winning pastors in each district will receive a parchment scroll and the church a metal plaque which may be displayed in a prominent position outside the building.

Top state award last year went to Pastor Robert Wimpee and the Taylor's Valley Baptist church in Bell County.

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Farm Storage Facility Loans Program Extended

The Farm Storage Facility Loan Program has been extended for another year, through June 30, 1958.

These loans are designed to help farmers obtain needed farm storage for eligible commodities including: corn, oats, barley, grain sorghum, wheat, rye, soybeans, dry beans, dry peas, cottonseed, hay seeds, pasture, seeds, and winter cover crop seeds.

The structure must be located on the farm where the grain is produced. Storage capacity for one year's crop, plus carry-over is permitted.

The maximum amount of the loan must not exceed 80 percent of the actual out-of-pocket cost paid by the producer. The cost of the applicant's and other labor employed on the farm are not to be considered as a part of the cost of the structure. The cost of permanent foundations and concrete floors must also be excluded from the cost.

Interest on the loan is at the rate of the facility for loan purposes, rate of 4 percent per year, and loans are for a period of 4 years, but may be paid before maturity.

Insurance is required if the loan is \$1,000 or more.

A Severance Agreement must be executed by all persons having an interest in the land.

Complete details of the loan program may be obtained at the County ASC office.

Wheat Sign-up Through October 4

The sign-up period for winter wheat is scheduled to open on Aug. 26th and close Oct. 4th.

All farmers who have an "old farm" wheat allotment for 1958 will be eligible to sign an Acreage Reserve Agreement with their ASC Committeemen.

There is no limit on the number of acres which may be put in the Acreage Reserve except for the payment limitation of \$3,000 to any one producer on Acreage Reserve.

Details of the 1958 Acreage Reserve program for winter wheat will be available at the County ASC Office.
