Fire Prevention Week actually started as a special day dedicated to "bringing before the public the much needed lesson of fire prevention." It's original sponsor was the Fire Marshalls' Association of North American which is not a section of the National Fire Protection Association.

It was in 1920 that President Wil-son issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation. And, finally, in 1922 the entire week in cudling October 9, was officially proclaimed Fire Prevention Week by President Harding."

NEED FOR FIRE PREVENTION In the last decade, fire has kil-led more than 100,000 persons and burned and disfigured many hun

Each year about 11,500 Americans died needlessly in fire and mo re than twice that number are severely burned or disfigured for life. 



One of the biggest single losses innered by the postal service is handling the big magazines as second class mail, operating virmally as unpaid carrier boys for these publishers.

Or as Rep. Rhodes figures it, it costs the Post Office 89.4 million per year to handle Life, \$6 milion for the Saturday Evening Post, 85.1 million for Look. Under his amendment, if a

al postal rate increase goes igh, these publishers, and will pay the difference hat it costs the service to han dl • their magazines over \$100,000 for year. He estimates this would raise another \$38 to \$40 million

So, all of a sudden, this postal

raise matter becomes a very hot

It is almost a certainty the big magazine publishers will resist losing the big subsidy they now receive. And some of them are not without considerable influ-ence in Washington, even to the extent of getting ambassador-ships for their wives.

But on the other hand, Cen-

gress cannot well afford to tell the country that it intends to continue subsidizing with taxpayer's money some of these huge magarines who get as much as \$37,000 for a single page in a single issue from the big corporations who can afford to advertise in these publications.

In fact, the nation's indepen-dent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have already gone on record as opposing the idea of indiscriminate raises in postal rates inasmuch as small business generally is quite de-pendent upon low cost postal service.

Thus, an increase of 331/2% on regular first class postage, while the big magazines continue drawing what is tantamount to a sub-sidy, is not calculated to bring out the brass bands on Main Street to celebrate such a move.

It's quite possible that rather than let such a brannigan get onto the floor, the bill will be allowed to quietly die in a Sen-ate committee next session, too. But if it does get to the floor,

it could be one of the most inter-esting Congressional battles in some time. As they say in cur-rent jargon, Rep. Rhodes has really thrown quite a curve.
