As developed in the testimony, these three giants of the broad-casting industry in various leading cities, approached the major supermarket chains and made them deals whereby the chains would receive free radio and TV

Thus, while FTC holds that there is no direct payoff by sup-pliers to the chains, there is a direct payoff inasmuch as unless the suppliers purchased the re-quired amount of time, the chains would not receive free air time for promotion of their stores.

robably one of the most sig-cant actions ever undertaken out what was going on, stepped in a test action, the FTC filed tharges against six major pack.

Water Storage Research Begun At Half Way

Research in the storage of ground water got underway at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation on December 4. The study of the controlled movement of measured water into water bearing sands is being conducted by pumping water thru under-ground pipe from an irrigation weli into the recharge well, ¼ mile away, adjacent to the east lake at the Station. The experiment, which will be continuous for 6 weeks, is designed to cover the behavior of recharged water in the underground sands. Among the items studied are: the premeability of the sands: the rate of movement of water; the practicality of recharging water sands and the most economical way of conserving surf-

ace lake water The flow of water into the recharge well is measured at both the sorce and the recharge well to give ccurate tests. This is the first suring and recording the data has een set up in this area. Three inch wells are located 8, 50, nd 100 ft. from the recharge well o get data. Wells 1/2 and 11/2 miles away are being checked to detere any effect the test has on them. During the first five days of testng. 5.889.000 gal, of water had been numped into the recharge well. A rise in the water level of 24.61 ft. was recorded at the recharge well and 21.31 ft at the test well, 8 feet away, 20.93 at the well 100 ft, from the recharge well. The irrigation well supplying the water showed a draw - down of 21.45 ft. during the five - day period while a well 350 ft away showed a drop of only 5.07 ft. Flow of 800 gal. per min. was selected to run the test. This rate could be varied up or down.

The recharge research program is a cooperative effort of the U. S. Geological Survey, the Texas State Board of Water Engineers and the High Plains Station, Jerry G. Cro-nin and the staff of the USGS are in charge of the research program Mr. Al Winslow, assistant district geologist from the Austin District Office is assisting in the research

YOU-SCHOOL BOARD CALIBER?

It's been said that when our school board meets, it's America's nost important board meeting. But even though our school boards have the legal responsibility for operating our schools, not much

bers them-selves, school superintendzens in general think about the traits school board members need. The National School Boards Association asked board

members and the general public, while the University of Chicago's Midwest Administration Center asked the superintendent. Here are some of the things those stud-

are some of the things those studies reveal.

All agree that, to be a good school beard member, you've got to have the time to devote to the job. Incumbent board members put this qualification first, probably because they're most aware of the time that's needed for meetings, for study and for liaison with the public.

All are agreed, too, that the board member must be committed to the importance of public education. Although the public believes a man or woman who has already proved a success public believes a man or woman who has already proved a success in community leadership is the best board member, the incumbents think this qualification is about third. Superintendents would list a good education as a first qualification, although the other two groups weren't sure just what education a board member should have—probably high school, they thought.

Age seems to have some bearing with all three groups believ-

attention has been paid to the qualifications for school board membership until recently.

Underlying all these various answers was the feeling that board membership requires more study and training than ever be-fore. The superintendents in par-ticular would welcome more good

fore. The superintendents in particular would welcome more good study helps for the member who has just gone on the board. In fact, the superintendent's study says that a board member really isn't very effective until after he's served at least one year.

From what I have observed, more and more good people who are truly community leaders are running for the school board. This is a healthy sign, I think, because those few people who make up the local school board are really deciding our children's and our country's future.
