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Services Held for Chas. Clevenger At Buia Baptist

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Thursday for Charlie Clevenger Buia farmer, 47 years old, who died in a Littlefield hospital eleven days after being run over by his own tractor on his farm near Buia.

Rev. Moore conducted the final rites and Hammond's Funeral Home of Littlefield handled the burial in the Littlefield Cemetery.

Charles, one of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Clevenger, who still reside near Buia, was at work in the field with his wife on the afternoon the accident occurred. It is theorized he tripped the clutch while working at the bollpuller, and was thrown under the tractor. He sustained severe internal injuries and numerous broken bones.

Survivors include his wife and four children, David Clevenger, of Morton and Mrs. Faye Shaw of Muleshoe; and Lloyd and Gloria Jean Clevenger of the home, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Clevenger, Buia; three sisters, Mrs. Beatrice Stanley of Spade, Mrs. Lillie Gregory of Seaside, California and Mrs. Lois Lancaster of Tulsa; four brothers, Bill and Raymond of Morton; L. W. of Buia, and S. H. Junior of Littlefield; and several grandchildren.

Wage Finding Is Released

The latest wage finding from the Regional Director, Bureau of Employment Security, for Cochran County, was sent in telegram form from the office of Ed McDonald.

The finding, effective December 27, was: "first pulling irrigated \$1.25 to \$1.50 per hundredweight, second pulling irrigated \$1.50 per hundredweight. Rate less than \$1.55 for pulling is not applicable to Mexican contract workers."

ONLY 330 POLL TAXES PAID THROUGH THURSDAY; FAR SHORT OF LAST YEAR

A total of 330 poll taxes, or only about one fifth of the voting potential usually reached in Cochran County have been paid.

The figure represents poll taxes paid through Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Denny said that the office of Vern Bebee in Whiteface again has poll tax receipts for the convenience of those who find it difficult to get to the Morton office. Mr. Bebee's office will remain selling the poll taxes until the deadline, January 31.

The 330 is roughly one third of the number paid last year — a non-election year, — but only about one fifth or 20 percent of those paid in 1956.

The least number of paid poll taxes in recent years is 96 in 1955 and the most paid poll taxes came in 1952 when 2006 persons paid for

Bank Deposits Down Past Year Statement Shows

Total deposits at the First State Bank of Morton were down some \$90,000 from the figures of a year ago, according to the statement released this week.

Loans were also considerably higher for this time of the year due to the fact that this year's cotton crop has not been purchased yet and many farmers have been unable to pay back loans.

The financial statement drawn up at the end of 1957 compares this way with the statement for 1956:

Total Resources and Total Liabilities: Dec. 31, 1956 — 5,058,772.88 and Dec. 31, 1957 — 4,285,604.53.

Loans and discounts up some \$359,000 over a year ago; Real Estate loans down some \$28,000; available cash in Government Bonds is down nearly \$1,100,000.

RAINFALL IN '57 WAS DOUBLE THAT OF 1956; BUT COTTON GINNED WILL BE CONSIDERABLY LESS

The rains really came for Cochran County this year — only a few inches below the average 20 year normal which we haven't even approached since 1949.

Almanacs, which like anything else are usually from five to 15 years behind in their averages, have listed Cochran County's average rainfall around 17 or 18 inches for the past 8 years five of which had to be called drought years.

The average has been nearer to 8 inches the past ten years and last year, because they were able to get the rains at the right time, farmers parlayed 7.20 inches into a good crop. However, it must be

47 DRUNK DRIVERS; 17 LIQUOR LAW VIOLATORS NABBED HERE DURING YEAR OF 1957; 11 THEFTS

Cochran County's assortment of jail occupants this past year was much the same as those of any other year but a sharp increase in drunken drivers was noted.

The County Jail book lists 48 persons booked for DWI during the past year, ten more than in 1956 and representing an almost 20 percent increase.

The total is well on the way toward doubling the number in 1953 when 29 DWI's were recorded. In the succeeding years it went like this:

1955 — 29
1956 — 38
1957 — 48



Tubb reminded the group that only 11 members attended the first meeting and a greater number are needed to complete the work of the program.

He urged members to encourage 100 percent attendance and to be thinking who of the group they would like to have a permanent chairman.

Purpose of the group is to study the programs of our county schools, the faculty situations, the finances, and the school plants themselves and to bring suggestions as to what needs improvement and how this improvement should be brought about.

The Morton Junior High School will again be the site of the meeting.
