

Fredric Rand Mann is a selfmade millionaire who can't buy the one thing he wants most. He is an industrialist, a human dynamo, a banker, builder, philanthropist and musician. As board vice-chairman of the National Container Corp. of America, he has amassed a fortune he uses in numerous ways to benefit himself and his fellow-

But there is one thing he can never buy-a lost music career. Born in Russia

At 53, Mann admits, "I've been chasing a rainbow all my life. I would rather be a concert

planist than anything else in the world. Born in Russia, brought here at the age of two, he had been happily preparing for the concert stage when, suddenly, at 15, a car rammed into his bike,
