## NEW X-RAY MACHINE PURCHASED... COURT GETS MONTHLY TAX REPORT; IS TOLD OF IMPENDING CHECK BY STATE AUDITORS

The Cochran County Commissioner's Court, Monday, authorized the purchase of a new X-ray machine for Cochran County Hospital from the Picker X-ray Corporation. The Picker Company submitted the lowest of three bids received by the court.

The machine purchased was a Gilbert X-ray machine, manufactured by the Picker Corp., and the purchase price was \$6,995.00, less \$1,750.00 trade in on the old machine, or a total of \$5,245.00.

The County will pay cash for the machine instead of issuing warrants, it was said Monday.

Other bids received were on a Profex-ray machine at \$6,400.00, less \$1,000.00 for trade-in; and a bid of \$10,309.00 on a General Electric machine, less \$1,969.00 offered trade-in on the old GE machine.

The Court also okayed the bills and three of the Commissioner's okayed a bill for \$350 from the office of Assessor - Collector on a photo copying machine purchased by Mrs. Denny on May 17. The court had been approached on the purchase of the machine and had authorized purchase, preferring to see if the machine was essential.

Mrs. Denny went ahead and bought the machine and Monday asked the Court if they would pay for it, or if she would have to pay for it. One Commissioner, who signed the bill, said it was the last time he would approve a bill for Mrs. Denny for something she bought without the approval of the Court. One member declined to sign the bill on the grounds that she exceeded her authority in purchasing the machine without the Court's approval. Commissioner Foster was on hand and added the necessary 3rd signature for approval.

Mrs. Denny told the court the machine was necessary to make copies of receipts to send to Anstin to prove payment of previous taxes. She charged that an increasing number of citizens were not paying taxes.

# Political Spotlight Focuses On Candidate Speaking Saturday

### ABSENTEE VOTING MAY BE HEAVY

The County political pot began to simmer slightly this week with only a little over a week left before the Democratic First Primary election and several predicted close races coming up.

The oncoming political speaking. Approximately 52 absentee ballots have been mailed to voters in all four precincts of Cochran County. Eight have been returned.

The majority of ballots mailed to date have been in Precinct 2.

Fifteen citizens have voted absentee ballots in person, the majority of these being from Precinct One.

Next Tuesday, July 22, is the deadline for absentee voting in the July primary.

Persons who will be out of the county during the election may vote absentee as well as persons unable to come to the polls because of ill health. In the case of sickness, the ballot will be taken to the voter by the County Clerk or one of her staff, rather than mailed, which will be held Saturday beginning at 7:30 p.m., will focus a good deal more interest on the races at hand which will find three men vying for the office of County Judge, two women and a man seeking the office of County Clerk, and three expected close Commissioner races.

## Statement of Glenn Thompson

The resignation of former School Board of Trustees president E. V. Thompson was accepted Monday night at the regular meeting of the Board.

Thompson's resignation had been expected since the board member had seen his last two children graduate from school last spring.

He said he no longer had an active interest in the school but would always be willing to do what he could, if called upon.

The board discussed naming of a successor, but, in lieu of the absence of two of the Board members, took no action on the issue.

In addition to approving the monthly bills, the board voted a raise in salary to Supt. John Barnes for the duration of his present three year contract. The additional pay would boost his salary from \$9,000 to \$10,000 annually.

number of tax receipts were showing up, which the County is unable to find a record of, and said in these cases she must make a copy to send to Austin. She added that an audit would be made soon on this matter.

Mrs. Denny said the receipt books for these receipts were supposed to be in the Courthouse but on occasions members of her staff had spent "nearly a whole morning in looking for a particular record" — which they never found.

She told the group this situation necessitated the photo copying machine.

The cost of the machine purchased was \$250.00. Asked if her office could use the machine to photocopy certain documents in her work, the clerk said it would be too small to photograph pages of the Court records.

In other action the Court okayed a change in the roads and entrance leading into the rodeo grounds, which Commissioner Ran Holloman told the group would make for bet-

ter parking facilities and easier clearance of cars from the parking lot, after the show.

The Court tabled until Friday, a request by the City of Morton, for some help in paying for out-of-town fire runs made by the City fire truck. The Court wanted time to think about this problem. They will discuss the issue further at a called meeting, Friday.

The group heard the report of monthly collections of taxes by the Tax Assessor - Collector, Mrs. Oha Denny, whose report showed to date \$345,395.39 in taxes and penalties collected for Cochran County, or, according to Mrs. Denny, \$15,000 more than the original County budget.

For the month of June the tax collection breakdown showed \$768.36 for the state; \$2,247.49 for the county; \$19.98 in water district taxes and \$390.81 in county - wide school taxes.

The board had approved the need for an X-ray machine at meetings a few months ago and had asked the county to purchase the machine.

The Board also enthusiastically endorsed a plan to be put in motion by the Young Matron's Study Club, to start a Future Nurses organization. The group would be composed of junior high and high school girls who would work at the hospital under the competent direction of a registered nurse and who would

uld have an opportunity to see if they would like nursing and would like to pursue it as a career after they have graduated from high school.

Mrs. Lowell Webb, president of the Young Matron's explained the plan to the board and they authorized Mgr. Seale to write the club a letter stating their wholehearted approval of the plan.

The Board discussed setting a monetary sum that the manager could expend in petty cash transactions, before having to notify the board — but could not agree on a set sum. At present, there is no set sum agreed upon, the Board simply leaving it up to Mr. Seale's discretion as to what they should be notified about, before purchase.

The group also heard the sad news that an unavoidable delay is holding up the new clinic — being informed that Dr. Brown must be able to get clear title to the land involved before he can complete preliminary plans.


